# **CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION**

Security

- On July 23, the U.N. Department of Safety and Security (UNDSS) received reports of an armed ambush against Government of Sudan (GOS) military along the Nyala-El Fasher road. An unconfirmed number of GOS troops died in the attack. According to the U.N. Mission in Sudan (UNMIS), armed clashes between GOS forces and Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A) elements occurred on July 24 near Shangil Tobayi in North Darfur. UNDSS reported additional fighting between GOS and SLM/A forces north of Hamada, South Darfur on July 24. Two GOS helicopter were reportedly engaged in the fighting near Hamada.
- On July 21, UNDSS received a report of an anti-tank mine located 25 km west of Kutum in North Darfur. The U.N. Mine Action Service (UNMAS) and the African Union Mission in Sudan (AMIS) dispatched teams to investigate the site. UNMAS verified that a mine without a fuse was planted in the road and that the surrounding area was not mined. As a standard security precaution, UNDSS declared the area between Fata Borno, Dibbis, Dili, and Gibsra closed to U.N. movement. OCHA notified non-governmental organizations (NGOs) working in the area.

Relocation

• On July 24, OCHA reported that the GOS Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC), with support from the GOS police, began relocating an unknown number of IDPs from Al Sereif IDP camp to Al Salam IDP camp in South Darfur on July 22. According to OCHA, an inter-agency team visited Al Salam on July 23 and reported that between 500 and 1,000 individuals had been moved. OCHA indicated that the relocated IDPs were not official residents of Al Sereif, rather recent arrivals who were settling outside the camp boundaries. OCHA reported that many of the new arrivals to Al Sereif appeared to be Nyala residents seeking to benefit from relief supply distributions at the camp. According to OCHA and the International Organization for Migration (IOM), the HAC has declared Al Sereif camp closed to new arrivals. IOM declared the relocation exercise in violation of the Management and Coordination Mechanism (MCM) procedures previously agreed upon by the GOS, U.N., and IOM for the voluntary return of IDPs, in which the GOS agreed to notify IOM in advance of any relocation. The USAID/DART

reports that the humanitarian community agreed to provide emergency assistance to the new arrivals; however, no decision has been made as to additional assistance.

# **Re-registration**

- IOM reported that all but approximately 6,000 IDPs in Mornei IDP camp, West Darfur, had reregistered when riots broke out during food distributions on July 16. The USAID/DART reported that the registration of the remaining IDPs concluded on July 26 and that food distributions resumed on July 27 without incident. The food distribution process is expected to continue through early August.
- According to WFP, general food distributions resumed in Thur IDP camp in South Darfur on • July 21 after the completion of a successful headcount. WFP expressed confidence that this advance will have a positive influence on re-registration exercises in other IDP camps.

# Health

- After a delay due to a lack of financial resources, preparations are currently underway for the measles vaccination campaign in Darfur. USAID/OFDA provided \$832,000 to WHO and \$500,000 to the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF) for the campaign. The first phase of the program is scheduled to begin in all Darfur states in mid-August.
- The U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) announced the successful completion of the fifth round of the national polio vaccination campaign in Sudan.

#### Protection

- According to the U.N. Population Fund (UNFPA), the GOS announced the establishment of a committee to investigate cases of rape and sexual violence against women in Darfur. The GOSaffiliated Human Rights Advisory Council reportedly stated that in addition to the committee, a media campaign lead by prominent Sudanese women will also be launched to de-stigmatize rape survivors.
- USAID/DART representatives recently traveled to Garsila in West Darfur to meet with U.N. • agencies and NGOs operational in the area and assess the current humanitarian situation. OCHA recently established a permanent presence in the region with a humanitarian affairs officer based in Garsila and a protection officer traveling between Garsila and Zalingei, West Darfur. The USAID/DART received reports of physical disputes between farmers planting land and pastoralists whose animals graze on recently planted land. Most incidents occurred outside of Garsila town and in small villages where GOS police presence was limited. While traveling to Garsila via helicopter, the USAID/DART observed numerous herds grazing over recently tilled land.

#### Water and Sanitation

- The USAID/DART recently visited Otash IDP camp in South Darfur accompanied by representatives of UNICEF, the International Rescue Committee (IRC), and the GOS Water and Environmental Sanitation Agency (WES). Chlorinated water was available in all sectors of Otash; however, a wait of up to 30 minutes in line is reportedly common. IRC assigned women latrine attendants to monitor and clean the latrines. The attendants are paid a small incentive every two weeks. The USAID/DART noted that all latrines observed were clean at the time of the visit.
- According to UNICEF, an estimated 62,000 IDPs in the Al Deain area of South Darfur are in • need of improved access to water and sanitation. UNICEF plans to drill at least one new borehole and rehabilitate two others in the vicinity.
