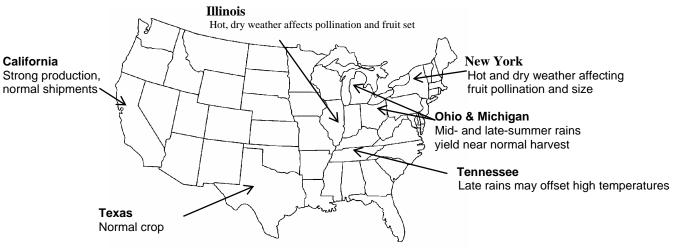

Illinois has become the nation's largest pumpkin shipper increasing from 7,783 to 12,296 acres between 1997 and 2002

Tennessee is a major pumpkin producer nationally and is the major regional competitor for Kentucky. Tennessee pumpkin acreage was between 4,000 and 4,500 acres in 2004 and producers had good yields



Winter squash, gourds, and ornamental corn are effectively merchandised along with pumpkins.

Some Kentucky producers are exploring markets for miniature pumpkins, which can yield good returns for local retail and/or wholesale marketers.

Direct marketing of pumpkins, gourds, ornamental corn, and other fall ornamentals can be a profitable endeavor for growers willing to service a more discriminating customer base.



Direct store delivery of pumpkins to major retailers (Wal-Mart) continues in KY.

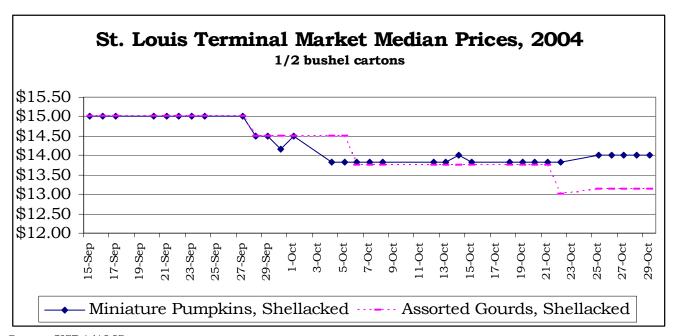

#### Pumpkin/Winter Squash Market Price Information

- Pumpkin season has traditionally begun around Sept. 15, but chain stores continue to demand earlier arrivals.
- Pumpkin prices are generally stable throughout the season. 1,000-lb bins of pumpkins typically trade at terminal markets for \$110-\$175 (\$0.11-\$0.175/lb). KY wholesale prices, delivered to the store, have run about 60% of these terminal market price levels (\$0.065-\$0.11/lb)
- KY producers need to receive as near to the dime-per-pound price range as possible to profitably produce wholesale pumpkins
- Gourds and winter (hard) squash may also be produced profitably by Kentucky growers. Both these crops have good storage potential for marketing throughout the fall season, and in some cases, into winter months. Ky. winter squash growers can breakeven in the \$7.00-\$10.00 per box range.
