




An Estimated 18.8 Million Adult and Child AIDS Deaths Have Occurred Since the Beginning of the Epidemic




Today, An Estimated 33.4 Million Adults and Children Are Living With HIV/AIDS, Most in Developing Countries


Infection Levels are Higher than Ever Imagined



And They Are Worsening








Today, There are 34.7 Million Orphans of AIDS and Other Causes, According to *Children on the Brink 2000*


In six sub-Saharan African countries, 20% or more of all children under age 15 are currently orphaned



By 2010, over 20% of children under 15 will be orphaned in eleven Sub-Saharan African countries

In many Eastern and Southern African countries, even if new infections leveled by the year 2000...

Infection rates will remain high through at least 2010

Deaths will not level until 2020

The proportion of children orphaned will be unusually high through at least 2030

The pandemic is undermining two decades of hard won development gains.

It will also have other, far reaching impacts on social structure, economic development, and human productivity

STRATEGIC CONSIDERATIONS

- The scale of orphaning is enormous
- The problem is long term
- Cost effectiveness must be a major consideration
- •Responses must be developed and sustained at scale
- Collaboration is essential
- We have to hit a moving target

•The impacts on children and families are unprecedented

• The front line of response is affected families and communities

•Interventions must be developed considering both the big picture and the impacts at household level

• This is not only an African issue
