Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

North Dakota

North Dakota's 61,264 small businesses provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business in the state. (Note that a small business is defined here as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

• North Dakota had 17,147 small employers in 2005, representing 96.6% of the state's employers and 64.4% of its private-sector employment.

• The retail trade industry was the state's largest small business employer in 2005; health care and social assistance was the largest overall employer (Table 1).

• Small businesses created all of the state's net new jobs from 2004 to 2005 (Table 2).

• North Dakota's real gross state product increased by 3.0% in 2007. By comparison, growth in the Plains region was 2.0% and the United States, 2.0%. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce: Bureau of Economic Analysis)
