

Investment Breakdown

Emergency/Recovery Phases (Sept 1998- Aug.1999) \$41.7 million

- USAID/OFDA (Immediate Emergency Aid) -\$2 million: helicopters, tents	\$2.1. m
-USAID (P.L. 480 Title II)	\$10.2 m
-USAID (Child Survival Funds)	\$ 6.0 m
-USAID/OFDA -\$2 million: Temporary shelter/latrines from felled trees -\$609,000: land-leveling; replanting plantains -300,000: generators, plastic sheeting, vegetable seeds	\$ 2.9 m
-USDA/FAS (416(b) Program) -USAID (DA) -\$1 million - USDA PASA -\$500,000 - Management Costs	\$15 m \$1.5 m
-US Military (rebuilding schools/bridge)	\$ 4 m



IR 5: Disasters Mitigated Investment: \$4.4 million

Goals:

- 6,300 Hectares Treated with Improved Soil Conservation (including reforestation)
