CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

Humanitarian Access

At an August 9 briefing, the U.N. Department of Safety and Security (UNDSS) reported that a U.N. organization traveling on the Nyala-Gereida route encountered three Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A) checkpoints between Donkey Dereisa and Nyala, one of which was near a Government of Sudan (GOS) special police camp. While the vehicles were permitted to pass, UNDSS expressed concern that the SLM/A checkpoints were located in an area largely controlled by the GOS. UNDSS has declared the road between the Nyala checkpoint at Kashalongo and Donkey Dereisa "no-go", and the African Union (AU) plans to dispatch a patrol to monitor the route. The USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) notes that if the route remains closed, the humanitarian activities of several USAID/OFDA partners are likely to be affected.

Security

 According to the USAID/DART, on August 9, nine WFP vehicles were fired upon on the road from Sisi to Geneina, resulting in no injuries or damages. WFP reported that two WFP vehicles were robbed on August 7 along the same route, approximately 25 km from Geneina town. UNDSS reported that on August 6, unknown gunmen attacked a commercial truck carrying WFP food 12 km south of Nertiti, killing the driver.

Kalma Camp

• The USAID/DART reports that two GOS police officers joined the African Union Mission in Sudan (AMIS) civilian police station in Kalma camp, South Darfur. Lengthy negotiations with internally displaced persons (IDPs), who have continuously rejected GOS police presence in Kalma, preceded the arrival of the two officers. However, joint AMIS-GOS patrols remain suspended. On August 11, the USAID/DART observed a meeting in which a Kalma camp representative met with 350 camp sheiks to discuss plastic sheeting distribution, introduce the police commander and AU civilian police, and plan for the headcount in Kalma.

Sexual and Gender-Based Violence

• According to the USAID/DART, the U.N. Population Fund (UNFPA) has begun collaborating with the South Darfur *wali* (governor) on a strategy to combat sexual and gender-based violence. In June and July, UNFPA provided training on the issue to local and international

medical providers in South Darfur. The USAID/DART reports that the U.N. Mission in Sudan-Human Rights will co-chair the sexual and gender-based violence committee that the South Darfur *wali* formed in May, with participation from the Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) and various GOS ministries.

Water and Sanitation

USAID/OFDA partner the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF), in conjunction with the GOS Office of Water and Environmental Sanitation (WES), completed drilling of three boreholes to be fitted with hand pumps around Al Salam camp in Kailla and El Naseem villages, North Darfur. In addition, UNICEF/WES plans to drill two additional boreholes around the area to prevent people from outside the camps from congesting and placing additional pressure on existing camp facilities. With support from UNICEF, WES conducted a three-day orientation workshop for WES staff on water chlorination and hygiene promotion.

Rains

On August 3, heavy rains caused extensive damage to structures in and around El Fasher, North Darfur. The GOS conducted a rapid needs assessment on August 4 and identified 694 households severely affected by the downpour. GOS authorities distributed 380 sacks of sorghum—one per household—to affected families in the area before exhausting emergency food supplies. The USAID/DART reported that WFP provided the remaining 314 households with a two-week ration of grain, as well as salt, sugar, and pulses to all affected households. In addition, the U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) provided emergency relief supplies to the affected families, including plastic sheeting, blankets, water containers, and soap.

Re-Registration

WFP recently led a series of events with sheiks and other community leaders to discuss ongoing difficulties with the re-registration process in IDP camps in and around Geneina, West Darfur. Community representatives reiterated IDPs' concerns that the re-registration process was associated with forced relocations. OCHA pledged to intervene in any attempt at forced returns. On August 8, after extensive discussions, the participants agreed to support the re-registration process that would proceed as soon as possible, followed by food distribution. Community leaders pledged to communicate the agreement and details of the re-registration process to IDPs. Locusts

According to an August 10 report from the USAID/OFDA's Assistance for Emergency Locust and Grasshopper Abatement (AELGA) project, the locust situation in Darfur continued to deteriorate in early August. Immature adults and hoppers were detected on more than 4,100 hectares in accessible areas in West and North Darfur through ground survey operations carried out by the GOS Plant Protection Department. Due to continued rainfall, small swarms of locusts are likely to form in North and West Darfur states over the coming weeks and may begin migrating into the neighboring states in the east and northern parts of the country.

Land Tenure

The USAID/DART reported that U.N. agencies and NGOs in South Darfur are forming an ad hoc Land Tenure Taskforce to identify land tenure issues facing IDPs. The taskforce plans to conduct an informal assessment in four to eight locations.

Government of National Unity

- On August 11, Southern Sudanese leader Salva Kiir was sworn in as First Vice President of Sudan, following the death of his predecessor, John Garang, in a helicopter accident on July 30. AU Peacekeeping Mission
- On August 11, an additional 700 AU peacekeepers from Nigeria traveled to Darfur. By October, the AU plans to have a 7,000-person force in place to report violations, protect civilians at immediate risk, and monitor the ceasefire.
