## USAID Recognizes World AIDS Day

## UNAIDS Releases AIDS Epidemic Update 2002

In honor of World AIDS Day 2002, the United Nations Joint Programme on HIV/AIDS released the annual "AIDS Epidemic Update: December 2002," on November 26, 2002, in collaboration with the World Health Organization. The 2002 edition reports on the latest developments in the global HIV/AIDS epidemic and regional summaries, provides the most recent estimates of the epidemic's scope and human toll, explores new trends in the epidemic's evolution, and features a special section examining the links between HIV/AIDS and humanitarian crises. ## USAID Announces Partnership with Internews

The U. S. Agency for International Development announced a $\$ 2.4$ million award to Internews Network to improve the ability of broadcast media in Kenya and Nigeria to effectively cover the HIV/AIDS epidemic over the next two years. The Local Voices program takes a new approach to involving media in the struggle against HIV/AIDS, and seeks to foster a more supportive social environment for preventing and mitigating the impacts of HIV/AIDS, through an enlightened and committed local broadcast community. A recent report by the United Nations found that radio is a major source for HIV/AIDS information in 36 countries. In surveys, about half of female respondents, and 70 percent of males, mentioned hearing about AIDS on the radio. ## Survey Confirms HIV/AIDS Epidemic Still Widespread in Zambia

Newly released preliminary results from the Zambia Demographic and Health Survey, conducted in 20012002, show 16 percent of all Zambians age 15 to 49 are HIV-positive. The survey, which received financial and technical assistance through the USAID-funded MEASURE DHS+ program managed by ORC Macro, represents the first fully national, population-based assessment of HIV prevalence in Zambia. A groundbreaking mother-to-child transmission program in South Africa is providing valuable lessons and hope. Recognizing the acuteness of the AIDS crisis in southern Africa, public health officials, doctors, nurses, and counselors are working together, overcoming obstacles, and providing HIV/AIDS related health services to some 25,000 pregnant women in the Western Cape. ## New Publications on Preventing Mother-to-Child Transmission of HIV

"Ndola Demonstration Project: A Midterm Analysis of Lessons Learned" reveals findings from an intervention study in Zambia to investigate how integrating services for prevention of mother-to-child transmission of HIV into low-resource maternal-child health settings influences mothers' ability to make and implement informed decisions about HIV. The research demonstrated it is feasible to increase women's knowledge of the risks of mother-to-child transmission without eroding good breastfeeding practices. Study partners included Horizons, Hope Humana, LINKAGES, Zambia's National Food and Nutrition Commission, Ndola District Health Management Team, and the Zambia Integrated Health Project. "Prevention of Mother-to-Child Transmission (PMCT) Training Curriculum," a five-module course for health providers, is an integrated approach to prevention of mother-to-child transmission in the maternalchild health care setting. ## Study Reveals HIV/AIDS Epidemic Burdensome to Senior Citizens

A recent study of Tanzanian households, published by the Population Council, presents evidence that the elderly population is severely impacted by increased mortality rates among young adults. Caring for AIDS patients places an additional burden on the elderly, resulting in health implications and loss of wages. The study is based on a research project sponsored by the World Bank, USAID, and Danida.
