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Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

United States

The United States' 26.8 million small businesses provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business in the country. (Note that a small business is defined here as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- The United States had 6.0 million small employers in 2006, representing 99.7% of the nation's employers and 50.2% of its private-sector employment.
- The health care and social assistance industry was the state's largest small business and overall employer in 2006 (Table 1).
- Small businesses created 78.9% of the nation's net new jobs from 2004 to 2005 (Table 2).
- The United States' real gross domestic product increased by 2.0% in 2007. Growth in the New England, the Rocky Mountain, Mid-Atlantic, and Southwest regions was above the national average; growth in the Great Lakes, Southeast, and Far West regions was below the national average; and the Plains region grew at the national level. Alabama

Alabama's 372,280 small businesses provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business in the state. (Note that a small business is defined here as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- Alabama had 78,406 small employers in 2006, representing 97.2% of the state's employers and 49.7% of its private-sector employment.
- The health care and social assistance industry was the state's largest small business employer in 2006; manufacturing was the largest overall employer (Table 1).
- Small businesses created 45.3% of the state's net new jobs from 2004 to 2005 (Table 2).
- Alabama's real gross state product increased by 1.8% in 2007. By comparison, growth in the Southeast region was 1.5% and the United States, 2.0%. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce: Bureau of Economic Analysis)

Alaska

Alaska's 66,854 small businesses provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business in the state. (Note that a small business is defined here as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- Alaska had 16,184 small employers in 2006, representing 96.8% of the state's employers and 55.6% of its private-sector employment.
- The health care and social assistance industry was the state's largest small business and overall employer in 2006 (Table 1).
- Small businesses created 26.9% of the state's net new jobs from 2004 to 2005 (Table 2).
- Alaska's real gross state product increased by 0.3% in 2007. By comparison, growth in the Far West region was 1.9% and the United States, 2.0%. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce: Bureau of Economic Analysis)

Hawaii

Hawaii's 116,236 small businesses provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business in the state. (Note that a small business is defined here as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- Hawaii had 25,883 small employers in 2006, representing 96.9% of the state's employers and 56.1% of its private-sector employment.
- The accommodation and food services industry was the state's largest small business and overall employer in 2006 (Table 1).
- Small businesses created 58% of the state's net new jobs from 2004 to 2005 (Table 2).
- Hawaii's real gross state product increased by 3.0% in 2007. By comparison, growth in the Far West region was 1.9% and the United States, 2.0%. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce: Bureau of Economic Analysis)

Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

U.S. Territories

Small businesses in the U.S. territories provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace. This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business.*

- Puerto Rico has the largest economy of the U.S. territories. Puerto Rico had more business establishments and employment than 14 states in 2006.
- The economies of the Virgin Islands and Guam fared better from 2006 to 2007 than Puerto Rico's, as employment rose and business bankruptcies declined in both.
- The number and value of small business loans in the Virgin Islands underwent a large increase in 2007, which has been attributed to the presence of a new lender in the market.
- American Samoa had 589 employer establishments in 2002. The number of small business loans went from 121 in 2006 to 129 in 2007, while the total dollar value decreased from \$3.87 million to \$3.78 million.
