CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

Relief Workers Released

On April 5, the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) announced the release of three
national staff members who were abducted at gunpoint along with ADRA vehicles on December 16,
2004, while traveling through the then opposition-controlled area of Labado, South Darfur.
Traveling in a humanitarian convoy, the three workers were part of a larger ADRA well drilling
team that was carrying equipment and supplies. ADRA reported that the three staff members are
now home safely with their families and that most of the seized project equipment was returned.

Security

• According to the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART), on April 6, a two-vehicle non-governmental organization (NGO) humanitarian convoy was fired upon near Teige, approximately 7 km west of Mershing, South Darfur. The lead vehicle was hit three times and the second vehicle was hit twice and received a flat tire. No one was injured.

NGO Harassment

• According to a Human Rights Watch (HRW) statement released on April 5, the Government of Sudan (GOS) has tried to intimidate humanitarian relief agencies in Darfur by arbitrarily arresting or detaining at least 20 national and international relief workers from at least seven NGOs over the past four months. The HRW-documented incidents occurred in Nyala, South Darfur, and involved Sudanese security and military intelligence officials. HRW reported that few of the humanitarian organizations involved have publicized the arrests and detentions due to fear of further reprisals by the GOS against their staff, activities, and beneficiary populations.

Nutrition

• On March 31, TearFund reported preliminary findings of a 30x30 cluster nutritional survey conducted from March 14 to 18 in the Al Deain locality of South Darfur in collaboration with the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF), the Ministry of Health (MOH), and a local NGO. The survey revealed high malnutrition rates amongst the under-five population, with a global acute malnutrition (GAM) rate of 25.2 percent and a severe acute malnutrition (SAM) rate of 4.3 percent. Tearfund also reported a high prevalence of diarrhea, with 86 percent of severely malnourished children reported to have had diarrhea within two weeks prior to the survey. In response, primary health care (PHC) integrated interventions are planned, including a one-month blanket supplementary feeding to

all under-fives, followed by targeted feeding to moderately malnourished under-fives and pregnant and lactating mothers of host and IDP populations. Cordaid has already begun under-five blanket supplementary feeding in Al Deain.

Food Assistance

- According to WFP, an estimated 1.4 million beneficiaries in Darfur received food assistance during March (227,591 in El Fasher, 753,243 in Nyala, and 428,111 in Geneina). WFP fell short of the monthly target of 1.9 million primarily due to limitations caused by insecurity.
- WFP reported on April 8 that for the first time since the beginning of WFP's major emergency operation for Darfur, food commodity shortages will force it to cut rations for more than one million people. Starting in May, WFP will halve non-cereal rations in order to stretch current food supplies through July and August.

Water and Sanitation

- USAID/OFDA partner International Rescue Committee (IRC) is working closely with the U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) to pre-position cement and iron rods in Mukjar and Zalingei, West Darfur, where IRC implements water and sanitation programs. The pre-positioned stocks will enable IRC to continue implementing life-saving water (hand dug wells, boreholes, hand pump rehabilitation) and sanitation (latrines, solid waste collection) programs throughout the rainy season.
- In February, an interagency assessment found that 14,000 IDPs in the Gallab IDP camp in North Darfur were sharing two hand-pumps with limited capacity to cover their water needs. The U.N. reported on April 4 that a UNICEF/GOS Water, Sanitation, and Environment Agency (WES) geophysical survey identified three possible sites in the camp for increasing water pumps. A drilling rig will be deployed to Gallab camp in the coming days to begin drilling boreholes. OCHA reported that just 2 of the 13 drilling-rigs in Darfur are currently located in North Darfur.

USG Humanitarian Assistance

• During the past week, USAID/OFDA airlifted 1,260 rolls of plastic sheeting, with an estimated commodity value of \$315,000 (excluding transport), to Nyala and El Fasher. The plastic sheeting will provide temporary shelter for approximately 63,000 beneficiaries. In addition, on April 3, USAID/OFDA provided 20,020 blankets, valued at \$120,120 (excluding transport) to El Fasher.

Health

- According to international media sources, the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) reported on April 4 that five people died in late March and early April in an outbreak of meningitis at the Saraf Omra camp in North Darfur that has infected 71 people. WHO has launched a mass campaign to vaccinate 75,000 people in collaboration with the MOH and NGOs. WHO reportedly delivered 100,000 doses of vaccine to Saraf Omra on March 31. The vaccination campaign will take eight days and priority will be given to more populated areas.
- At an April 3 WHO/MOH health meeting, WHO reported an increase in visceral leishmaniasis cases in North Darfur and is considering this an outbreak. As North Darfur is not traditionally an area for leishmaniasis, WHO appealed to the NGO community to begin differential diagnosis (a systematic method of diagnosis) and treatment. A heath NGO reported a similar increase in cases in West Darfur and requested that WHO assist the NGO community with the diagnostic equipment necessary for differential diagnosis.

Eastern Chad

 According to the U.N., the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) conducted a mission from March 29 to 30 in Tine, West Darfur to investigate claims by local authorities that as many as 6,000 people had returned to Tine from eastern Chad. The mission concluded that just 250 to 300 people had recently returned, and the town remains largely uninhabited.
