

Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

Small Business Profile: NEW JERSEY

Small businesses are the heart of New Jersey's economy. Research by the Office of Advocacy shows that small businesses create most of the nation's net new jobs, and they bring dynamic ideas, innovative services, and new products to the marketplace. They account for almost all of the nation's employer firms and generate half of non-farm private output. New business creation is key to a state's ability to increase its gross state product, state personal income, and total state employment. This small business profile uses the most recent data available to demonstrate the valuable contributions that small businesses make to New Jersey's economic health.

Number of Businesses. New Jersey had an estimated total of 828,400 small businesses.² Employer firms totaled 261,800 in 2006, up 1.0 percent from the previous year. Of this total, an estimated 98.5 percent, or 257,800 were small. Self-employment (incorporated and unincorporated) totaled 431,300 in 2006, an increase from 409,200 in 2005. Non-employer firms totaled 573,100 in 2005, an increase of 2.9 percent since 2004. Women-owned Firms. In 2002, businesses owned by women numbered 185,200, represented 26.1 percent of the state's 708,800 businesses, and generated \$35.6 billion in revenues. Employer firms owned by women totaled 30,800, an increase of 6.2 percent since 1997. Women numbered 133,100 or 30.9 percent of the state's self-employed persons in 2006, an increase of 11.7 percent from the previous year. Minority-owned Firms.³ In 2002, Asian-owned firms totaled 51,900, and 16,900 of them were employer firms; Black-owned firms numbered 36,300, and 3,700 were employer firms; Hispanic-owned firms totaled 49,800, and 7,500 were employer firms. American Indian and Alaska Native-owned

firms numbered 2,600, and 400 of them were employer firms; while Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander-owned businesses numbered 450, and data on employer firms are unavailable. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau.)

Business Turnover. An estimated 36,258 new employer firms were created in 2006, which is 9.8 percent more than the number created in 2005. Business bankruptcies totaled 493 in 2006, down from 765 the previous year, while business terminations increased from 32,800 in 2005 to 33,000 in 2006. Employment. Small firms employed 51.0 percent of the state's non-farm private labor force in 2004, which was above the national average of 50.9 percent.⁴ These 204,300 firms accounted for 98.5 percent of the state's employer businesses, and they employed 1.8 million people (Table 1). Small businesses added a total of 60,300 net new jobs between 2003 and 2004 (Table 2). (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau, Statistics of U.S. Businesses.)

Small Business Income. Non-farm proprietors' income, which is a share of small business income, increased by 4.8 percent, from \$33.3 billion in 2005 to \$34.9 billion in 2006.5 (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce.)

Finance. Commercial banks and savings institutions continued to be important sources of small business financing. The number of lending institution branches in the state increased in 2006 (Table 3). This percentage is multiplied by the total number of employer businesses in 2006 (Dept. of Labor). The 2005 number of non-employer firms is added to this total (Census Bureau).
