

## Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

## **Small Business Profile: OREGON**

Small businesses are the heart of Oregon's economy. Research by the Office of Advocacy shows that small businesses create most of the nation's net new jobs, and they bring dynamic ideas, innovative services, and new products to the marketplace. They account for almost all of the nation's employer firms and generate half of non-farm private output. New business creation is key to a state's ability to increase its gross state product, state personal income, and total state employment. This small business profile uses the most recent data available to demonstrate the valuable contributions that small businesses make to Oregon's economic health.

Number of Businesses. Oregon had an estimated total of 350,500 small businesses.<sup>2</sup> Employer firms totaled 110,900 in 2006, up 3.8 percent from the previous year. Of this total, an estimated 97.8 percent, or 108,500 were small. Self-employment (incorporated and unincorporated) totaled 281,500 in 2006, an increase from 256,800 in 2005. Non-employer firms totaled 246,100 in 2005, an increase of 3.9 percent since 2004. Women-owned Firms. In 2002, businesses owned by women numbered 88,300, represented 29.4 percent of the state's 299,500 businesses, and generated \$10.6 billion in revenues. Employer firms owned by women totaled 13,600, an increase of 5.7 percent since 1997. Women numbered 107,200 or 38.1 percent of the state's self-employed persons in 2006, an increase of 8.4 percent from the previous year. **Minority-owned Firms**.<sup>3</sup> In 2002, Asian-owned firms totaled 9,100, and 2,900 of them were employer firms; Black-owned firms numbered 2,200, and 300 were employer firms; Hispanic-owned firms totaled 6,400, and 1,300 were employer firms. American Indian and Alaska Native-owned firms

numbered 3,100, and 400 of them were employer firms; while Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander-owned businesses numbered 350, and 70 were employer firms. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau.)

**Business Turnover.** An estimated 15,085 new employer firms were created in 2006, which is 4.4 percent more than the number created in 2005. Business bankruptcies totaled 301 in 2006, down from 1,160 the previous year, while business terminations decreased from 14,800 in 2005 to 14,000 in 2006. Employment. Small firms employed 56.9 percent of the state's non-farm private labor force in 2004, which was above the national average of 50.9 percent.<sup>4</sup> These 86,500 firms accounted for 97.8 percent of the state's employer businesses, and they employed 771,400 people (Table 1). Small businesses added a total of 23,700 net new jobs between 2003 and 2004 (Table 2). (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau, Statistics of U.S. Businesses.)

**Small Business Income.** Non-farm proprietors' income, which is a share of small business income, increased by 5.1 percent, from \$9.8 billion in 2005 to \$10.3 billion in 2006.<sup>5</sup> (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce.)

**Finance.** Commercial banks and savings institutions continued to be important sources of small business financing. The number of lending institution branches in the state increased in 2006 (Table 3).
