CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

Security

- The U.N. reported on June 28 that the African Union Civilian Police (AU Civ Pol) deployed a team of eight representatives to El Salaam internally displaced person (IDP) camp in South Darfur on a 24 hour basis.
- According to U.N. reports, Sudanese and Chadian nomads clashed on June 25 along the Chadian border between Masteri and Kango Haraza, and at locations near Terbiba, West Darfur. The U.N. declared the area "no go" for U.N. movement, and NGOs have temporarily withdrawn staff. The AU is investigating the clashes.

Health

- On June 24, the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) rescinded a cholera alert for Abu Shouk • IDP camp in North Darfur. WHO issued the alert on June 14 in response to a case of acute watery diarrhea that was later found not to be cholera. Previous reports of three cholera cases among NGO workers in South Darfur were later confirmed to be typhoid. A June 19 report of an IDP with cholera in Kalma camp, South Darfur could not be verified. According to the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF), the lead U.N. agency for water and sanitation, the water in Kalma camp is safe, and the IDP was unlikely to have had cholera.
- WHO reported that donors have provided resources for the measles campaign to take place in all three Darfur states. The campaign will occur July 23 to 30. WHO and the Government of Sudan (GOS) Ministry of Health (MOH) are requesting support from NGOs for transport and logistics.

Morbidity Surveillance

According to a U.N. press release issued on June 28, findings from the recently completed Darfurwide mortality survey show mortality "has significantly declined but the health of the people remains extremely fragile." The survey examined mortality from mid-November through May for IDPs in camps, displaced populations outside of camps, and residents affected by the conflict. The survey team interviewed more than 26,000 people across Darfur. In all population groups surveyed, the crude mortality rate (CMR) was approximately 0.8 deaths per 10,000 people per day, which is below the international crisis threshold of 1 death per 10,000 people per day. The full report will be issued this month.

In North Darfur, the Primary Health Care Task Force is piloting a health reporting activity in response to requests for improved reporting of morbidity indicators. WHO's existing morbidity tracking system, the Early Warning Alert and Response Network (EWARN), records the number of cases of the 12 most common public health illnesses including acute respiratory infection, malaria, jaundice, meningitis, bloody diarrhea, neonatal tetanus, and measles. Based on frequency of reporting, the North Darfur State MOH revised its reporting form to include seven additional indicators: intestinal worms, animal bites, mental health, sexually transmitted diseases, skin conditions, typhoid fever, and ophthalmic conditions.

Water and Sanitation

USAID's Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (USAID/OFDA) implementing partner Action Contre la Faim (ACF) transported a drilling rig to El Salaam IDP camp in South Darfur to finish the drilling of two additional boreholes for the camp. ACF completed the second borehole this week, and ACF is scheduled to start a third in the coming days.

Beneficiary Re-Registration

At Kalma and Kass IDP camps in South Darfur, sheiks (tribal leaders) have voiced support for new population headcounts. In several camps in West and South Darfur, previous attempts ended in violent confrontations by IDP groups armed with sticks and stones. According to the U.N., WFP received a petition on June 26 with 52,000 signatures from IDPs who have agreed to be re-registered in Mornei camp, West Darfur. Last week, just 17,000 of an estimated 80,000 to 90,000 IDPs in Mornei had been registered. Only registered IDPs are scheduled to receive food rations in July.

Returns and Relocations

- In North Darfur, more than 9,000 people have relocated to El Salaam camp from Abu Shouk camp, and the U.N. reports that these relocations have been proceeding smoothly. This represents approximately half of the total number expected to relocate by mid-July.
- The International Organization for Migration (IOM) has indicated that not all organized return cases are being reported to IOM by the Sudanese Committee for Voluntary Return (CVR) and many of them are reported with insufficient time for IOM to determine if the returns are voluntary and appropriate. IOM also noted that it continues to receive information about returns that is not credible or cannot be verified. The GOS Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) has stated that all CVR numbers are given to IOM and explained that the reporting process becomes complicated since the people themselves move quickly. HAC reported that 233,236 people returned from June 30, 2004 to June 22, 2005; however, IOM does not have verification of these numbers.

Food Security

Long-range forecasts predict an average or drier-than-average June to September rainfall for the greater Darfur area. According to WFP, widespread and significant rainfall in May that extended into North Darfur did not continue in June. In the southern half of South Darfur and a small area in West Darfur, satellite-derived vegetation maps show significant vegetation development. However, planting conditions were not detected in other regions of Darfur due to the dry conditions in early June. Forecasts of significant rainfall amounts in West Darfur are likely to be overestimated, and dry conditions throughout North Darfur and upper South Darfur are expected to continue.

Locusts

The U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) is calling for intensified desert locust surveys and early action in Sudan and Eritrea to forestall a potential locust infestation. In early June, locust swarms originating in West Africa reached West and North Darfur, where the locusts matured and laid eggs. FAO warned that swarm formation may start in Darfur by the end of June and emphasized the importance of current locust surveys in Sudan, Eritrea, and Ethiopia. Normally, FAO recommends that communities fight locusts during the immature stage by digging open trenches and burying hopper bands. However, in Darfur, the current conflict has forced most farmers from the land, and humanitarian agencies report there are not enough people available for trench digging.
