CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

USG Assistance

The USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) for Darfur has expanded in size and technical expertise. At present, the team is composed of 19 members, including field and program officers, as well as specialists in health, security, water and sanitation, engineering, logistics, food issues, information, and protection. Team members pending deployment include agriculture and nutrition specialists. By February 20, USAID/DART members will be based in Khartoum, El Fasher, Nyala, Geneina, and eastern Chad.

Food Assistance

- The U.N. World Food Program (WFP) reported to the USAID/DART that it has established independent security assessment capacity in Darfur. Through hiring six new security officers, WFP possesses the ability to make quick security determinations on behalf of the U.N. Security Coordinator (UNSECOORD). This capacity will enable faster reassessment of "no-go" areas, allowing WFP to resume food deliveries where appropriate. Additionally, WFP will improve coordination with African Union (AU) representatives to keep abreast of AU troop deployments and the subsequent impact on security.
- According to the USAID/DART, WFP is anticipating the possibility of an increased beneficiary caseload in the coming months. While the population of internally displaced person (IDP) camps is likely to remain relatively stable at 1.4 to 1.5 million, the number of individuals requiring assistance in rural areas is likely to increase. WFP reportedly plans to reach rural beneficiaries in their home areas in an attempt to prevent further displacement. WFP also recognizes the increasing pressure to serve nomadic and agro-pastoralist communities who are threatened with drought- and conflictinduced shortages.
- West Darfur remains the primary area of concern for pre-positioning emergency food assistance before the onset of the rainy season in June, and WFP and USAID's Office of Food for Peace (USAID/FFP) continue to coordinate assistance efforts. WFP estimates the need for 10,000 metric tons (MT) per month in West Darfur during the rainy season from June to September, but anticipates that trucking capacity will enable the pre-positioning of only 20,000 MT. WFP and USAID/FFP are currently exploring options to increase pre-positioned stock levels in West Darfur. WFP does not

foresee a need to pre-position large quantities of food in North and South Darfur, as roads in these states will be more passable during the rainy season.

- WFP reports that refugees in Chad will receive a 15-day cereal ration during the week of February 14, along with the full 30-day rations of corn-soya blend, pulses, vegetable oil, sugar, and salt. The following 15-day cereal distribution will occur when the next convoy containing 1,235 MT of mixed commodities arrives in early March.
- According to WFP, the current timeliness of food deliveries through the Libyan corridor is promising for stabilizing the food needs of Darfur refugees in eastern Chad. WFP plans to further streamline deliveries by using a relay system in which trucks load directly at Benghazi port, deliver the commodities to warehouses in Al Khofra, and then return to Benghazi to haul another load. Simultaneously, other trucks would transport the commodities from Al Khofra to Abeche. With this innovation, WFP estimates that total delivery time from Benghazi port to Abeche will be 12 to 14 days—a significant reduction in previous delivery times.

Health

- At a February 14 U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) interagency meeting in Khartoum, the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) reported that it is currently designing the methodology for the next mortality survey in Darfur. The upcoming mortality survey aims to cover at least as many areas as the previous survey in Darfur that found a range of 6,000 to 10,000 deaths per month between June and August 2004. Given the significant increase in humanitarian access and capacity during the six months since the first survey, updated mortality figures are crucial to determine what progress has been made and what obstacles remain. WHO aims to complete three mortality surveys in Darfur per year, and results should be available two to three weeks after the survey has been completed.
- According to the USAID/DART, no new polio cases have been reported since the January 27 nationwide immunization campaign in which health officials vaccinated approximately 6 million children. The next round of polio immunizations will be held February 27 to March 1 as part of a coordinated regional effort in which Sudan and all nine bordering countries—Egypt, Libya, Chad, Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Uganda, Kenya, Ethiopia, and Eritrea—will conduct synchronized national immunization days. A third immunization round is scheduled to begin in Sudan on April 11.
- On February 14, the U.N. reported an outbreak of bloody diarrhea in Kalma camp, South Darfur, with 35 percent of children reportedly experiencing symptoms. To date, health officials have confirmed two cases of dysentery. According to U.N. sources, the increase in bloody diarrhoeal cases is due to non-chlorination of water and delays in the distribution of relief commodities such as jerry cans. As of February 14, the U.N. had increased chlorination of water in the camps, including piping chlorinated water to seven of the camp's eight sectors.

Humanitarian Assistance

• OCHA is planning to conduct a humanitarian assessment in Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A)-held areas in North Darfur where insecurity and drought have left many communities vulnerable, particularly in the towns of Tina, Kornoi, and Um Baru. While few people remain in Government of Sudan (GOS) garrison towns, an estimated 30,000 are in opposition-held areas that are currently inaccessible to relief agencies. In preparation for relief work in the area, UNSECOORD and the U.N. Mine Action Service (UNMAS) conducted a joint helicopter assessment on February 10 and a road assessment from February 11 to 14. Security concerns in the area remain elevated due to the killing of two relief workers in a landmine explosion on October 10, 2004.
