USAID Awards \$35 Million Health Services Program

USAID has awarded Family Health International (FHI) and its partners \$35 million to lead a five-year program in the Dominican Republic to address health issues in family planning, HIV/AIDS, sexually transmitted infections, maternal mortality, child survival, and health sector reform. Family Health International will implement the program, *ConectaSalud*, through a partnership with U.S.-based Abt Associates, Inc. and the Dominican firm *Agencia Latinoamericana de Expertos en Planificacion H*, in collaboration with numerous local community organizations.

Ghana Launches "Reach Out, Show Compassion" Campaign

Muslim and Christian religious leaders will foster support and compassion for those living with HIV/AIDS under a new program launched this month in Ghana. "Reach Out, Show Compassion" for people living with HIV/AIDS is the second phase of the successful "Stop AIDS, Love Life" national communication program, which began in February 2000. Stop AIDS, Love Life is a joint effort of the Ghana Ministries of Information and Health, the Ghana Social Marketing Foundation, and the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health Center for Communication Programs, with support from USAID. Global Health Council Board Members Elected to Institute of Medicine

Global Health Council board members Robert Black and Afaf Meleis, along with Council president and CEO, Nils Daulaire, have been elected to the Institute of Medicine. They join Gro Brundtland, retiring head of World Health Organization, and Richard Feacham, executive director of the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria, on this year's list of 65 new members and five foreign associates. New members are elected annually for their major contributions to health and medicine or to related fields such as social and behavioral sciences, law, administration, and economics.

Johns Hopkins to Develop UNICEF Communication Programs

The Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health's Center for Communication Programs will assist UNICEF in developing its strategic communication programs to improve the lives of children in the developing world. Under a three-year Memorandum of Understanding, the two organizations will combine their expertise to concentrate on UNICEF's five priority areas: childhood immunization, girls' education, child protection, integrated early childhood development, and HIV/AIDS.

The Guyana HIV/AIDS/STI Youth Project has launched a new website, www.guyanayouth.com. The interactive site is designed to give Guyanese youth a safe place to learn about HIV/AIDS, access information, and get answers to questions without dealing with the stigma and discrimination that frequently accompany this disease. In Guyana 75 percent of the HIV/AIDS infection is among youth 19-35 and less than 20 percent of those infected is aware of it.

FHI/IMPACT Helps Kenya Develop Blood Donor Strategy

Family Health International/IMPACT and Kenya's National Public Health Laboratory chaired a meeting in Nairobi in October to develop a national blood donor mobilization strategy. Various stakeholders, including the Ministry of Education, Red Cross, private hospitals, and five blood transfusion centers, established by USAID and Family Health International, face the challenge of getting the population to come forward voluntarily to donate blood. This meeting developed a strategy to meet this shortfall, which will be implemented by the government with assistance from the IMPACT Project and other donor organizations. The World Alliance for Breastfeeding Action and UNICEF convened nearly 170 participants in Arusha, Tanzania, September 21-22, 2002, to discuss emerging ideas on appropriate infant feeding for babies born to HIV-positive mothers, and the impact of the HIV pandemic on support for breastfeeding.
