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### **CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION**

U.N. Humanitarian Profile

- On December 14, the Office of the U.N. Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator for Sudan (UN RCHC) released Darfur Humanitarian Profile Number Eight, dated November 1, 2004. The report provides an overview of the humanitarian situation in Darfur during the month of October.
- According to the report, the U.N. estimates that 2.28 million people, including an estimated 1.65 million IDPs and 627,000 host community residents, have been affected by the conflict. As of November 1, approximately 57 percent of the conflict-affected population had received food assistance and 61 percent of IDPs had received shelter items and other emergency relief supplies. Most underserved areas remain in opposition-controlled territory, most of which has been inaccessible to U.N. agencies due to insecurity and the delay in obtaining an agreement with the Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A) on humanitarian rules and principles.

Food Assistance

- The U.N. World Food Program (WFP) is currently developing a pre-positioning strategy for Darfur and eastern Chad. WFP is preparing to stock food commodities in strategic locations in advance of the 2005 rainy season, ensuring that beneficiaries continue to receive food assistance.
- The UN RCHC reports that WFP dispatched 11,818 metric tons (MT) of food commodities from December 1 to 13 to implementing partners for distribution to more than 675,000 beneficiaries.
- Military activity along the Kutum-El Fasher road and other main roads in North Darfur has impacted the WFP/Kutum field office operations. WFP and German Agro-Action have been unable to conduct December food distributions in Anka, Disa, and Hashaba, all SLM/A areas.
- WFP reports that the deteriorating security situation is adversely impacting road deliveries and December food distributions throughout Darfur. Food deliveries to Labado, Muhajeria, and Rokero, all areas north and east of Nyala in South Darfur, have been delayed, leaving 160,000

people without food assistance. However, WFP continues to dispatch food convoys to Kass, Kubum, Ed Daein, and West Darfur.

The joint WFP and U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) crop and food supply • assessment mission in Darfur was completed on December 10. Survey results are expected in one month. WFP anticipates increasing its current beneficiary caseload of 2 million to 2.3 million from January through March, to 2.5 million in April, and 2.7 million in May.

### Health/Nutrition

According to the UN RCHC, Médecins Sans Frontières/Holland (MSF/H) reports a decrease in the number of malnourished children requiring therapeutic and supplementary feeding in Kass, South Darfur. The reduction could indicate a general stabilization of Kass's affected population.

#### Security

- The USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) reports that the number of • security incidents involving relief agencies along the vital transport corridor between Nyala and Zalengei is increasing and exacerbating security concerns for agencies operating in South Darfur and areas of West Darfur covered out of Nyala.
- On December 12, armed men killed two Save the Children/United Kingdom (SC/UK) national • staff members traveling along the Mershing-Duma road in South Darfur. SC/UK has suspended all operations in South Darfur while the African Union investigates.
- UN RCHC also reports that insecurity continues in areas east and southeast of Nyala town. On • December 12 and 13, fighting was reported in the villages of Bashom, Eida, Ishma, Um Zehefa, and Reil, and areas east of these locations. On December 13, Arab militias entered areas of the Kalma IDP camp, randomly shooting into the air and looting personal items and livestock belonging to new arrivals, according to humanitarian agencies.
- According to the UN RCHC, the GOS and armed opposition groups have begun to amass forces around Nyala, causing concern about a serious escalation of violence.
- As of December 17, the U.N. reports that it has not halted operations in South Darfur, contrary to international media reports. However, U.N. operations and movements have been suspended in the areas where fighting has been reported.

### Access

- The USAID/DART reports that a deteriorating security environment throughout most of Darfur • is hindering the ability of organizations to provide humanitarian assistance.
- According to the UN RCHC December 14 report, victims of violence from Um Zehfa and the surrounding area of South Darfur were unable to receive treatment at a non-governmental organization (NGO) clinic in Muhajeria as the NGO staff had been relocated to Sheria due to insecurity in the area.
- For the first time in two months, the Kulbus corridor north of Geneina was opened to U.N. operations, allowing relief agencies to increase their operational capacity in the area. The corridor has been a flashpoint in West Darfur since October due to clashes between Arab tribes and the National Movement for Reconstruction and Development (NMRD) opposition group.

## **Emergency Relief Supplies**

- The U.N. reports that relief agencies have agreed to use Thabit as a central distribution point to • reach the estimated 16,000 IDPs who arrived from Tawilah in late November and were displaced again following the December 7 attack on Thabit. From December 16 to 18, relief agencies were scheduled to distribute emergency relief supplies, and MSF/Spain will conduct health screenings.
- According to the December 16 U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) report, CARE has begun a common overland transport service for emergency relief supplies from Khartoum to Darfur. The common service—available to all humanitarian organizations in Darfur—is expected to relieve the workload on the common cargo air service for relief supplies and to establish a more cost efficient transport service. The first convoy departed Khartoum on December 9 with a total of 700 rolls of plastic sheeting for Samaritan's Purse.
