CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

International Delegations

- On a second visit to Darfur since April 2005, U.S. Deputy Secretary of State Robert Zoellick traveled to North Darfur on June 3 to visit the Kutum internally displaced persons (IDPs) camp and meet with tribal leaders and African Union (AU) officials. Deputy Secretary Zoellick will also hold talks with the Government of Sudan (GOS) First Vice-President Ali Osman Mohammed Taha and the Special Representative of the U.N. Secretary General for Sudan (SRSG) Jan Pronk in Khartoum.
- After attending the AU pledging conference in Addis Ababa on May 26, U.N. Secretary General Kofi Annan visited Sudan. On May 28, the Secretary General, accompanied by SRSG Pronk and the AU Special Representative Baba Gana Kingibe, visited South Darfur to meet with IDPs in Nyala town, Kalma camp, and Labado. Upon returning to Khartoum, the Secretary General met with Vice-President Taha. The two discussed progress made in Addis Ababa, the current situation in Darfur, and the resumption of political talks in Abuja planned for early June.

Harassment of Humanitarian Agencies

- GOS security forces arrested the Médecins Sans Frontières/Holland (MSF/H) Country Director on May 30 and the Darfur Director on May 31 in response to the organization's March 8 report "The Crushing Burden of Rape-Sexual Violence in Darfur," which documented approximately 500 rapes using medical evidence gathered over a period of more than four months at agency clinics in Darfur. Because the agency will not provide the medical evidence to GOS authorities due to doctor-patient confidentiality issues, the GOS has charged MSF/H with "publishing a false report which harms the general peace." According to OCHA, this issue is being addressed at the highest U.N. and donor levels. On June 2, the U.N. reported that following a meeting with SRSG Pronk, GOS President Omar al-Bashir agreed that charges against the two individuals would be dropped.
- On May 30, the Sudan Vision—a pro-GOS English language newspaper—ran a full-page story accusing the non-governmental organization (NGO) Médecins du Monde (MDM) of falsifying a rape report. The article contended that MDM falsified a medical report of a supposed rape victim in Kalma camp in March, since a subsequent medical examination at a GOS-supported hospital did not reach the same medical conclusions as the MDM report. In a violation of her privacy, the article published the name, age, occupation, and location of the victim. The humanitarian community

remains concerned that harassment such as this will prevent the unhindered treatment of victims of gender-based violence.

• According to a May 31 statement by SRSG Pronk, the Sudanese national who served as an interpreter for the U.N. Secretary General during his visit to Darfur was requested repeatedly to report to GOS authorities in Nyala following the visit. The SRSG noted that following discussions with the U.N., local authorities ceased demands that the interpreter report to GOS authorities. During his visit to South Darfur, the U.N. Secretary General stressed the importance of IDPs' open communication with the visiting delegation, without any fear of arrest or reprisal.

Humanitarian Assistance

• On June 1, the GOS Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) began charging landing fees for planes carrying humanitarian assistance, except U.N. aircraft. In a May 26 letter, the CAA stated that the exemption granted to relief organizations working in Darfur only applies to aircraft owned by the organizations and not to planes contracted to carry relief commodities. USAID/OFDA airlifts of relief commodities on June 1 and 3 had to pay these new landing fees. At this time, it is unclear whether the fees are set or based on the weight or value of the cargo.

Health

• The GOS Ministry of Health (MOH) announced the launch of a new leprosy control campaign that will run from June 2005 to June 2006. This campaign will cover all of Darfur and will be coordinated with the Government of Chad. The goals of the campaign are to reduce the incidence of the disease and to help people already infected to cope with resulting disabilities. The MOH also reports the need to conduct a public education campaign to mitigate stigma against individuals infected with leprosy.

Infrastructure Repair

• On May 27, the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) visited three locations where the NGO L'Agence d'Aide à la Coopération Technique et au Développement (ACTED) is implementing a USAID/OFDA-supported emergency road repair project. The program focuses on the improvement of 11 river-bed (wadi) crossings, 1 elevated bridge, and the repair of pot holes on selected roads. ACTED has also completed resurfacing approximately three kilometers of the road used to access the main roads to Habila and Masteri from Geneina. ACTED's programs create income generation opportunities for the local population. Due to the challenging security environment, ACTED's site security plan includes: escorting workers to and from the work sites as needed; concentrating work sites in small areas with large numbers of workers; and marking work sites with visible ACTED logos.

USG Assistance

• USAID's Office of Transition Initiatives (USAID/OTI) approved its first small grant in Darfur through implementing partner Development Alternatives Inc. (DAI) to the "Union of Kalma and Otash Camp Community Center Committees" in South Darfur. The grant supports an income generation project for IDPs to weave grass mats and the activity will be coordinated directly with CHF International, which runs a grass mat initiative in the camps as part of a shelter and employment program. The completed mats benefit USAID/OFDA-funded CHF shelter activities, among other NGO initiatives. This three-month grant will directly benefit 600 IDP women in Kalma and Otash camps and an additional 150 women in surrounding villages who will supply grass. This grant exemplifies the increasing linkages between protection and income generation programming. *Beneficiary Re-registration*

A number of security incidents over the past two weeks involving international workers led to the May 30 closure to U.N. agencies of Krinding II IDP camp in West Darfur. All incidents appear to be related to the sheikhs' refusal to take part in the U.N. World Food Program (WFP) beneficiary reregistration exercise and the apparent association of all foreigners with that process. On May 31, the camp was reopened, allowing U.N. representatives to meet with the sheikhs, who have not yet agreed to allow the re-registration process to go forward. However, the sheiks agreed to ensure security for relief workers and to allow WFP to distribute a flyer to IDPs explaining the need for reregistration in order to continue with food distributions.
