Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

Rhode Island

Rhode Island's 95,090 small businesses provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business in the state. (Note that a small business is defined here as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- Rhode Island had 25,763 small employers in 2006, representing 96.5% of the state's employers and 57.1% of its private-sector employment.
- The health care and social assistance industry was the state's largest small business and overall employer in 2006 (Table 1).
- Small businesses' net new jobs declined slightly between 2004 and 2005 (Table 2).
- Rhode Island's real gross state product increased by 0.1% in 2007. By comparison, growth in the New England region was 2.1% and the United States, 2.0%. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce: Bureau of Economic Analysis)
