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Statement from the Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development

I am pleased to report to Congress that in Fiscal Year 2001, the Economic Development Administration (EDA) continued to forward the President's philosophy by helping our partners across the nation (states, regions, and communities) create wealth and minimize poverty by promoting a favorable business environment to attract private capital investments and higher-skill, higherwage jobs.

After the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, EDA headquarters and regional office staffs worked together in support of the economic revitalization of New York City and northern Virginia. EDA personnel continue to serve in important roles supporting homeland security planning and economic security planning and preparation.

EDA's strategic investments in public infrastructure and local capital markets provide lasting benefits for economically disadvantaged areas. Acting as catalysts to mobilize public and private investments, EDA helps local communities address problems of high unemployment, low per capita income, and other forms of severe economic distress.

Successful economic development projects attract private sector capital investment and create value-added jobs, benefiting local communities and government at all levels. EDA has established new investment guidelines that focus on results rather than processes. Applying the new guidelines allows EDA to focus on investments that enhance community success in attracting private-sector investment, creating higher-skill, higher-wage jobs, stabilizing and diversifying local economies. By generating growth in distressed communities, EDA investments continue to have a high probability of success.

EDA continues to invest in applicants who are entrepreneurial in spirit and in action. In a general sense, potential investments are analyzed based on the following seven criteria:

- The proposed investments are market-based.
- The proposed investments are proactive in nature and scope.
- The proposed investments look beyond the immediate economic horizon, anticipate economic changes, and diversify the local and regional economy.
- The proposed investments maximize the attraction of private sector investment, which would not otherwise come to fruition absent EDA's investment.
- The proposed investments have a high probability of success.
- The proposed investments result in an environment where higher-skill, higher-wage jobs are created.
- The proposed investments maximize return on taxpayer investment.

It has been my privilege to serve as Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development since being confirmed by the U.S. Senate in August 2001. I look forward to working with EDA staff, our public shareholders, and our partners in the executive and legislative branches during the years ahead.

We will continue to support President Bush's endeavors in improving the economic security of the United States for future generations. Through its investments, EDA is helping to fulfill the Administration's goal to leave no geographic area or demographic sector of our nation behind in achieving the American dream.

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Economic Development Administration Fiscal Year 2001 Highlights

- EDA provided \$497.2 million to fund 1,168 investments, which are expected to generate almost \$6.5 billion in private sector funds, create 114,029 jobs, and save 39,442 jobs.
- David A. Sampson of Arlington, Texas, was confirmed as Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development on August 6, 2001.
- Booz-Allen and Hamilton completed a study on the structure and mission of EDA.
- Within two weeks of the September 11, 2001, terrorist attack on the World Trade Center, EDA approved a \$1 million Economic Adjustment Assistance investment to the Empire State Development Corporation to help New York City begin the process of economic recovery.
- For the eighth consecutive year, EDA assisted states affected by declines in Appalachian coal and southeastern timber, and supported the Pacific Northwest Timber Initiative.
- In July 2000, EDA received \$55.8 million in emergency supplemental appropriations, and by the close of Fiscal Year 2001 had awarded investments totaling \$51 million to fifty-one communities.
- Twelve Research investments totaling \$517,162 were awarded in Fiscal Year 2001, including a \$299,262 investment to Wayne State University, Detroit, Michigan, to evaluate the economic impact of Economic Adjustment Program investments in achieving structural economic adjustment.

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- Ten National Technical Assistance investments totaling \$1,080,500 were awarded, including a \$100,000 investment awarded to the National Governors' Association, to produce a governors' guide to cluster-based economic development. Also included was a \$75,000 investment awarded to the National Coalition for Asian Pacific American Community Development to assess the economic development needs of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in distressed communities.
- EDA awarded a \$1 million investment to the Tampa Port Authority to increase traffic in the Port by upgrading the seawall, developing underutilized port property and improving safety. It is estimated private investment in the project will be \$10.2 million.
- EDA invested \$1 million to construct a storm-sewer system, supporting the development of the Advanced Technology Agribusiness Park on a brownfield site in Des Moines, Iowa, one of twenty-eight communities designated a national Brownfields Showcase Community. It is estimated EDA's investment will create one hundred new jobs, save four hundred existing jobs, and leverage over \$19 million in private investment.
- Affiliated Tribes of Northwest Indians, a consortium of over fifty Native American Tribes in the states of Washington, Oregon, Alaska, Idaho, Montana, and California, received a \$55,000 investment. EDA assistance will coordinate and administer regional economic development activities, including a revolving loan fund, tribal telecommunication programs, tourism plans, and an energy development strategy, in addition to the preparation of Comprehensive Economic Strategy.
- EDA's Liquidation Division collected and returned \$12.6 million in critically needed funds to the United States Treasury and the American taxpayer.

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I. Performance Goals and Results: Government Performance and Results Act of 1993 (GPRA)

EDA PERFORMANCE GOAL: Create private enterprise and jobs in economically distressed communities

EDA fosters a favorable environment for the private sector to risk capital investment to produce goods and services and increase productivity, thereby providing the higher-skill, higher-wage jobs that offer opportunity for all Americans. All activities EDA undertakes with public dollars must demonstrate a return on investment through quantifiable performance measures.

Two programs are particularly important for meeting this performance goal: public works and economic adjustment. EDA investments in public works and development facilities are catalysts for other public and private investments, establishing or expanding commercial and industrial facilities in distressed communities. EDA's economic adjustment investments for infrastructure improvements and revolving loan funds help communities and businesses respond to severe economic dislocations caused by major layoffs, plant shutdowns, trade impacts, and natural disasters, as well as the closure of military bases, energy labs, and similar actions that adversely affect local economies.

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Chapter I: Performance Goals and Results

Performance Measures: (1) Jobs created or retained in distressed communities as a result of EDA investments and (2) Private sector dollars invested in distressed communities as a result of EDA investments

Successful economic development projects in distressed communities attract private-sector capital investment and create value-added jobs that are beneficial for local communities and government at all levels. By investing in successful economic undertakings, promoting job creation and expanding the economy, the demand for government expenditures for some social services decrease while tax revenues increase. EDA's investment policy guidelines set standards to achieve performance goals of promoting private investment and job creation in distressed communities. Potential investments must be market-based, proactive,

EDA public works and infrastructure projects awarded in FY 1998 and completed by September 30, 2002, created or retained 12,898 jobs. maximize private capital investment, create higher-skill, higher-wage jobs, and offer a positive return on the taxpayer's investment.

Recent program evaluations (Rutgers University, et. al., 1997) document long-term outcomes for EDA public

works projects, defense adjustment construction, and revolving loan funds grants. These evaluations show that program results (i.e., permanent jobs created or retained or private-sector dollars invested) can be quantified at project completion, typically three years following the grant award, and that these results increase substantially over the next six years (typically nine years after grant award). Based on these findings, EDA sets performance targets and obtains data at project completion and at three-year intervals thereafter, to a maximum of nine years following the grant award. EDA reports actual results as data becomes available for each reporting period.

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Results – (1) Job creation or retention

FY 2001 Target

5,400 jobs by FY 2001 resulting from public works projects approved in FY 1998 (first interval target). Future targets for FY 1998 grants are 27,000 jobs by FY 2004 and 54,000 jobs by FY 2007.

FY 2001 Actual

12,898 jobs were reported for public works projects approved in FY 1998 that were completed on or before September 30, 2001 (first reporting interval).

FY 2004 Target for projects funded in FY 2001

FY 2001 grantees will begin reporting in FY 2004. It is projected that 14,400 will be created or retained by FY 2004 as a result of public works and infrastructure projects approved in FY 2001. Future targets for FY 2001 grants are 36,000 jobs by FY 2007 and 72,000 jobs by FY 2010.

Results – (2) Private sector investment

FY 2001 Target

EDA projects that \$130 million in private-sector investments will be generated by FY 2001 for public works projects approved in FY 1998. Future targets for FY 1998 grants are \$650 million in private-sector investments by FY 2004 and \$1.3 billion in private-sector investments by FY 2007.

EDA estimates that over 14,400 jobs will be created or retained by FY 2004 as a result of public works and infrastructure investments approved in FY 2001. Future targets for FY 2001 investments are 36,000 jobs by FY 2007 and 72,000 jobs by FY 2010.

^{*} FY 2001 GPRA performance targets are based on the anticipated results of the public works and development investments based on a formula derived from a study done by Rutgers University. The study compiled and analyzed the performance of EDA public works projects after nine years. The formula-driven calculation projects the private-sector investment and jobs data at three-, six-, and nine-year intervals from the date of the investment award. Performance results reported here reflect a discount to provide a margin of attrition for the possible change in economic conditions over the nine-year period, pending final review and analysis of performance data reported by EDA grantees.

FY 2001 Actual

For public works investments approved in FY 1998, and completed before September 30, 2001, private-sector investments of \$971 million were generated in FY 2001.

FY 2004 Target for Private Investments Funded in FY 2001

FY 2001 grantees will begin reporting in FY 2004. \$480 million in private investment is projected by FY 2004 for public works and infrastructure projects approved in FY 2001 (first interval target). Future targets for FY 2001

EDA projects \$480 million in privatesector investments by FY 2004 for public works and infrastructure projects approved in FY 2001. Future targets for FY 2001 grants are \$1.2 billion in private investment by FY 2007 and \$2.4 billion in private investment by FY 2010. grants are \$1.2 billion in private investment by FY 2007 and \$2.4 billion in private investment by FY 2010.

Analysis

Actual results of FY 1998 grants are being reported for the first time. The results for these performance measures over the last two years show that twenty percent of the projected jobs and private investments were realized

within the first three years. Accordingly, EDA increased the three-year targets to twenty percent. EDA continues to analyze actual job creation and private investment results to collect data prior to modifying the target further. Actual results reported here reflect a twenty-five percent discount to provide a margin of attrition, pending final review and analysis of performance data reported by EDA grantees. Further adjustments will be analyzed upon receipt of future job creation and retention and private investment results.

Source and Verification

EDA policies and procedures to obtain and verify data on long-term program outcomes are consistent with methodology used by Rutgers University, et al., for

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conducting the Public Works Program: Performance Evaluation (May, 1997) and the Defense Adjustment Program: Performance Evaluation (November, 1997). These evaluations provide the baseline used to develop EDA performance targets for the creation and retention of jobs and private sector investment. To provide more complete information on long-term outcomes, EDA sponsored two GPRA pilot reviews (Rutgers University, et al., 1999) to refine reporting methods and obtain data on a second set of projects. The GPRA Pilot I and II reports include an in-depth examination of construction and revolving loan fund projects.

The data reported for private sector investment in FY 2001 had several projects with an unusually large amount of private investment that EDA believes are anomalous and account for the significant difference between the target and actual results.

Performance Measure: Percentage of investments in areas of highest distress

EDA actively encourages proposals from distressed communities and directs program and staff resources to assist these communities in developing viable proposals and plans for successful development projects. Areas of highest distress are defined in part as those areas where the 24-month unemployment rate is at least 180 percent of the national average or where per capita income is not more than 60 percent of the national average. Disaster areas and Indian tribal areas are also classified as highest distress. The public works, economic adjustment infrastructure, and revolving loan fund investments made in communities of highest distress reflect EDA's success in achieving its goals for private investment and job creation.

Results

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Analysis

With 43 percent of EDA's funding going to areas of highest distress, the target of 40 percent was exceeded by eight percent. The measure of EDA investments in areas of highest distress has surpassed its performance target for three consecutive years following implementation of the Economic Development Administration Reform Act of 1998, P.L. 105-393. The FY 2002 target, however, is maintained at 40 percent for several reasons. First the impact of the current economic contraction is unknown. Second, EDA is in the process of determining optimum investment portfolio mix, which is critical to the overall impact of EDA's limited resources. While EDA's assistance is available to many communities across the nation, targeting more than 40 percent to a specific category of applicants significantly reduces the ability of other deserving, but less distressed, grantees to compete for assistance.

Source and Verification

EDA uses statistics from the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) for per capita income (PCI), and the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) for 24-month unemployment data in determining distress conditions. BEA provides quarterly updates on unemployment statistics at the county, city and Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) levels. A community may qualify for EDA assistance using distress data from other sources such as the Bureau of Indian Affairs, state or specific census tracts, all of which are verified by EDA prior to investment.

EDA PERFORMANCE GOAL: Build community capacity to achieve and sustain economic growth

Economic development is a local process. However the federal government plays an important role by helping distressed communities develop the means to identify and overcome barriers that inhibit economic growth. EDA's approach is to support local planning and long-term partnerships with state and regional organizations that can assist distressed communities with strategic planning and investment activities. This

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process helps local communities set priorities, determine the viability of potential projects, and leverage outside resources to improve the local economy and sustain long-term economic growth.

EDA is proud of its active partnership with our economic development partners at the state, regional, and local level. The partnership approach to economic development is an important key to effectively and efficiently addressing the economic development challenges facing our nation's communities. EDA continues to build upon its partnerships with local development officials; economic development districts; university centers; faith-based and community-based organizations; and other local, state, and federal agencies. More importantly, EDA will also forge new and strategic working partnerships with private capital markets and seek new and innovative ways to spur economic development.

EDA planning funds support the preparation of Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies (CEDS), which guide EDA investments for public works and economic adjustment implementation investments, including revolving loan funds. Sound local planning also attracts other federal, state, and local funds, as well as private sector investment, to implement long-term development strategies. Evaluations of EDA's public works and defense adjustment programs show that EDA planning and technical assistance programs play a significant role in the successful completion and outcomes of its infrastructure and revolving loan fund projects.

Performance Measure: Percentage of local technical assistance and economic adjustment strategy investments in areas of highest distress

Local technical assistance grants offer specialized technical or professional services to local officials and community groups, including assistance to evaluate investment opportunities. Economic adjustment strategy grants help local communities adjust to sudden and severe economic dislocations and long-term declines in key industry sectors that severely impact local economies. Areas of highest distress include those areas where the 24-month unemployment rate is at least 180 percent of the national

average or per capita income is not more than 60 percent of the national average, as well as disaster areas and Indian tribal areas.

Results

Analysis

With 32 percent of EDA's funding going to areas of highest distress, the target of 30 per cent was exceeded by seven percent. FY 2001 results indicate that our regional offices identify areas of highest distress and respond to sudden and severe economic dislocations. The FY 2002 target, however, is maintained at 30 percent for several reasons. First, the impact of the current economic contraction is unknown. Second, EDA is in the process of determining an optimum investment portfolio mix, which is critical to the overall impact of EDA's limited resources. While EDA's assistance is available to many communities across the nation, targeting more than 30 percent to a specific category of applicants significantly reduces the ability of other deserving, but less distressed, grantees to compete for assistance.

Source and Verification

EDA uses statistics from the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) for per capita income (PCI), and the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) for 24-month unemployment data in determining the distress conditions nationwide as previously specified on page 6.

II. Management Controls and Future Initiatives

President Bush's Management Agenda

EDA has developed initiatives and prioritized resources to help accomplish the challenges noted previously and to advance the President's Management Agenda, including the following:

- Strategic management of human capital;
- Competitive sourcing;
- Improved financial performance;
- Expanded electronic government; and,
- Budget and performance integration.

These initiatives provide an integrated approach to positioning EDA to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

EDA Workforce Analysis: Major Issues and Challenges

The downturn in the economy, begun in late 2001 and exacerbated by the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, and other factors, poses the most significant challenge to EDA in the near future. As more American communities encounter economic dislocation, EDA must work harder to target its limited resources to address the growing need for assistance in the most productive manner possible.

These challenges are tied to EDA's long-standing need to better-align its resources with its priorities. Recognizing the need for a restructuring of EDA, the last Administration began efforts to develop an organization better-suited to its mission. Their efforts included the commissioning of a major workforce analysis conducted by the consulting firm Booz-Allen & Hamilton and the drafting of alternate Ζ

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organization structures, including the decentralization of EDA primary program responsibilities to the regions.

As this Administration takes responsibility for EDA's future, we commit to build upon the work done prior to our arrival. To advance EDA into an organization better-equipped to address the challenges of economic development in the 21st century, we seek to accomplish the following initiatives:

- Strengthen the decentralization of EDA to enhance the closeness of EDA's programs to the communities they serve;
- Enhance the human resources of EDA's six regional offices to better our outreach in America's distressed communities;
- Streamline EDA's organizational structure in EDA Headquarters, by eliminating duplicative functions;
- Focus efforts of EDA Headquarters, on responsibilities best centralized, such as policy development, communication, and administrative functions;
- Upgrade the skills of EDA's employees to provide them the tools necessary to become effective and efficient deliverers of the federal government's economic development components; and,
- Identify, support and broadly disseminate the latest in useful, cutting-edge research focused on economic development theory and practice.

EDA Workforce Analysis

In June 2001, EDA completed the first management improvement initiative, the Booz-Allen & Hamilton workforce analysis, consisting of the five following sections: Supply Analysis; Skills Analysis; Gap Analysis; Workload Analysis; and, a Recommendations Report. These analyses provide EDA's managers with the following benefits:

 Information for an efficient and accurate alignment of the workforce with the organization's goals, objectives and priorities;

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- Strategic basis for managers to make human resource decisions;
- Foundation to assist EDA with focused cross-organizational placement, training, retraining and recruiting; and,
- Strategic method for addressing present and anticipated workforce issues.

The report identified three strategic recommendations to address critical agencywide issues as follows:

- EDA should *re-establish the strategic context of the agency* to address issues of mission, vision and overall strategy;
- EDA should *examine and improve its workflow processes* so that gaps in quality and services are diminished and inefficiencies caused by redundant processes are eliminated; and,
- EDA should *implement a competency-based human resource system* to tie employee's competencies and behaviors to the organization's redefined mission and strategic goals.

Audits of EDA by Department of Commerce Inspector General

Financial Statement Audit FY 2001

In FY 2001, EDA did not have a separate audit, but was audited as part of the Department's Consolidated Audit. EDA had two recommendations under the Reportable Condition: Financial Management and Reporting Needs Improvement. The first recommendation was that EDA ensure that all adjustments to the general ledger are adequately documented and appropriately captured in FACTS II. The second was that EDA use the most recent SF-133 crosswalk to accurately comply with requirements of the departments of The Treasury and Commerce. This is a significant improvement over the FY2000 audit, in which EDA had one material weakness, two reportable conditions and one instance of material non-compliance with financial management system requirements under the Federal Financial Management Improvement Act.

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Financial Electronic Data Processing (EDP) Audit FY 2001

EDA undergoes an annual financial audit as part of the Department's Consolidated Audit that involves all financial systems and the network environment. The audit involves reviewing security documents, conducting interviews and possibly probing or scanning the application network. Information security testing is an important component of an Information Technology (IT) audit because it helps determine if security controls are in fact operating as intended. The department's consolidated financial EDP audit for FY 2001 resulted in only four recommendations for EDA related to access controls and segregation of duties. This was a significant improvement over the FY 2000 audit. The final FY 2001 EDP audit report specifically states that all recommendations from the FY 2000 audit were reviewed, corrective action taken, and all were closed.

Information Technology Upgrade

EDA has used a one-time reprogramming to upgrade its IT systems and capabilities. Although EDA successfully converted its three legacy systems, Financial Accounting, Loan Billing and Management System (LBMS) and the Operations Planning and Control System (OPCS) for Y2K, there were many requirements that had to be deferred. In FY 2001, EDA awarded contracts to accomplish the following initiatives:

Network migration project

- Awarded contracts to replace the outdated Banyan network mail system with industry standard Microsoft network and migrated EDA's mail system to Microsoft Outlook.
- Awarded contracts to introduce industry standard communications technology that enables on-line collaboration among headquarters, regional offices and economic development representative staff.

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OPCS Data Dictionary Project

Major Information System User Documentation Project

 Developed hard copy and on-line end-user documentation for the OPCS, LBMS and Audit Tracking systems

Infrastructure and Systems Performance Analysis Project

 Conducted analyses of performance and response time on OPCS, LBMS, the Commerce Administrative Management System (CAMS) and the operating environment to deliver specific recommendations on system and operating environment improvement and optimization. This project ensures a stable, responsive infrastructure for incorporation of future state-of-theart technologies

Major Information Systems Enhancement Project

Initiated enhancements to the OPCS, LBMS, CAMS

Audits of EDA Investments

During FY 2001, EDA and the Office of the Inspector General (OIG), Department of Commerce, agreed on an audit plan that identified risk factors for EDA infrastructure development and revolving loan fund (RLF) investments. Together, these investments account for over 90 percent of EDA's active portfolio. As a result, the OIG is actively auditing EDA construction projects with delayed start or completion dates and RLF awards with unexpended funds or questionable program performance.

During the final quarter of FY 2001, EDA tested and deployed a new audit tracking system and conducted a thorough review of case files for unresolved and unimplemented audits. For a summary of OIG audit activity by type of investment see Table 1.

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To address the increased case load, EDA developed and issued new guidance to EDA regional offices on audit resolution and follow-up process. A major goal for FY 2002 is to improve the quality and timeliness of EDA's response to OIG audit findings and to reduce the backlog of unimplemented audits carried over from prior FYs. This will require new management controls to better safeguard EDA investments and improve program performance. The new management system will include specialized training for EDA staff and regular briefings for EDA's Senior Executive Team.

A major goal for FY 2002 is to improve the quality and timeliness of EDA's response to OIG audit findings and to reduce the backlog of unimplemented audits carried over from prior FYs. This will require new management controls to better safeguard EDA investments and improve program performance.

GAO Information Technology Security Review FY 2001

GAO performed an on-site technical review of IT security in February 2001, as part of a department-wide review. The GAO team examined the principal network nodes of the EDA local and wide area network (WAN), our connection to the Internet through the Office of the Secretary, and our UNIX-based application servers in the EDA network. In addition, the GAO team reviewed configurations, and probed and scanned EDA's WAN to determine vulnerabilities that could be exploited by an EDA employee or hacker who accessed the EDA network. A number of vulnerabilities, both confirmed and potential, were discovered. All vulnerabilities were corrected by the end of March 2001. All recommendations were implemented that were associated with the Banyan Interconnect Server and all Cisco devices by the end of March 2001.

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Economic Development Communications and Operations Management System (EDCOMS)

EDA recognizes that Information Technology (IT) plays a vital role in carrying out all facets of its mission. EDA's IT vision is to establish the preeminent Virtual Economic Development Community. EDA's IT strategic goals are to:

- Establish a virtual economic development environment;
- Improve productivity and efficiency through use of IT;
- Provide a dynamic repository of economic development information;
- Assure security, reliability, and compatibility are at the forefront of all IT activities; and,
- Enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of IT resources.

A key component of EDA's IT program is the development of the Economic Development Communications and Operations Management System (EDCOMS), which will enable EDA to integrate existing key component systems and introduce new technologies such as web and Public Key Infrastructure (PKI). EDCOMS will provide the necessary tools and secure infrastructure to support the programs and activities of the agency, as mandated in EDA's legislation, while also complying with other federal information technology legislation, such as Government Paperwork Reduction Act, Government Performance and Results Act, and the Federal Financial Assistance Management Improvement Act. The agency-wide system will support EDA's entire grants management cycle, beginning with the assessment of need for assistance, through budget analysis and information dissemination to potential grantees, grant awards, processing and management, and finally to assessing and reporting performance results.

Through the use of web technologies, EDA envisions a virtual community where ideas, best practices, and innovations can be shared and where practitioners, experts and communities develop synergy and collaboration.

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The first phase of EDCOMS will develop and implement the Economic Development Portal, promote the secure, dynamic exchange and dissemination of economic development information and services, enable the migration from paperbased forms submission and reporting to web-enabled, electronic processing. The system will integrate existing grant accounting and management systems. It will enhance the security of EDA's system and communications infrastructure to assure integrity and reliability of information.

EDCOMS directly supports Section 502 of the EDA Reform Act of 1998 – "EDA shall maintain a central information clearinghouse on matters relating to economic development, economic adjustment, disaster recovery, defense conversion, and trade adjustment programs and activities by providing to interested persons, communities, industries, and businesses technical information, market research, or other forms of assistance, information or advice that would be useful in alleviating or preventing conditions of excessive unemployment or underemployment in the areas."

EDA continues to use technology to support its strategy of electronic processing and management, further contributing to the government-wide effort to facilitate and streamline the grant application and reporting process. EDA's electronic processing will incorporate web, PKI, and imaging technologies to enable on-line pre-application and applications processing for all grant programs; further integrate the agency's operations planning and control system and grants accounting systems; incorporate electronic payment functionality; and employ web technologies to provide mechanisms for on-line data collection and reporting.

EDCOMS will help EDA achieve its mission by facilitating the exchange of information and fostering communication, which in turn generates collaboration between recipients; stakeholders; and local, state and federal partners. EDCOMS will enable a more efficient and effective investment development and administrative process, thus improving customer service and improving investment results. Ζ

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Three Pillars of EDA Reform

EDA developed its three pillars of reform after careful study of the following documents: recommendations in the Booz Allen and Hamilton workforce analysis; the President's Management Agenda; audit reports prepared by the Department of Commerce's Inspector General; and, the recommendations from GAO's on-site technical review of IT security, which recognized the vital role of IT.

The execution of the three pillars of EDA reform will enable EDA to become the premier standard bearer for domestic economic development, thus moving from a culture of compliance to a culture of performance. These pillars will guide EDA from operating with a processor of grants philosophy to an investment philosophy. EDA will focus on results.

Pillar One: Organizational management initiatives

Alignment of resources: Ensure maximum alignment of existing financial and human resources to accomplish our mission through restructuring and effective deployment of resources.

Key EDA Initiative:

1. Approval and implementation of EDA's proposed reorganization.

Management process: Develop standard operating procedures at headquarters to reduce inefficiencies and duplication of efforts. Identify best practices in our regional offices, implement standard operating procedures among the regions,

Alignment of resources: Ensure maximum alignment of existing financial and human resources to accomplish our mission through restructuring and effective deployment of resources. articulate clear investment policy guidelines to ensure due diligence on the front end of investment approval and require rigorous post-approval monitoring to ensure the maximum return on taxpayer investment. Implement process improvements through the e-grants component of the Economic Development Communications and Operations Management System (EDCOMS).

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Key EDA Initiatives:

- 1. Approval and implementation of EDA's proposed reorganization.
- 2. Comprehensive process and organization structure analysis.
- 3. Upgrade of EDA's use of technology and adoption of e-government.

Competency based human resource system: Build the foundation of a competencybased human resource system through rigorous personnel performance reviews, clear performance plans that set high standards and recruitment and training strategies to provide necessary skills.

Key EDA Initiatives:

- 1. Approval and implementation of EDA's proposed reorganization.
- Rigorous adherence to established Department of Commerce and Office of Personnel Management performance standards and processes.

Pillar Two: Performance measures

Balanced scorecard: The second pillar is based on performance measures. EDA will invest in Balanced Scorecard training for all managers and supervisors and will develop and implement an EDA Balanced Scorecard.

Outcome funding: EDA is moving forward with the implementation of outcome funding for its grant programs. Policy for investment guidelines has been issued and implemented. Investments will be based on risk and expected return and will focus on outcomes such as leveraging private-sector and local dollars, and creating higher-skill, higher-wage jobs.

Outcome oriented performance measures: EDA will develop new outcome performance measures for its capacity-building programs, and discontinue certain interim and process measures.

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Key EDA Initiatives:

- 1. Development and implementation of EDA Balanced Scorecard.
- 2. Development and implementation of EDA's Investment Policy Guidelines.
- 3. Instill a "performance culture" at all levels of EDA.

Pillar Three: Communication

Congressional and public affairs: To communicate with key stakeholders and customers in a compelling, multi-faceted way, EDA will enhance and strengthen congressional, state, and local government affairs, and public and media relations.

EDCOMS: Implementation of the Economic Development Information Clearinghouse (EDIC) component of EDCOMS will expand and enhance EDA's communication of best practices in the field of economic development, information on developing trends and issues, technical advice, and the success stories of EDA's investments, through use of the World-Wide Web.

Key EDA Initiatives:

- 1. Approval and implementation of EDA's proposed reorganization.
- 2. Upgrade EDA's use of technology and adoption of e-government.

EDA's three pillars of reform identify best practices in our regional offices, implement standard operating procedures among the regions, articulate clear investment policy guidelines to ensure due diligence on the front end of the project cycle and require rigorous post-approval monitoring to ensure the maximum return on taxpayer investment.

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III. Programs of the Economic Development Administration

Public Works and Development Facilities Program

The Public Works and Development Facilities Program, i.e., Public Works Program, empowers communities experiencing economic decline and distress to revitalize, expand, and upgrade their physical infrastructure to attract new industry, encourage business expansion, diversify local economies, and support the generation or retention of higher-skill, higher-wage jobs and investments.

The Public Works Program supports locally initiated and developed projects that encourage long-term economic self-sufficiency and global competitiveness. Examples of infrastructure and development facility investments supported by this program include water and sewer system improvements, skill-training facilities, industrial and

business parks, industrial access roads, port and harbor improvements, business incubator facilities, multi-tenant manufacturing facilities, and tourism facilities.

Public Works investments are awarded to states, cities, or other political subdivisions; special purpose units of government; Indian tribes; and public or private non-profit organizations working in cooperation with a local political subdivision. The investments leveraged by Public Works investments support a variety of specific economic development strategies, including technology-led; entrepreneurial; cluster-based; aquaculture development; diversification of natural resource-dependent economies; community and faith-based economic development; distance learning facilities; export development programs; commercialization and deployment of innovative technologies; and the redevelopment of brownfield sites.



EDA announced a \$2.5 million investment awarded to the Apollo Theater of New York City to assist in the restoration of this famed Harlem landmark. The economy of central Harlem suffered as a result of the deterioration of the Apollo Theater. By restoring the Apollo to world-class status, this EDA investment will assist in restoring not only Harlem's cultural activities but also its economy and tourism.

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
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The Cumbres & **Toltec Scenic** Railroad Commission was Ζ awarded an 0 \$800,000 EDA investment for major upgrades along the H narrow-gauge track and railbed of the Cumbres & Toltec Ľ Scenic Railroad H (C&TSRR), owned jointly by Colorado and New Mexico and providing daily trips between the two states from May to Σ October. The C&TSRR is a living museum of late \checkmark nineteenth century railroading and its E structures, sites and equipment are on the Ζ National Register of Historic Places. 
Public Works investments may also be used to upgrade or expand a region's economic infrastructure to support the next generation industry or commerce, such of as telecommunications infrastructure and other sustainable development activities including ecoindustrial parks. Whenever possible, the program seeks to redevelop existing facilities and rehabilitate older industrial and commercial sites rather than developing greenfield sites, because such investments promote sustainable economic

development by taking advantage of readily available infrastructure, labor force, and markets.

Investment Eligibility for Public Works Assistance

To be eligible for consideration an investment must be located in an economically distressed area or, in the case of an investment located in a non-distressed area, it must provide substantial direct benefits to an economically disadvantaged area. In accordance with EDA's mission and authorizing legislation, distress is established by demonstrating one of the following criteria: high unemployment (at least one percent above the national average over a two-year period); low per capita income (80 percent or less of the national average per capita income); or other economic indicators defined as "special need" (e.g., substantial out-migration, underemployment, natural or other major disasters, extraordinary depletion of natural resources, or destructive impacts of foreign trade).

Additionally, an investment must also satisfy all of the following: 1) be consistent with a locally developed Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) that has been prepared for the area in which it will be located and that has broad community support; 2) improve opportunities for the successful establishment or expansion of industrial or commercial facilities in the area where it will be located;



3) fulfill a pressing need of the area and be started and completed in a timely manner; 4) not result in an increase of goods or services that exist in the market area;5) have the required local matching share committed and available at the time of approval; and, 6) benefit the long-term unemployed and members of low-income families who are residents of the area to be served by the investment.

Analysis of Public Works Investments

In FY 2001, 282 Public Works investments were approved for a total amount of \$285,286,196. The investment amounts ranged from a low of \$51,800 to a high of \$4,680,983. The average investment was \$1,011,653 and the median was \$990,000.

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

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EDA's Public Works and Development Facilities Program helps America's distressed communities and regions, both rural and urban, overcome the problem of aging and inadequate infrastructure that is preventing economic growth from taking place and



to achieve lasting economic improvement through the creation of higher- skill, higher-wage private-sector jobs.

The investments focused on twenty-five different initiatives, including the following: entrepreneurial development, clean water, enterprise zones, export development, technological innovation, historic preservation, sustainable development, empowerment zones, brownfields redevelopment, diversification of natural resource-based economies, forest initiative, flood plain, defense adjustment, disaster response,


eco-industrial development, welfare-to-work, enterprise communities, eco-tourism, energy-related infrastructure, product recycling, Mississippi Delta, Hurricane Floyd

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recovery operations, Southwest Border, American Heritage River, and pre-disaster mitigation activities.

The distribution of FY 2001 Public Works funds by the type of recipient was as follows: city government \$142,266,036; county government \$36,993,452; public non-profit organization \$35,391,833; special purpose unit \$28,089,000; college or university \$14,717,107; Indian tribe \$8,428,427; private non-profit \$2,795,100; state government and organizations \$5,057,507; and numerous other entities not otherwise classified above amounting to \$11,547,734.

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Brownfields Redevelopment

EDA supports the revitalization and reuse of idle and abandoned industrial land and facilities, known as brownfields, and has done so for the past 36 years as a core component of its mission to aid the nation's most economically distressed communities.

Brownfields redevelopment refers to the reuse of abandoned, idled, or underused industrial and commercial sites where expansion or redevelopment is complicated by real or perceived environmental contamination. Although brownfields may, at times, be more expensive to develop than "greenfields" (i.e., previously underdeveloped land), because of the need to assess the conditions of the site and sometimes reclaim the land, they offer many other competitive development advantages, as well as environmental benefits.

Benefits of Brownfields Redevelopment

Brownfields locations are attractive to private companies due to their proximity to transportation systems such as highways, rail lines, and rivers; markets, including both suppliers and customers; and readily available labor pools. Other brownfields redevelopment benefits include access to land with existing capital assets (e.g., buildings, power and telecommunications infrastructure, water, sewer, etc.), the availability of economic incentives, and unique redevelopment opportunities such as historic sites. Public-sector benefits include job creation, increased tax revenues, reduced urban sprawl, mitigation of health hazards, community and environmental stewardship, crime reduction, and prevention and elimination of neighborhood blight.

EDA's Public Works program investments help to revitalize, upgrade, and expand the physical infrastructure that is commonly needed for brownfields redevelopment. Such investments include the rehabilitation and reuse of older publicly-owned buildings, as well as the construction of new facilities on reclaimed sites.

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Analysis of Brownfields Redevelopment Investments

Fifty-eight brownfields redevelopment investments totaling \$54,625,831 were approved by EDA in FY 2001 and 31 of these, totaling \$37,619,931, were Public Works investments.

Native American and Alaska Natives

EDA has a long history of support for the economic development of Native American communities and Alaska Native villages. EDA has provided over threequarters of a billion dollars in assistance to native communities to promote and support their economic development from 1965 through 2001.

Analysis of EDA Investments to Native Communities

In FY 2001, fourteen Public Works investments amounting to \$8,428,427 were made to Native American and Alaska Native tribal governments and included funding for the following: construction of buildings to house tribally-owned manufacturing companies and commercial businesses; construction of workforce skill-training facilities; construction and equipping of distance-learning facilities on reservations and tribally owned lands; and such facilities as cargo docks and cold storage facilities to enable Native American tribes and Alaskan Native villages to capitalize on the local availability of renewable natural resources. Including all EDA programs, 102 investments amounting to \$22,894,607 were awarded to Native American and Alaska Native tribal governments.

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Construction to expand the water treatment plant in the city of Grayson, Kentucky is depicted in this in-progress photograph. This \$4.6 million expansion project, partially funded with an EDA investment of \$1 million, will increase the capacity of the plant to 3 million gallons of water daily. Such increased capacity will support economic development by providing water to industrial customers during periods of peak demand.

Economic Adjustment Program

The Economic Adjustment program offers a flexible set of economic development tools for communities facing the most severe of economic crises, namely the temporary or permanent change of the local or regional economic structural base. While the fundamentals of the U.S. economy are strong, radical economic change at the local level is surprisingly more common than one would suspect and is precipitated by both long-term trends and sudden economic events. Such devastating economic impacts may be more readily recognized by other labels such as defense downsizing, catastrophic natural or terrorist disasters, the Pacific Northwest Timber Initiative, the Alaska-Norton Sound Fisheries economic crises or the long-term decline in the Appalachian region coal industry. In other communities, the actual or threatened closure of a principal industry or company due to trade competition can seriously threatens the economic survival of the local community.


The only assistance at the federal level for many of these communities continues to be EDA's Economic Adjustment program. Communities are empowered at the



grass-roots level through EDA's investments in regional strategic plans, assisting them in rethinking their economic future and developing action plans to stabilize their local economies and to grow in new and sustainable directions. The program can also fund critical portions of the local action plans with essential infrastructure, technical assistance for business transitions and local capacity building, and revolving loan funds to help jump-start new competitive businesses.

The Economic Adjustment program predominately supports the following three types of investment activities:

- Strategy or capacity-building investments that help communities organize and carry out a planning process resulting in a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). As in other EDA programs, an EDAapproved CEDS is a prerequisite for an economic adjustment implementation or revolving loan fund investment;
- Implementation investments, including: construction of public works facilities; technical assistance; disaster mitigation assistance; and local capacity building investments that support one or more activities identified in an EDA-approved CEDS; and,
- Revolving Loan Fund investments that capitalize an intermediary to make loans to local businesses that otherwise cannot access commercial credit.

Eligibility Criteria for Economic Adjustment Program Investments

EDA economic adjustment assistance may be awarded if an area meets any one of the following economic distress factors: high unemployment; low per capita income; disaster declaration; plant closures and layoffs; outmigration,

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underemployment, military base closure or defense contracting cuts; extraordinary depletion of natural resources; negative impacts of foreign trade; or other special need.

Analysis of Economic Adjustment Program Investments

The Economic Adjustment program received an appropriation of \$49,520,000 in FY 2001.

Additionally, \$21,000 in EDA FY 2001 Defense Adjustment appropriation was reprogrammed to EDA's Economic Adjustment Program giving a total of approximately \$49,541,000. Strategy or capacity-building investments accounted for 42.4 percent of the Economic Adjustment Assistance budget with 164 investments awarded. Implementation or construction investments accounted for 49.3 percent of the program budget with thirty-two investments. Revolving Loan Funds (RLF) received 8.3 percent of the program allocation with nine investments awarded to RLFs.

Post Disaster Economic Recovery

Chapter III: Programs of the Economic Development Administration

Areas of Special Interest

For the eighth consecutive year, EDA's Economic Adjustment Program supported communities in Oregon, Washington, and California under the Pacific Northwest Timber Initiative with investments totaling \$2 million. EDA continues to fill a critical gap in this congressionally supported initiative by funding local capacity-building activities, such as economic adjustment strategies and technical assistance investments. Additionally, EDA awarded investments totaling \$2 million for the Alaskan Timber Initiative, and assisted communities in six states affected by declines in Appalachian coal and southeastern timber with investments totaling \$9.5 million.

Construction

Response to the September 11, 2001, Terrorist Attack on the World Trade Center

Within two weeks of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attack on the New York World Trade Center, EDA worked with New York City and the state of New York to determine that the Empire State Development Corporation (ESDC) was the best entity to administer the EDA investment. ESDC is a public benefit corporation of the state of New York.



Approximately half of the EDA investment provides analysis and recommendations for development of the financial services, insurance, and real estate industries in Lower Manhattan, and for the preparation of a strategic plan that would provide analysis and recommendations to enhance the value of Lower Manhattan as a tourism destination.

Following the disaster, ESDC created a subsidiary organization, the Lower Manhattan Development Corporation (LMDC), and charged LMDC with the rebuilding of Lower Manhattan. The balance of the flexible EDA investment will be used by ESDC for critical economic recovery unmet needs as identified by LMDC and local officials.

Hurricane Floyd and Other Disasters

Supplemental Appropriation

On July 13, 2000, Public Law 106-246 appropriated to EDA \$55.8 million in a FY 2000 emergency supplemental appropriation for economic adjustment assistance to support disaster recovery programs in



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affected states and local communities recovering from the consequences of Hurricane Floyd and other recent disasters. Of the \$55.8 million, \$5.9 million was made available to assist communities impacted by other recent disasters.

EDA Investments from Supplemental Appropriations

In FY 2001, EDA awarded, from FY 2000 emergency supplemental appropriations,

investments totaling \$51.1 million in fifty-one communities. Examples of these investments include the following:

- Somerset County, New Jersey, received an EDA investment of \$6.8 million for street improvements including the reconstruction of a traffic rotary in the Boroughs of Bound Brook and South Bound Brook, respectively. The Boroughs were two of the hardest hit municipalities flooded by Hurricane Floyd. The extensive economic losses sustained by the Borough of Pound Brook alone were cited at \$77 million, excluding payroll losses. Approximately 148 businesses suffered direct impact from flooding and all downtown businesses suffered moderate to severe flood damage. The two Boroughs projected a minimum of 300 new long-term jobs as a result of the EDA investment.
- City of Franklin, Virginia, received an EDA investment of \$2 million to renovate a building to be used as a business incubator; demolish the City Hall complex and make site improvements for flood mitigation; renovate the Public Safety Building for flood mitigation and modernization; improve downtown infrastructure; and perform other, associated work. The flooding caused by Hurricane Floyd was particularly devastating to affected states and


local communities recovering from the consequences of Hurricane Floyd and other recent disasters. Of the \$55.8 million, \$5.9 million was made available to assist communities impacted by other recent disasters.

• Town of Tarboro, North Carolina, received an EDA investment of \$1.7 million for improvements to its water system damaged by Hurricane Floyd. Located in Edgecombe County, one of the state's most distressed counties, Tarboro and nearby Princeville experienced 14 inches of rain within three days. The Tar River crested 24 feet above flood stage, leaving most of Tarboro under water for over a week. The County sustained damages to businesses and infrastructure in excess of \$600 million. The EDA investment is projected to create 84 new jobs, save 104 jobs, and promote the economic growth of Edgecombe County.

Norton Sound Fisheries Disaster

Poor salmon returns devastated Native fishing villages bordering Alaska's Norton

Sound and triggered the August 8, 2000, Disaster Declaration by the Secretary of Commerce under the Section 312(a) of the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act. On September 20, 2000, EDA announced the availability of a \$10 million special appropriation, reduced to \$9.97 million after recission for economic adjustment assistance for communities adversely affected by the Norton Sound fisheries disaster.



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

During FY 2001, EDA awarded ten investments serving nine Native Alaskan Villages bringing Norton Sound, totaling \$7.9 million. The balance of the funds will be



obligated for additional investments in FYs 2002-2003. An example of the economic diversification achieved by these investments follows:

The Native Village of Unalakleet, located on Norton Sound at the mouth of the Unalakleet River, received an EDA investment of \$1.1 million for construction of a multi-purpose community facility providing a meeting hall, office space, visitor industry facilities, gift shop, computer server

and training rooms and other functions. Ten to twelve jobs will be created during the construction phase and approximately 25 other jobs will be created or retained. Unalakleet expects to generate revenue from office space rental to the North Slope Health Corporation, government agency offices, and Kawerek, Inc., a Native non-profit corporation serving Norton Sound villages.

Disaster Mitigation

Disaster mitigation and EDA's Disaster Resistant Jobs initiative fall within the Economic Adjustment Program. Disaster Mitigation provides pre-disaster planning and technical assistance for disaster-prone communities to take actions to mitigate against the adverse impacts of future disasters on the local economy. The result is a local economy that can better withstand the effects of natural disasters and insure the continuity of businesses and jobs. In FY 2001, EDA awarded \$4.016 million for 36 disaster mitigation investments in 25 states that leveraged an additional \$2.634 million in matching funds investments, totaling approximately \$6.650 million.



EDA funded disaster mitigation investments are locally directed community activities that contribute to permanent solutions to reductions in job-loss and promote the protection of economic vitality in hazard-prone communities.

Disaster Resistant Jobs Training

For two and one-half years, EDA has co-sponsored the *Disaster Resistant Jobs* training course offered at FEMA's National Emergency Management Institute located in Emmitsburg, Maryland. The unique three-day training places state and local emergency managers and community economic developers together with senior EDA, FEMA and private-sector instructors to better understand each other's expertise and perspective. Participants learn how emergency managers and economic developers can, and why they must, work together in their own communities to effectively reduce public as well as business costs and losses from future disasters, thereby stabilizing jobs and local economies.





This chart includes 205 Economic Adjustment investments, 39 Defense Adjustment investments and 74 Disaster Assistance investments.

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Defense Adjustment Program

The end of the Cold War precipitated a reduction of the nation's military force structure. Congress approved four Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) rounds in 1988, 1991, 1993, and 1995 to close military bases throughout the United States, while the defense industry, at the same time, experienced significant contract cancellations or reductions.

Since 1992, EDA has awarded \$646 million defense adjustment investments, including 385 investments in approximately 113 counties across 38 states affected by 103 base closures. Additionally, EDA received approximately \$274 million from the Department of Defense and \$8 million from the Department of Energy appropriations for specially targeted defense adjustment projects.

Analysis of Defense Adjustment Investments

In FY 2001, EDA's Defense Adjustment program received an appropriation of \$31,380,810 plus an additional \$22,026,512 that was transferred in from the Department of Defense for a total of \$53,407,322. EDA reprogrammed \$56,000 to other Economic Development Assistance Program accounts. Of the remaining \$53.3 million, EDA applied \$791,000 for five defense related Trade Adjustment Assistance Centers and seven University Centers by combining defense funds with other program funds, and \$52.5 million for thirty-nine defense adjustment investments. Over ninety percent of the latter amount funded twenty-five investments for the purpose of constructing new or replacement infrastructure on closing military installations and Department of Energy sites. Seven percent of the funds were awarded for twelve investments to provide technical assistance, strategy and planning. Three percent of the program allocation was awarded to fund two RLF investments. Investments in communities affected by defense industry downsizing accounted for ten percent of the funds, including some of the above technical assistance awards.

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Trade Adjustment Assistance Program

The Department of Commerce, including EDA, is strongly committed to supporting President Bush's policies that promote open trade, including Trade



Promotion Authority. Trade with our international partners creates more good jobs for American workers and supports higher living standards for American families. While open trade builds prosperity and spurs economic growth, the reality is that some American firms are impacted by import competition. EDA is pleased to play a role in assisting eligible manufacturing firms adjust to import competition

through the Trade Adjustment Assistance for Firms Program, as authorized by the Trade Act of 1974, as amended (Act).

Investment Eligibility Criteria for Trade Adjustment Assistance

Only trade-injured manufacturers and producers are eligible to receive assistance under the Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) Program. Service and retail firms are not eligible for assistance under the program.

Investments to operate TAACs may be awarded to institutions of higher education, non-profit organizations or other appropriate entities. In FY 2001, seven institutions of higher-education, three single-purpose non-profit organizations, one employers' association and one state agency were awarded funding to operate a TAAC.

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

Analysis of Trade Adjustment Assistance Investments

In FY 2001, EDA awarded \$10,476,900 in TAA funding to the national TAAC network. EDA certified 179 firms as eligible to apply for assistance under the TAA Program and approved adjustment proposals from 118 firms. These 118 firms had an average of 250 employees and \$12,800,000 in sales.



Under the program, the firm must share in paying the costs of consultants' fees for implementing the technical assistance outlined in its adjustment proposal. The combined cost of the EDA and the firm's share for the technical assistance implementation outlined in an adjustment proposal averaged \$97,000.

Examples of technical assistance tasks contained in the adjustment proposals approved during FY 2001 include the following:

- \$30,000 for an electrical solar equipment manufacturer to analyze and recommend upgrades for its web site and to design and develop specifications for new and existing products;
- \$30,000 for a printed circuit boards manufacture to improve its general operating efficiency, to obtain ISO 9001 certification, to develop marketing brochures and to enhance the firm's Internet marketing capabilities;
- \$150,000 for a manufacturer of digital ambulatory electrocardiograph monitors to attain product compliance with European health, safety and environmental standards and to upgrade marketing and sales tools;
- \$100,000 for an industrial steel tanks manufacturer to develop a strategic plan to identify and enter new and affiliated markets and to design a new catalog and promotional materials for use in the military and maritime equipment markets;

- \$76,000 for a manufacturer of prefabricated cedar buildings to develop a customized panel press for making products that meet the quality standards of the American Plywood Association and the International Code of Building Officials, and to develop a book of home kit plans; and,
- \$100,000 for a casting firm to develop a more efficient sand mold production line, to reduce the amount of raw material lost as scrap, and to develop a preventive maintenance plan to improve the firm's machinery.

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Economic Development Planning Assistance Program

The Economic Development Planning Program provides essential investment support to Economic Development Districts (EDDs), Native American organizations, states, sub-state planning regions, urban counties, cities, and other eligible applicants to assist in planning. The two categories of the Planning Programs are: Partnership Planning investments for Economic Development Districts, Indian Tribes, and other eligible areas; and, Short Term Planning investments to states, substate planning regions, and urban areas.

Analysis of Economic Development Planning Investments

In FY 2001, 312 EDA investments under the District Partnership Planning Program totaled \$18,261,964 in support of 325 districts. One of the investments supports 14 districts in Kentucky. An additional 59 investments totaling \$2,604,500 were made under the Indian Tribe Partnership Planning Program and an additional four Partnership Planning Program investments were made totaling \$279,000 to eligible areas. Under the Short Term Planning Program, EDA provided an additional award for \$20,000 to an Indian Tribe and 25 other awards to rural entities for \$1,162,977, nine awards to states for \$515,000, and 14 awards to urban entities for \$1,196,000.

Partnership Planning Investments for Economic Development Districts, Indian Tribes, and Other Eligible Areas

Partnership planning investments provide support for the formulation and implementation of local economic development programs and strategies designed to create higher-skill, higher-wage jobs and to increase income for the unemployed and underemployed in areas of economic distress. EDA investments enhance economic development planning capability, support the formulation of development policies, and assist in building local institutional capacity. Ζ

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Eligible activities under this program include preparing and maintaining a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy; implementing the elements of the strategy; and, providing planning and technical assistance services to communities and local governments within the organization's jurisdiction. EDA investments are normally awarded on an annual basis and priority consideration is given to currently funded entities with satisfactory performance.

In FY 2001, examples of EDA Partnership Planning investments include the following:

West Virginia Region 4 Planning and Development Council Economic Development District received an \$80,000 District Partnership Planning investment. On the third Saturday in October, New River Gorge Bridge Day is held, featuring the opening of the bridge to pedestrians, and day-long activities are enjoyed, including walks, music, and demonstrations of parachuting and rappelling. Despite a history of large attendance, no organized plan had been developed to build on the event to generate income for the region. A portion of the EDA investment will be used to prepare the New River Gorge Day Plan to ensure this event generates the maximum economic benefit to the region and promotes the growth of a local tourism industry.

Quileute Indian Tribe in La Push, Washington, received a \$35,000 award to support a Tribal Economic Development Planner to determine the feasibility of renovating and expanding a tribally-owned resort facility and the development of a conceptual design for the resort. An EDA-funded revolving loan fund has also assisted with partial financing of construction projects. Other tribal projects assisted with EDA funding include: developing small business opportunities in a facility donated to the Tribe by the Coast Guard; marketing and further developing the local seafood and tourism industries; securing funding for a bottled water business; assisting in the completion of a transportation plan designed to facilitate economic development; and, maintaining a current economic development strategy.

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
Short Term Planning Investments to States, Sub-State Planning Regions, and Urban Areas

Short Term Planning investments support significant new economic development planning, policymaking, and implementation efforts and establish comprehensive economic development planning processes cooperatively with the state, political subdivisions of the state, and economic development districts. Investments under this program are generally for a 12-month period and assistance may be renewed for two additional years.

Economic development planning and implementation activities such as economic analyses, defining economic development goals, identifying project opportunities, and formulating and implementing development programs may be supported under this program. Other eligible activities include coordinating multi-jurisdictional planning efforts, developing institutional planning capacity, and identifying approaches for diversifying the local economy. Any state receiving assistance under the program is required to maintain a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy developed in cooperation with its political subdivisions and economic development districts.

FY 2001 EDA Short Term Planning Investments

Georgia Tech Research Institute and the State of Georgia were awarded \$100,000 to develop an e-commerce procurement system. The system will provide outreach to primarily minority communities in rural Georgia and will help support efforts to increase minority participation in the state's procurement process.



The city of Filmore, California, suffered massive economic damage as a result of the Northridge earthquake. The quake caused all downtown commercial and office buildings to be declared unusable. EDA assistance helped construct a new City Hall, which was used initially by businesses until new commercial structures were built. Use of the City Hall facility saved many businesses from permanently closing. thus protecting Filmore's economy.

University of Missouri-Rolla received \$60,000 from EDA to develop a planning process for industrial retention and growth. The process will be utilized by local and regional economic developers in their efforts to minimize the number and severity of plant closures that have significantly impacted rural Missouri in recent years. The project will enhance the knowledge of economic developers in the area of industrial and manufacturing technology and provide them with a clear and effective methodology for assessing and addressing the needs of local industries.



The stunningly successful 26-acre, \$14.8 million Alaska Heritage Center educational cultural and touriss complex opened in 1999. The Center showcases the history, language, art, and rituals of Alaska's five main indigenous native groups. EDA investment in the Center assisted in the construction of this 26,000 square foot "Welcome House," including galleries and performance space. Alaska's Heritage Center spurs the regional development of tourism and the associated job growth.
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Technical Assistance Programs

Local Technical Assistance Program

The Local Technical Assistance Program helps leaders in the public and non-profit sectors, especially those in distressed communities, to gain essential information for making optimal decisions on local economic development issues. Investments funded under this program most commonly assist communities in analyzing the feasibility of an economic development investment, such as a business incubator or industrial park. However, the strength of the Local Technical Assistance Program lies in its flexibility to address a broad range of local economic development needs and priorities. EDA investments under this program may also assist communities in preparing downtown revitalization strategies, tourism marketing plans, and export marketing programs for locally produced goods and services, and conducting targeted economic development studies, such as analysis of local labor skills and needs.

Analysis of Local Technical Assistance Investments


EDA awarded 44 Local Technical Assistance investments, totaling \$1.37 million in FY 2001. These FY 2001 Local Technical Assistance investments included nine investments for convening conferences or workshops, eight investments for feasibility studies, six investments for planning studies and analysis, and three telecommunications related studies. The remaining eighteen investments were disbursed among a variety of other categories.

Examples of FY 2001 EDA Local Technical Assistance investments include the following:

The city of Galion, Ohio, was awarded \$25,000 to evaluate and plan the technical aspects of a city-owned fiber-optic network through the community's industrial corridors. The city recognized that its lack of access to high-speed, broadband

infrastructure through a fiber-optic connection for video conferencing and data transmission was a major impediment to attracting new and retaining existing companies. Unfortunately, Galion is considered too small a market to support expensive high-tech services by its current telephone company. The development of a city-wide high-speed broadband system will provide Galion with the opportunity to expand future linkages among community factories, schools, government facilities, hospitals, and development agencies. As the economic development problems of Galion are common across Ohio, the telecommunications solution reached here could be applied to other similar communities. The study will provide insights on the use of digital network technology as a solution to economic development problems in rural areas.

United Tribes Technical College, Bismarck, North Dakota, was awarded \$20,000 to conduct a Tribal planners workshop. The conference discussed Tribal issues and



highlighted best planning practices among Native American communities. The Tribal planners attending the workshop also had an opportunity to discuss unique issues that Tribes face as they prepare a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy.

University Center Technical Assistance Program

Institutions of higher education house a wealth of resources, including faculty, staff, computer

facilities, laboratories and libraries. The University Center Technical Assistance Program helps institutions of higher education establish and operate outreach programs, which use their own and other resources to provide technical assistance that addresses economic development needs and opportunities in their service areas, especially in distressed communities.

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2,475 linear feet of seawall. This project, with an overall cost of \$15 million, is expected to create an estimated 225 jobs by allowing more boat traffic and the development of underutilized port property.

The majority of the University Centers assist non-profit organizations in analyzing and implementing economic development projects and programs. Other University Centers focus their programs on providing private-sector firms with technology-transfer assistance to help create or stabilize job opportunities. Hispanic serving institutions sponsors five University Centers while historically Black colleges and university sponsor eight University Centers.

Analysis of University Center Technical Assistance Investments

EDA renewed its financial assistance investments to University Centers in FY 2001 and awarded \$6.649 million in Technical Assistance funding and \$0.567 million in other funding, for a total of \$7.216 million. The following are representative investments made under the University Center Technical Assistance Program in FY 2001:

California State University, Chico, California, received \$110,000 to continue its program of serving twenty counties in northeastern and coastal California with

technical assistance on economic development matters. The area covers more than 47,000 square miles, encompassing both urban and rural economies. Area economic development problems include the lack of a regional planning network, affordable training in economic training, a regional consensus in economic development goals, and, basic economic data, trends and policy analysis. The University Center in Chico helps to address these problems by providing targeted technical assistance and research to encourage new and existing industry clusters, strengthening existing clusters, and assisting communities adjust to the decline of resourcedependent clusters. It also convenes conferences and workshops on economic developments requested by public and private-sector officials in the region.

This EDA-funded economic development project is expected to provide 350 higher-skill, higherwage employment opportunities for residents of an area hard-hit by a declining iron mining industry.

EDA invested

The University of Wisconsin – Milwaukee, received \$100,000 to continue its University Center program, which serves the seven-county metropolitan Milwaukee area. However, the vast majority of the University Center's work is targeted to Milwaukee's distressed inner-city neighborhoods. The University Center's applied research and technical assistance agenda focuses on three general activities: building linkages for preparing inner-city residents for regional job opportunities; using regional growth management policies to reduce urban sprawl and expand the incentives for investment and development; and, supporting redevelopment and infill development within Milwaukee. Historically, the University Center has engaged in long-term partnerships with its clients, beginning its technical assistance at project or program design stage and continuing it through the implementation stage.

Research and National Technical Assistance Program

The Research and National Technical Assistance Program develops a comprehensive base of information about economic development issues; disseminates information to local, state, and national economic development practitioners; and, evaluates the performance of economic development programs. Information dissemination

Through its Research and National Technical Assistance Program, EDA develops and disseminates information about economic development issues to practitioners, and measures the performance of economic development investments. investments make crucial information on economic development programs, projects, and emerging issues available to practitioners through targeted newsletters, Web sites, conferences, and other media. Research investments examine existing and emerging issues in economic development, and document the results for practitioners and policymakers. Evaluation investments assess the economic impact of funding under EDA's programs to measure each program's effectiveness and make recommendations for their improvement.

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Twelve Research investments totaling \$517,162 were awarded in FY 2001. Examples of these research investments include the following:

- Wayne State University of Detroit, Michigan, was awarded \$299,262 to evaluate the economic impact of Economic Adjustment Program investments in achieving structural economic adjustment.
- The University of Minnesota of Minneapolis, Minnesota, was awarded \$19,188 to research the role of rural knowledge clusters in economic prosperity.

Ten National Technical Assistance investments totaling \$1,080,500 were awarded in FY 2001. Examples of these projects include the following:

- The National Governors' Association, Washington, DC, was awarded \$100,000 to develop a practical understanding of cluster-based economic development, and produce a governors' guide to cluster-based economic development.
- Bowling Green State University of Bowling Green, Ohio, was awarded \$149,000 to evaluate the effectiveness of the Local Technical Assistance Program.
- The National Coalition for Asian Pacific American Community Development was awarded \$75,000 to assess the economic development needs of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in distressed communities.

Economic Development Districts (EDDs) are multi-jurisdiction organizations established to develop and implement a comprehensive economic development planning process designed to promote economic growth in their areas. Through planning investments for administrative expenses, EDA provides partnership assistance to 325 EDDs and four other areas. Through this assistance EDA supports not only economic development planning and implementation, but also various technical assistance to member jurisdictions.




