## **CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION**

African Union Presence

- According to international media sources, the African Union (AU) has agreed to more than triple the size of its peacekeeping force in Darfur. On April 28, the AU Peace and Security Council approved increasing the force from 2,200 to more than 7,700, including nearly 5,500 troops, 1,600 civilian police, and 700 military observers.
- The USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) reported that the AU is setting up a permanent civilian police presence in Kalma camp, South Darfur. AU protection forces will also be established in Kalma camp to protect the AU civilian police.

#### Security

- According to the USAID/DART, OCHA reported that unidentified individuals recently burned the abandoned village of Saraf, near Masteri in West Darfur. This action was reportedly taken by nomads in an attempt to discourage IDPs from returning to the area.
- The Office of the U.N. Security Coordinator (UNSECOORD) reported that the Jebel Moon area north of Geneina is currently a "no go" area for U.N. travel due to reports of fighting among factions of the National Movement for Reform and Development (NMRD).
- During the week of April 17 in the Jebel Moon area, approximately four children were playing with an unexploded ordinance (UXO) when it accidentally detonated. One child was killed instantly, and another died en route to Geneina Hospital.
- On April 25, a convoy of two humanitarian organizations was stopped by armed assailants while traveling between Kutum and El Fasher, North Darfur. The attackers abducted a national staff driver and a vehicle. Both the driver and the vehicle were later released.

#### Health

• According to the USAID/DART, the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) has obtained consent from the Government of Sudan (GOS) to move forward with the second round of the WHO-led interagency mortality survey designed to estimate crude and under-five mortality rates, including causes of death, during the previous six months. The survey will be conducted using cluster survey methodology compatible with the first survey done in August 2004 among IDPs living in camps. The second survey will expand to include a comparison group of IDPs and other recipients of WFP food assistance not living in camps. WHO anticipates releasing survey protocols during the week of

May 1 and hopes to begin survey implementation by mid-May. WHO estimates that a preliminary report will be released in mid-June.

## Vulnerable Populations

• A recent Help Age assessment conducted in Ryad and Mornei IDP camps in West Darfur showed 33.8 percent of older people surveyed were disabled; and unless house-to-house registration takes place, the elderly may be excluded from the process. The same assessment noted that the sorghum provided by WFP is different than Darfurian sorghum, and has reportedly caused diarrhea among some older people. As a result, Help Age reported that older people tend to sell the sorghum to purchase their preferred foods. In collaboration with CONCERN and UNHCR, Help Age distributes a comprehensive emergency relief commodity package to the elderly including kitchen sets, simple household utensils, blankets, soap, mats, and clothing. Since August 2004, Help Age has distributed 11,500 commodity kits.

# Food Security

• According to the USAID/DART, prospects for food production in Darfur are bleak over the next two years as a result of limited access to secure land, a dramatic decline in livestock herds, and poor climatic patterns. Despite predictions from the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) that the amount of land planted will be slightly higher than last year in some locations, poor rains and the potential for crop destruction as a result of continued conflict will limit actual crop yields.

## Food Assistance

- In order to meet projected gaps in non-cereal commodities in Darfur, USAID's Office of Food for Peace (USAID/FFP) has diverted six ships of commodities that were originally destined for a prepositioning facility in Dubai. WFP has indicated that these diversions will provide sufficient stocks before the hunger gap to restore full rations in May, and possibly June. USAID/FFP commodities due to arrive are: 3,212 metric tons (MT) of corn-soya blend, 1,859 MT of yellow split peas, 1,560 MT of lentils, 1,000 MT of yellow peas, and 820 MT of vegetable oil.
- According to WFP, more than 3 million people will require emergency food assistance at the peak of the hunger period from July to October 2005. If sufficient and necessary conditions exist to enable farmers to prepare for the agricultural season, the number of beneficiaries could fall slightly in November and December 2005.
- WFP reported that the use of the Libya corridor to support Sudanese refugees in eastern Chad is benefiting WFP's capacity to augment road and air food deliveries to Darfur. On April 25, 19 trucks loaded with 380 MT of commodities arrived safely from Abeche, Chad to Geneina, West Darfur. During the week, the GOS also agreed to allow WFP to airlift food from Al Khufra in southeast Libya to El Fasher and Nyala.
- WFP reported that as of April 24 headcounts have been completed in 62 percent of the total IDP camps and locations, representing 43 percent of the total previously registered beneficiaries. WFP plans to complete the exercise by the end of April; however, limited staffing capacity in West Darfur has slowed the registration exercise.

## IDP Relocations

- According to the USAID/DART, UNHCR reported that sheiks representing IDPs living in the Abu
  Zar school compound approached a nongovernmental organization (NGO) about the possibility of
  relocating some residents from Abu Zar to Krinding II camp, assuming there is sufficient capacity in
  Krinding II to receive the IDPs. One benefit of the relocation would be that it would establish a
  precedent for voluntary returns out of Abu Zar.
- According to the U.N., on April 25, the North Darfur Protection Working Group released the report
  of the interagency returns survey that was conducted in North Darfur to determine the factors
  influencing the voluntary return of IDPs to their places of origin. According to the report, 98 percent
  of IDP households surveyed are currently unwilling to return to their villages of origin, mainly due
  to insecurity and lack of housing and land.
