Dear Chairman Miller,

I am writing on behalf of the presidents of the United Negro College Fund's (UNCF) 39 member colleges to thank you for your leadership on student aid legislation, specifically the conference report on H.R. 2669.

Of particular interest to the United Negro College Fund, the nation's largest provider of college financial assistance to minority and low-income students is Section 499A of the conference report. This provision calls for an unprecedented investment in Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) by making \$170 million available to HBCUs over two years. This funding will significantly assist HBCUs as they work to increase their capacity and prepare a new generation of students for careers in science, technology and engineering.

As you know, HBCUs have special skills in serving their communities, which include large numbers of low-income or first generation college students. This legislation recognizes the vital role HBCUs play in eliminating disparities in access to quality higher education.

The conference report on H.R. 2669 will significantly enhance the capacity of HBCUs and improve opportunities for minority students. Thank you for your unwavering support of our academic institutions.
