## **ABSTRACT**

The Lake Stevens School District sponsors 14 different interscholastic sports and more than 20 student clubs at its two high schools that serve 2,500 students. Last year 966 students participated in sports. This district of 7,620 students has a significant student drug problem with drug use rates among its 10th and 12th graders at rates above the state average, according to the Washington State Healthy Youth Survey. Students also report that drugs and alcohol are easier to get which may explain why the number of deaths due to drugs is higher in Lake Stevens than in the county and the state. Lake Stevens School District has acted to implement a student drug testing program and over the course of the past year engaged parents, students and the community in developing a school board policy to implement the program. The Lake Stevens Student Drug Testing Policy will apply to all students in grades 9-12 participating in interscholastic, extra-curricular athletics and activities or school sponsored activities. Students wishing to participate will sign a form consenting to the testing and will obtain the written consent of their parents. The district has established a neutral plan for selecting students to be tested that clearly prescribes the random selection method that will ensure that students selected are not singled out on the basis of individualized suspicion or other impermissible criteria. In addition, to the 5-panel test that will test for the following - marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates, cocaine, methaqualone, benzodiazepines, methadone, opiates, PCP and propoxphene, Lake Stevens will randomly select samples to be tested for anabolic steroids. The following measurable outcomes of the testing program are expected:

## Introduction

This proposal is being submitted by the Lake Stevens School District which is one of 296 school districts in Washington State and one of only two districts in Snohomish County that has acted through school board policy to implement student drug-testing.

Lake Stevens School District, located 38 miles north of Seattle, is on the urban fringe of the largest city in Snohomish County, Washington – the city of Everett with a population of 97,500. In the past eight years, more than 2,300 people have moved to Lake Stevens, representing a 67% increase in the city's current population of 29,896 (2000 Census). Between 1990 and 1997, Lake Stevens' urban growth area grew at a 6.2 percent rate, compared with 3.9 percent the previous decade. Current commercial and residential building permits as well as future development plans indicate the growth trend will continue into the foreseeable future. For example, developers requested 1,000 building permits for new homes in and around Lake Stevens just last year.

## Since 1990 the district has experienced 97.7 percent student enrollment growth.

There are more than 40 portable classrooms scattered throughout the district's ten schools to help accommodate more than 7,600 students. The district's largest high school currently enrolls over 2300 students; 715 in ninth grade, 632 in tenth grade, 575 in eleventh grade and 426 in twelfth grade. The second high school enrolls approximately 100 students. Three new elementary schools, one new middle school and an alternative high school have been opened between 1990 and 2000. In Feb. 2005 the district proposed a bond measure in the amount of \$65.5 million dollars to build a new mid-high school (grades 8 and 9), modernize the district's three oldest elementary schools, and modernize the commons building and stadium facility at Lake Stevens

High School. The bond measure was approved with overwhelming community support with a 72.4 percent "yes" vote. The new mid-high is currently planned to be opened in the fall of 2007, the high school's field turf and track has been installed, and the elementary modernizations are planned for 2007.

Lake Stevens high schools and middle schools support 14 different inter-scholastic and extra-curricular sports for boys and girls. It is a sports-minded community, and the number of youth involved in these activities grows each year. The number of students, especially female students, involved in sports has increased dramatically from 1990 to 2000:

Last year, 354 high school students played fall sports, another 192 played winter sports and 346 played spring sports. At the middle schools, the numbers are equally high – (ex. 276 played fall sports). All in all, 966 students participated in sports last year. In addition to the number of students involved in sports, there are more than 20 student clubs at the high schools.

As a result of the area's growth, the community's significant investment in interscholastic and intra-mural sports and activities, and a significant student drug problem, Lake Stevens has positioned itself through board policy and community engagement to implement a student drug-testing program.

## (1) Need for the Project

### (a) Magnitude of student drug use

The Lake Stevens School District includes two high schools (Lake Stevens High with an enrollment of 2,800 and Prove High School with an enrollment of 100), two middle schools and

six elementary schools). The total district enrollment is 7,620. The student population is primarily white, and 23% of the students qualify for free/reduced priced lunch.

Lake Stevens School District administers the Washington State Survey of Adolescent Health Behaviors (WSSAHB) every two years as recommended by the state's Division of Alcohol and Drug Abuse. This survey is given to 6<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> graders and provides a clear picture of the alcohol and other drug use among youth and as well as other measures of community, school, family, and peer-individual risk factors. The following is current data for our 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> graders that demonstrate the significant need for a student drug-testing program and expanded follow-up referral, education and student assistance program.

Drug Use

Quite consistently across drug classifications, our students are using drugs at rates higher than Washington State averages. Use in the past 30 days is reflected in the chart below that report the percent of students using according to the 2004 WSSAHB.

In addition to the use in the past 30 days, questions on the 2004 WSSAHB, students were also asked "how many times in the past year have you been drunk or high at school?" Again,

23.3% of our 12<sup>th</sup> grade students compared to only 18.1% of students statewide reported being drunk or high at school. At the 10<sup>th</sup> grade, 4.3% of students reported being drunk at school compared to only 3.4% of students statewide.

## Access to Drugs

In Snohomish County, drugs are easily accessible and the Interstate 5 corridor provides for easy trafficking. In Lake Stevens, students were asked 2004 WSSAHB "if you wanted to get a drug like cocaine, LSD or amphetamines, how easy would it be for you to get some?" The results are reported in the chart below.

Easier access to alcohol and other drugs may help explain the high rate of drug and alcohol related deaths in the Lake Stevens community, the increased rate of deaths over the past five years, and the fact that the rate exceeds the Washington State rates. And as the chart below shows, the number of deaths in the Lake Stevens community exceeds both the county and the state averages.

## (b) Other evidence of student drug use in schools

School-based data clearly identifies the presence of risk factors that place Snohomish County youth at a greater risk for substance abuse. Other rates from the 2004 Healthy Youth Survey that were above the state rates include the following:

- ☐ Friends' use of drugs (31.2% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders and 32.1% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders)
- ☐ Smoking marijuana **before age 14** (31.2% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders and 21.7% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders)
- ☐ Used inhalants (6.6% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders and 9.8% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders)
- ☐ Used methamphetamines (5.5% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders)

In addition to these above state average rates of drug use, students at Lake Stevens' high schools also report little opportunity for prosocial involvement. When compared to statewide averages, Lake Stevens students see much less opportunity and fewer rewards for prosocial involvement. The chart below presents these data from the WSSAHB.

Finally, in Lake Stevens, the rates for the number of children ages 10-17 who are receiving state-funded alcohol or drug services are increasing dramatically. According to the WA Department of Social and Health Services (Treatment and Assessment Report, 2005), the rates per 1,000 of the number of children receiving services has increased from 6.83/1000 in 1999 to 9.43/1000 in 2004.

## (2) Significance

## (a) Review of federal and state laws and Supreme Court decisions

Development of our local policy (see Appendix A for a copy of the school board policy) was based on a review of federal and state laws, recent Supreme Court decisions and suggested federal guidelines. The cases most relevant for Lake Stevens are the Vernonia School District vs Acton case and the Earls vs Tecumseh Public School District. The Vernonia decision upheld the policy for the use of random, suspicionless drug testing of student athletes. The Earls case upheld mandatory, random testing of students participating in any extracurricular activity. The Lake Stevens policy clearly defines which groups of students may be tested. In Lake Stevens the problem of drug use has been established – the results of the WA State Healthy Youth Survey demonstrate the level of drug use and presence of substance abuse risk factors. The district feels compelled to provide a safe and drug-free learning environment and has determined to test all students participating in athletics and extra-curricular activities.

The Lake Stevens School District policy language was further developed and aligned to guidelines provided by the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP). For example, the guidelines advise that the development of local policy involve the entire community and provide ample opportunities for public input. In Lake Stevens those consulted included students, parents, community leaders, drug prevention and treatment professionals, and staff at schools that already have drug-testing programs, in addition to local school board members, school administrators and high school staff. We also followed the advice that local policy should include a statement of purpose and intent. In *Earls*, the Court affirmed "the School District's important interest in

detecting and preventing drug use among its students" and concluded that "the Policy effectively serves the School District's interest in protecting its students' safety and health."

Confidentiality will be protected by our other school board policies addressing district compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) which prohibits student records from being released, including drug and alcohol testing results, without the consent of the parents or if the student is 18, without the student's consent and by the federal Confidentiality of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Patient Records regulations which protects student drug treatment records.

Finally, the Schaill vs Tippecanoe School Corporation case was reviewed particularly for its emphasis on the consequences for students testing positive – consequences that emphasized counseling rather than expulsion. In Lake Stevens, the drug testing program is designed to provide referral to treatment or counseling of students through the schools' Student Assistance Program.

## (b) School and community support for program

For the past several years school leaders expressed concerns regarding the level of drug and alcohol use by Lake Stevens High School students. Parents, police officers, student leaders and school board members also expressed these concerns. As a result of these expressed concerns, the district held a number of Community Forums beginning in 2004 to engage all stakeholders in a conversation about the level of drug and alcohol use by Lake Stevens High School students. These forums continued into the 2005-2006 school year. To help address these issues the Lake Stevens School Board authorized the creation of a Student Assistance Program (SAP) at our high schools with the goal of changing the high school culture to prevent widespread drug use. They will provide confidential support and information services to students and families with concerns and questions about substance abuse, make community referrals to

local resources, provide a safe and private place for students and concerned adults to explore what they might need and provide consultation and assistance for faculty. All services are confidential. A wide variety of strategies are being used to keep students clean and sober. However, reported drug use and availability as well as the presence of other risk factors remained which then led to the school board directing the superintendent to design and implement a drug testing program for all students engaged in our co-curricular programs. The superintendent created a task force involving high school teachers, administrators, students, community leaders, and parents to design the testing program. The following was the timeline for the development of the student drug-testing program which demonstrates our thoughtful design process and parent, student, staff and community involvement.

April 27, 2005

The school board received a presentation and update on the successes and challenges of the district's prevention education program and statistical data from the 2004 Healthy Youth and Substance Abuse Survey.

May 11, 2005

The school board was presented with information regarding procedural changes to policy 6310: Substance Abuse Program. Changes addressed PROVE High School's intervention program, which will require drug testing as an enrollment requirement to the alternative school.

May 18, 2005

The school board held a special meeting to discuss and gather information from school administrators and staff members regarding the drug and alcohol prevention program. The Healthy Youth survey was reviewed with concern regarding the fact that a high percentage of students perceive drugs as readily available in the community, that users are not concerned about the risks involved, and the perception that adults are not concerned about youth alcohol use. Discussion included: gaining community

involvement in addressing the issue; increasing intervention curriculum; providing more intervention programs for students; drug testing in co-curricular programs.

June 7, 2005

A special board meeting was held and the public was invited. The purpose was to engage in a conversation with community members/parents about the district's substance abuse program, the results of the Healthy Youth Survey, and to consider programs and strategies for possible implementation to assist students in staying drug and alcohol free.

June - September

On-line survey was posted on the Lake Stevens School District's web site asking for public opinion on aspects/components of a drug and alcohol program. There were 48 responses to the survey with the majority favoring nearly every option that would take action to address drug and alcohol issues. Random drug testing of students participating in co-curricular activities was favored by 80% of the participants.

September 16, 2005

Press release invites parents and community members to a drug and alcohol prevention meeting scheduled for Wednesday, October 19. The goal was to review the results of the committee work to date, the on-line survey results and recommend systems to implement to support drug and alcohol prevention in schools.

October 18, 2005

School board held a special meeting to prepare for October 19 community forum on the district's drug and alcohol prevention program. Discussion followed regarding the use of prescription drugs, Student Assistant Programs, random testing, sending clear messages that drug and alcohol will not be tolerated, involving parents in discussions and creating a

culture where students and teachers feel comfortable reporting suspected users. It was agreed that implementing a Student Assistance Program and a CARE Team should be an immediate priority. Agenda was set. October 19, 2005 A review of the meetings, discussions and survey was presented to attendees. The community members met in teams to discuss the executive summary of the survey as well as possible program components. The following was recommended and implemented: ☐ Strict enforcement of current policies, procedures and athletic codes; ☐ Implementation of a Student Assistance Program; ☐ Improved strategies to reach parents; ☐ Random checking for drugs on campus using police dogs; ☐ Initiating an anonymous tip-line. Principal of PROVE high school reported to the board that she and the October 26, 2005 staff support the need to change in the learning environment and safety at school and support required drug and alcohol testing and a closed campus. January 25, 2006 School board received a report from Intervention Specialists Steve Pitkin and Dana Whitney regarding the Student Assistance Program (SAP) at LSHS. February 9 & 10 School board held a special meeting to discuss a variety of topics including the district's Drug and Alcohol Prevention Program. A presentation by the SAP team was provided and discussion followed regarding the referral process, confidentiality, holding staff accountable, educating the community, drug testing, and community resources.

April 19, 2006

School board heard a report from the athletic director presenting information on the high school athletic code. Two senior students were present to provide their perspectives on the code and if it was adhered to by student athletes and if it was a deterrent to student participation in alcohol and drugs.

May 24, 2006

Discussion item on agenda regarding the district's Drug and Alcohol Prevention Program. Board directed superintendent to initiate a program with the beginning of the 2006 school year that will implement random drug testing for all who participate in co-curricular activities at Lake Stevens High School and Prove High School.

## (c) Importance of results or outcomes likely to be attained

The results to be obtained will have a direct and immediate impact on Lake Stevens School District, and we expect to see a dramatic drop in drug use and in the initiation of drug use at earlier ages. The next administrations of the Washington Healthy Youth Survey will be in 2006 and 2008 and these will provide key benchmarks for us. In the big picture, drug testing will send clear and consistent messages about no tolerance for drugs. And more specifically, the following measurable outcomes are expected:

Decrease drug use among target student population by 5% each year
 Decrease the use of steroids among the target student population by at least 3% each year
 Decrease the 30 day use of drugs among 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students by 8% as measured by the WSSAHB in 2008.
 Decrease in the number of students using drugs before the age of 14 by at least 3% annually.

Decrease the incidents of disciplinary actions in the high schools related to drugs and alcohol by 10% each year.

In addition to these expected outcomes for the Lake Stevens School District, we expect our program and its outcomes to have an effect on the 13 other school districts in our county. They will be watching our progress and outcomes. The Lake Stevens' superintendent meets monthly with the superintendents of these other districts and will provide regular summary reports of the program and its progress.

## **Project Narrative**

Quality of Project Design (30 points)

In determining the quality of the project design, the following factors are considered:

- (a) The extent to which the project will be based on up-to-date knowledge from research and effective practice, including the methodology for the random selection of students to be tested and procedures outlining the collection, screening, confirmation, and review of student drug tests by a certified medical review officer.
- (b) The quality of the applicant's plan to develop and implement a mandatory random student drug-testing program that includes--
- (i) evidence of the applicant's readiness to begin mandatory random student drug testing in the first year of the grant; and
- (ii) detailed procedures outlining how the school will respond to a student's positive drug test, including parental notification and referral to student assistance programs, drug education, or formal drug treatment, if necessary.

# (3) Quality of Project Design

# (a) Project based on up-to-date knowledge from research and effective practice

A review of the literature on drug testing in schools that analyzes court cases appears to emphasize the balance between drug testing programs that promote student safety and health and ensuring a young person's fundamental constitutional liberties (Occasional Paper: Drug Testing in Schools from the Institute for Social Research, University of Michigan). Although the number of schools using student drug testing does not appear to be increasing dramatically, schools continue to present a strong argument for drug testing and believe that drug testing can impact substance abuse among youth. At the same time, best practice is clear that drug testing programs must be "effective, confidential and compassionate" (What You Need to Know About Starting A Drug-testing Program, Office of National Drug Control Policy). This same publication suggests that when starting a drug-testing program, strategies and services must be in place to address the needs of students who test positive. Student Assistance Programs are recommended which is the strategy to be used by Lake Stevens. Our program will utilize the SAP and the resources of school-based Intervention Specialists to link students and their parents to services and to provide follow-up support.

One of the issues raised in current research is in regards to the type of drug testing conducted by schools. Robert DuPont and Harvey Graves from the Institute for Behavior and Health published a report, "Smarter Drug Testing" in October, 2005. In this report, the researchers identify the short-comings of the 5-drug panel and address the need for testing to identify drugs such as LSD, Ectasy or anabolic steroids and other performance enhancing compounds. In communities such as Lake Stevens, we know from student reports that steroids

and methamphetamines are being used and our goal is for the drug testing program to identify these. Currently, 29 different anabolic steroids can be detected. The researchers from the Institute for Behavior and Health, recommend that student drug testing include selecting some of the tested urine samples for steroid testing making sure that students do not know which of the urine samples will be tested for steroids to provide an effective deterrent to the use of performance enhancement substances. The process would involve testing every third or forth donor in a random selection pattern. This adds steroid testing with reduced costs.

# (b) Quality of plan to develop student drug-testing program – readiness and procedures for responding to positive drug tests

The Lake Stevens Student Drug Testing Policy will apply to all students in grades 9-12 participating in interscholastic, extra-curricular athletics and activities or school sponsored activities. Students wishing to participate must sign a form consenting to the testing and must obtain the written consent of their parents. The district has established a neutral plan for selecting students to be tested that clearly prescribes the random selection method that will ensure that students selected are not singled out on the basis of individualized suspicion or other impermissible criteria. All students who meet the testing pool criteria will be randomly selected with re-placement, to participate in two (2) testing periods per season. With re-placement means the student will re-inserted into the testing pool for each testing period potentially being selected six (6) times per year. Student numbers will be used in lieu of student names during the random selection process. In addition, to the 5-panel test which will be used for all students and will consist of the following – marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates, cocaine, methaqualone, benzodiazepines, methadone, opiates, PCP and propoxphene, Lake Stevens will screen through random rotation the testing for anabolic steroids.

Laboratory Corp. of America (Lab Corp) will set up a collection facility at the Lake

Stevens High School campuses. They will collect, screen, evaluate, and confirm drug-testing
results from a 5-panel test. The screening will also include additional drugs like steroids. To
ensure confidentiality of data, student numbers will be used in lieu of student names during the
random selection process. Lab Corp will post to a secure, password protected website the
negative screen results. Lab Corp will notify Lake Stevens School District (LSSD)
representative that negative results are available. Pam Sturgeon, Executive Director of High
School Teaching and Learning, will serve as the district's representative. The LSSD
representative will log into secure website for negative results inquiry. Lab Corp will send to the
Medical Resource Officer (MRO); a contracted medical doctor from HealthForce Occupational
Medicine, the nonnegative screen results. The MRO will evaluate and call the LSSD
representative to obtain the phone number of the student in question. The MRO will call the
student to consult with the student alone or with parental involvement; that decision is left up to
the student. Consultation is done in the privacy of the MRO's office.

Lake Stevens has put in place a process for responding to positive or non-negative drug test results and two programs/services for follow-up with students with the intent of helping students to be drug-free. The LSSD representative will contact the Athletic Director at LSHS to relay the student's name and the fact they have a nonnegative result. The Athletic Director will then contact the Student Assistance Program (SAP) at LSHS or PROVE.

The SAP in the Lake Stevens School District has been developed following the recommendations of the National Association of Student Assistance Professionals. SAP will contact the student and meet with student and parents/guardians. An assessment will be completed, and a plan developed to assist the student with moving toward healthy compliance with the drug-free status expected within the school environment. The SAP member will

monitor compliance to the plan. Communication regarding this process will only occur between the student, parent/guardian, and the SAP team member. The program is not set-up as a punitive or discipline program but one to truly help kids with any issue (s) that may be negatively impacting their growth as a person. They will help students with emotional, learning, and behavioral problems and teach resistance and social competency skills all within the best practice model.

The SAP Team is made up of 11 staff members including the school secretary, basic and special education teachers, intervention specialists, counselors, the librarian and principals. The purpose of the Lake Stevens High School SAP team is to support and enhance student learning and well-being through the areas of prevention, intervention, and support as well as to help provide assistance to students who are showing signs of substance abuse, academic, attendance, and behavioral problems.

The SAP operates within a larger high school prevention-based program. At the two high schools, we have 1.5 FTE Intervention Specialists as well as the SAP. The Intervention Specialists present lessons in classrooms; teach specific drug/alcohol prevention curricula such as Project Alert and Life Skills; train, advise and supervise student prevention groups; conduct staff trainings; provide parents with family education; and provide interventions including referrals for assessment and treatment and discipline follow-through. Our Intervention Specialists coordinate the work of the SAP teams.

Students with non-negative drug test results will also be subject to discipline as per the district's Student Rights and Responsibilities and Secondary Discipline Policies (#5100 and #5100.1). Through these policies the following actions will be taken:

☐ If the student participated in the school's athletic program, the student will be unable to suit up or practice for 10 days. Further, he/she will be unable to compete in events for 23

days. These limitations are consistent with the Lake Stevens High School Athletic Code of Conduct.

If the student participates in competitive, extra-curricular, school-sponsored activities, he/she will be unable to compete in events for 23 days during the cleansing period.

Further, if a student is found to have a nonnegative result, his/her inability to participate in the activity cannot have a negative impact on academic achievement. Alternative assignments must be provided by the teacher/coach to ensure the student is given the opportunity to maintain his/her grade.

Provided that compliance and participation restrictions were followed, the student may return to their activity at the end of the time frame designated. The SAP will continue their efforts to support the student.

Management Plan (20 Points)

In determining the quality of the management plan, the following factors are considered:

- (a) The extent to which the applicant describes appropriate chain-of-custody procedures for test samples and demonstrates a commitment to using a federally or nationally accredited lab.

# (4) Management Plan

The Executive Director of High School Teaching and Learning, Pam Sturgeon will manage the project. Ms. Sturgeon served as the high school principal at Lake Stevens High School for four years. She has also been a high school principal in Spokane Public Schools, a district science coordinator for Federal Way Schools and a teacher at middle and high schools. Her current responsibilities include directing the district's health services. The district's athletic director, Ed Bailey, will assist Pam Sturgeon. Teresa Main, will serve as the fiscal officer for the grant.

# (a) Chain of custody procedures for test samples and use of accredited lab

Lab Corporation of America (Lab Corp) has been selected as the company to provide the drug testing. Lab Corp is a SAMHSA certified lab service fully qualified and has detailed written procedures to ensure proper chain of custody of samples, proper laboratory control, and scientifically validated testing methods. Procedures for selecting and handling samples will minimize intrusiveness of the procedure and safeguard the personal and privacy rights of the student.

Laboratory Corp. of America will collect, screen, evaluate, and confirm drug-testing results from a 5-panel test. The screening will also include additional drugs like steroids on a random selection pattern. To ensure confidentiality of data, student numbers will be used in lieu of student names during the random selection process.

Negative Results: Lab Corp will post to a secure, password protected website the negative screen results. Lab Corp will notify LSSD representative that negative results are available. LSSD representative will log into secure website for negative results inquiry.

Nonnegative Results: Lab Corp will send to the Medical Resource Officer (MRO); a contracted medical doctor from HealthForce Occupational Medicine, the nonnegative screen results. The MRO will evaluate and call the LSSD representative to obtain the phone number of the student in question. MRO will call the student to consult with student alone or with parental involvement; that decision is left up to the student. Consultation is done at the MRO's office.

- o If it is determined that the nonnegative screen result is from a medically derived reason or from dietary reasons, then the results are changed to negative and posted to the secure website.
- If the results cannot be determined as negative then LSSD representative is notified of student's nonnegative result.

LSSD representative will contact the Athletic Director at LSHS to relay the student's nonnegative result. Athletic Director will contact the Student Assistance Program at LSHS.

# (b) Quality of plan to ensure confidentiality of drug-test results

Confidentiality will be assured by using numbers rather than student names during the random selection process for both the 5-panel test and the random selection pattern for the anabolic steroids. Negative results will be posted by Lab Corp to a secure, password protected website. Lab Corp will notify Lake Stevens School District (LSSD) representative that negative results are available. LSSD representative will log into secure website for negative results inquiry. For non-negative results, Lab Corp will send the results to the identified MRO who will then evaluate and call the school district representative to obtain the phone number of the student in question. MRO will call the student to consult with student alone or with parental involvement; that decision is left up to the student. Consultation is done at the MRO's office.

- O If it is determined that the nonnegative screen result is from a medically derived reason or from dietary reasons, then the results are changed to negative and posted to the secure website.
- o If the results cannot be determined as negative then LSSD representative is notified of student's nonnegative result.

Upon graduation or departure of Lake Stevens School District, the results related to the tested student will be destroyed.

# (5) Adequacy of Resources

The Lake Stevens School District has laid the groundwork for implementation of a student drug testing program and has the support of staff, students and parents. The district has consulted with Lab Corp to be the contracted drug testing company and has reviewed their work in other districts. Staffing for managing the program has been determined and foliational of local funds will go into supporting the program. Local funding, however, is not sufficient to implement a comprehensive drug testing program as recommended by the Office of National Drug Control Policy and the U.S. Department of Education. Washington State's funding formula for schools places restrictions on the amount of funding available, it is necessary to look for financial support outside of the state funding formula. We are therefore requesting \$152,709 in federal funding to support our comprehensive program that is tailored to meet our community's needs.

A priority is to have a strong and effective Student Assistance Program. Our core SAP team is made up of experience drug/alcohol counselors and other school staff who have committed to making this program work. The SAP has been operating for one year on a limited basis but has established an effective protocol for addressing needs of students. These staff will be the direct link for students and each student whose test is non-negative will be assigned to one of our SAP Team members who will be that student's counselor and provide the follow-up over the course of the school year. If this funding is granted, our staff will be able to devote more time and energy towards the prevention and intervention of drug use in Lake Stevens.

# STUDENT DRUG-TESTING PROGRAM PROPOSAL BUDGET NARRATIVE

#### U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUATION FUNDS

Lake Stevens School District has two (2) Intervention Specialists and eleven (11) Student Assistance Program staff members currently employed with our local levy money; money levied through property taxes. We would like to use grant funding to augment their salary and benefit costs to lessen the burden placed on the Washington State Basic Education funding and our local tax payers. Our state funding has been a decreasing source of revenue to educate our children which places an increase need for local revenues.

The grant funds will pay for 0.5 FTE for our two Intervention specialists (\$50,000), SAP stipends for eleven team members (\$11,625), extra hours and substitute time to allow our SAP members to follow up with students (\$2,600), and training stipends to increase knowledge base of Intervention Specialists (\$1,000) plus benefits (\$17,134). We will also send one person to the Annual Project Directors meeting in year one and two people to the OSDFS National Conference for each year of the project (\$10,000).

The grant funds will also pay for our lab testing and MRO services as described in the program narrative (\$56,650). We will claim 2.5% Federal Indirect Restricted Rates as allowed by Washington State Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (\$3,700).

### LOCAL FUNDS:

Lake Stevens School District will use our local levy money to purchase supplies to enhance the curriculum and pay for the SAP team to attend training or workshops throughout the year.

The supplies will encompass items like banners, posters and promotional materials to promote a parental awareness campaign. We will purchase additional videos to augment our current school materials and develop a library of resources for our SAP team to use to help education our children and parents.

The District will also send SAP designates to training or workshops specifically related to student drug prevention and intervention. This will allow our attendees to bring back materials and information to share with the remaining SAP team members.

All of the details listed here are pertinent to Year 1 of the project. Years 2 through 4 have been escalated at a rate of 5% to account for salary and cost of living increases relative to Washington State.
