CURRENT SITUATION

Numbers Affected

• Estimates of the numbers of dead and affected from host country governments and international agencies continue to fluctuate. According to the best estimates received as of January 14, more than 150,000 are reported dead in all of the affected countries.

Indonesia Update

- On January 13, the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) conducted a structural evaluation of a fish-processing plant in the village of Kir, approximately 36 km southeast of Banda Aceh town, to determine the facility's capacity and capability for commodity storage. While in Kir, the USAID/DART determined that 70 percent of the homes and other structures in the village were destroyed by the tsunami. Kir's estimated population of 500 people was further impacted by the disaster due to close proximity to the heavily damaged petroleum storage facility. According to the USAID/DART, hundreds of 55-gallon drums were still deposited throughout the destroyed area compounding the pollution threat.
- The Government of Indonesia (GOI) reported that out of a total of 240 medical clinics in Aceh Province, the tsunami destroyed 30, seriously damaged 77, and caused moderate damage to 40 others. According to the GOI, Zainal Abidin hospital in Banda Aceh is currently functioning at 23 percent of pre-tsunami levels, and Kesdam, Harapan Bunda, and Fakinah hospitals in Banda Aceh are fully functional. Malahayati hospital in Banda Aceh is not yet operational.
- Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) is currently overseeing the treatment of 26 tetanus patients in Banda Aceh and 15 tetanus patients in Meulaboh. On January 13, MSF staff reported increased numbers of tetanus patients, up from from seven cases reported the previous week in Banda Aceh. Currently, 9,000 doses of tetanus toxoid are available, and the GOI Ministry of Health is working to source additional supplies of tetanus toxoid and immunoglobulin.
- On January 14, the U.N. World Food Program (WFP) and a consortium of non-governmental organizations (NGOs) traveled from Banda Aceh to reach tsunami victims in Chalang on the West Coast of Aceh Province. WFP plans to distribute approximately 3,000 metric tons (MT) of food assistance to 57,000 beneficiaries in Chalang, Lamno, and Teunom. These recipients are part of an identified caseload of 130,000 people along the western coast that require food aid.

Sri Lanka Update

• On January 13, a WFP team traveled by helicopter to Ampara District on the east coast of Sri Lanka to assess this hardest hit region of the country. Although WFP food aid is being distributed in the area, ongoing challenges in the area include destroyed houses, washed out roads, and 190,000 people affected by the crisis.

- According to WFP, thousands of families in Ampara District are living in camps, most of which are located in schools. With students returning to school this week, resident in the schools must relocate. The Government of Sri Lanka (GOSL) has appealed to humanitarian agencies for 35,000 additional tents.
- On January 11, the Nagapattinam District Collector stated that strict procedures will be followed for adoption of tsunami-orphaned children in the district. Applicants must be 25 to 45 years old, and at least 21 years older than the child. In addition, the child must approve the adoption. According to local media, the state government plans to open two special service homes in Nagapattinam and Kanyakumari districts for girls 14 to 18 years of age.

India Update

- On January 13, the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) reported that India's seafood exports may decline by approximately 30 percent as a result of the tsunami. According to the Government of the Republic of India (GORI), 74,025 boats were damaged or destroyed in the tsunami.
- The GORI reported that due to damage and destruction of boats and nets and decreased demand for fish many affected communities have not resumed fishing.

Maldives Update

According to the USAID/DART, the water sector in Maldives remains a critical concern. In response to water
needs, the U.S. military plans to use a Marine pre-positioning vessel to provide potable water at a rate of 25,000
gallons per day. The vessel is scheduled to arrive during the week of January 16 and has the capacity to produce
and store water onboard. The U.S. military plans to focus efforts on providing water in the hard-hit areas of Laamu
(Haddumati Atoll) and Dhaalu (Nilandu Atoll South) in southern Maldives.

Somalia Update

On January 14, WFP reported that rice, maize, cooking oil, and lentils have been distributed to 22,500 residents of
19 villages in the tsunami-affected Puntland Region of northeastern Somalia. In addition, WFP has identified four
other villages in Bander Beyla and Gariban districts of Puntland as possibly in need of food assistance. WFP will
participate in a planned World Bank assessment of long-term reconstruction needs resulting from the tsunami,
which is scheduled to start in the coming days.

USG ASSISTANCE

USAID Regional Response

- The USAID/DART and the U.S. military continue to conduct needs assessments and provide supplies and essential logistic support for the relief efforts in affected countries.
- USAID/Office of Food for Peace's (USAID/FFP) initial contribution of 11,220 metric tons of emergency food aid, valued at approximately \$13 million, has either arrived or is en route to Indonesia, Sri Lanka, and Maldives for U.N. World Food Program (WFP) relief operations. Additional Title II contributions of 13,000 metric tons valued at \$8.8 million are under consideration. WFP, Action Contra la Faim (ACF), and CARE recently completed assessments for the west coast of Indonesia and identified a caseload of 130,000 people. WFP and Save the Children (SCF) also conducted an assessment of the eastern coast and will target 160,000 beneficiaries. Assessments for additional distributions in Sri Lanka, Myanmar, and Maldives are ongoing.

Indonesia

• To date, the USG has provided more than \$33.5 million to support emergency relief activities and the provision of food, water, and relief supplies for affected populations in Indonesia. On January 14, USAID/OFDA provided \$2.0 million to International Medical Corps (IMC) for mobile health units, rehabilitation of local health clinics, malaria control, and psychosocial support in Aceh and North Sumatra.

Sri Lanka

• To date, USAID has provided more than \$43.1 million in emergency relief assistance to Sri Lanka. On January 14, through funds already provided to USAID/Sri Lanka, USAID/OFDA awarded the following grants: approximately \$3.0 million to Catholic Relief Services (CRS) for for transitional shelter, home repair, and latrine construction in Batticaloa and Ampara districts; \$3.0 to CHF International for cash-for-work, debris cleanup, repair of schools and public buildings, latrine construction, and water and sanitation; \$1.7 million to SARVODAYA for cash-for work, debris cleanup, repair of public buildings, and water and sanitation; \$1.0 million to Shelter for Life for construction of transitional housing and latrines, and home repairs in Trincomalee; \$350,000 to the American Center for International Labor for psychosocial activities including anti-trafficking.

India

- To date, USAID has provided more than \$3.1 million in emergency relief assistance to India. Department of Defense (DOD) Humanitarian Assistance
- As of January 14, more than 15,650 U.S. military personnel are involved in providing relief support in the affected region. Of the 2,885 military personnel currently on the ground, 1,513 are in Thailand, 715 are in Sri Lanka, 452 are in Indonesia, 205 are in Malaysia, and 8 in Bangladesh. With 25 ships and 99 aircraft, the U.S. military has delivered a total of 3,180, 811 lbs of relief supplies to the governments of Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Thailand, and

other affected nations, including 6,063 gallons of water; 81,600 lbs of food; and 318,190 lbs of relief supplies in the last 24 hours.

BACKGROUND

- A magnitude 9.0 earthquake on December 26, off the west coast of Northern Sumatra, Indonesia, triggered massive tsunamis that affected several countries throughout South and Southeast Asia, as well as Somalia, Tanzania, and Kenya in East Africa. Aftershocks from the December 26 earthquake continue to occur in the region.
- Based on initial findings of USG assessment teams and on the recommendation of Secretary of State Powell and
 USAID Administrator Natsios, on December 31, President Bush committed \$350 million toward earthquake and
 tsunami relief and recovery efforts. Dollar amounts in this Fact Sheet are part of the total pledge of \$350 million
 and refer to specific funding actions that have been committed and programmed. USAID/OFDA welcomes
 proposals from qualified humanitarian assistance organizations prepared to implement relief activities in response
 to the Indian Ocean Earthquake and Tsunami disaster. Details can be found at www.usaid.gov.
