#### **CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION**

Security

According to WFP, several security incidents delayed food assistance deliveries this week. On June 16, eight armed men on camelback ambushed six trucks transporting WFP food commodities north of Labado, South Darfur. Thirty-two bags of sugar and two bags of sorghum were looted. On June 18, armed men stopped a convoy of WFP-contracted trucks en route to Kabkabiyah, North Darfur, stealing three bags of cereals and demanding money before allowing the trucks to proceed. On June 19, road transport to Manawashi, South Darfur, was suspended following heavy fighting between the Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A) and GOS forces. WFP-contracted trucks carrying commodities along this road returned to established safety zones in South Darfur.

#### NGO Harassment

According to a June 20 Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) press release, GOS officials have dropped all charges against the MSF/Holland Head of Mission in Sudan and Regional Coordinator in Darfur. In late May, GOS officials had charged the two men with publishing false information, undermining Sudanese society, and spying in connection with the publication of the MSF March 8 report "The Crushing Burden of Rape: Sexual Violence in Darfur."

#### Peace Negotiations

- Negotiations to end the crisis in Darfur continued this week in Abuja, Nigeria between the GOS and the opposition SLM/A and the Justice and Equality Movement (JEM).
- The GOS signed an accord with the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) on June 18. The NDA is a coalition of predominantly northern-based political groups that coalesced in 1989 in opposition to GOS President Omar El-Bashir. According to the agreement, the NDA will be included in the Government of National Unity, though it remains unclear what percent of seats the NDA will hold.

### Kalma Camp

On June 17, the Deputy Special Representative of the U.N. Secretary General Manuel da Silva and the GOS Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs visited Nyala town and Kalma camp. The two met with the Wali (governor) of South Darfur to discuss a range of issues including the ongoing GOS commercial blockade of the camp, potential relocation of IDPs, and the risk of flooding within the camp. According to OCHA, the Wali stated that Kalma camp poses a health and security threat to all of Nyala and warned that the number of IDPs must be reduced substantially. Sheiks at Kalma

- remain firm in opposing mass relocations and reluctant to approve re-registration of IDPs. OCHA reported that IDPs in Kalma should consider relocating to alternative sites, since up to 40 percent of Kalma is expected to flood during the rainy season, and under international humanitarian law IDPs can be moved out of harm's way. However, OCHA also noted that potential for conflict remains high if relocations from Kalma are not handled appropriately.
- According to the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART), on June 20, humanitarian agencies began an information campaign for IDPs in Kalma camp. The campaign is aimed at providing information to IDPs about potential voluntary relocations to the nearby Al Salaam camp. The campaign uses discussion groups that visit IDPs to discuss their concerns, and it provides an opportunity for IDPs to visit Al Salaam before deciding whether or not to relocate. Approximately 50 percent of IDPs reached so far appeared interested in a "look-see" visit. However, there are reports that some elements in the camp are trying to undermine the success of the information campaign.

#### Health

• On June 21, the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO), the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF), and the GOS Ministry of Health (MOH) submitted a joint appeal to donors in order to meet funding shortfalls for the upcoming measles immunization campaign. The total budget required for the campaign is more than \$2 million, of which \$1.5 million is still required to purchase vaccines and supplies, and to support the cold chain, transportation, social mobilization, and training. According to WHO and UNICEF, the campaign will target nearly 1.7 million infants and children and will likely take place in late July or early August. Vitamin A will also be administered to all eligible children during the campaign.

### Relocations

• The USAID/DART reported that 25,000 IDPs are expected to relocate voluntarily from Abu Shouk to Al Salaam camp in North Darfur by July 19. The relocation process began on June 18 with the move of an initial 142 families who walked to Al Salaam while the GOS trucked belongings to the new site. Upon arrival, the IDPs registered with camp authorities, participated in a health and nutrition screening, and received shelter kits.

# Beneficiary Re-registration

- According to WFP, beneficiary re-registration exercises in several IDP camps turned violent this
  week, as groups armed with sticks and stones attacked humanitarian staff attempting to conduct
  head-counts. WFP indicated that these are well-orchestrated campaigns by sheiks and other
  powerful figures within camps to prevent an accurate headcount in order to continue benefiting from
  excess food rations. Although no serious injuries were reported, IDPs violently ended recent reregistration exercises in Mornei, Karnak, Sisi, Kass, and Kalma camps.
- During the latest exercise in Masteri, West Darfur, only 4,000 IDPs were re-registered, as compared to 20,000 in the previous registration. Faced with the possibility of so few IDPs receiving rations, 108 sheiks from the Masteri area approached WFP, saying that they are now willing to support a complete re-registration exercise. WFP stated that it hopes recalcitrant sheiks at other camps will follow the example of the Masteri sheiks, and support re-registration.

### Locusts

• According to the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), locusts have been sighted in all three Darfur states, though no significant damage has been reported to date. A total of 1,866 ha have been reported infested with low to medium density adult locusts. Copulating and laying locusts were also seen in several locations in North Zalingei in West Darfur and North Darfur. Hopper bands will likely begin to appear in the coming weeks. The GOS Ministry of Agriculture (MOA) Plant Protection Department (PPD) is carrying out field surveys to locate and control the locusts but the security situation in the region could further complicate survey and control operations. FAO is currently dedicating \$50,000 for desert locust spray control but estimates that more funding may be needed. FAO is looking into the possibility of aerial support for spraying operations.
