

Go For The Gould's ... Wild Turkeys Return To Arizona

Populations of the Gould's wild turkey in **Arizona** are being restored thanks in part to a grant from

Wildlife Forever.

native range in
Arizona,

In a joint project between Wildlife Forever,

the Arizona Game and Fish Department and the National Wild Turkey Federation, 50 Gould's turkeys were captured in Mexico and air transported to a quarantine facility in Arizona. 43 birds survived the 35-day quarantine and were released in the Chiricahua, Pinaleno and Huachuca mountain ranges of southeastern Arizona.

Populations of the Gould's wild turkey were wiped out in Arizona by 1920 after American settlement of the region. Turkey populations have remained stable in the Sierra Madre Occidental of Mexico, where the

birds were trapped. The reintroduced Gould's wild turkeys will be monitored by radio telemetry to determine the



home range and preferred habitat of the released turkeys. The study will continue for 2 years and determine if and where additional reintroduction efforts are needed.

This was Wildlife Forever's 19th project dedicated specifically to wild turkeys. It was also the sixth time Wildlife Forever has reintroduced wild turkeys into their former native habitats.

After arriving by chartered jet, the Gould's wild turkeys were "unpacked" for quarantine before being released into their new Arizona habitat.

Throughout its first six years the State-Fish Art Contest has introduced thousands of students nationwide to aquatic conservation and the amazing underwater world of fish.

To enter the State-Fish Art Contest, students create a portfolio including an illustration of their state-fish and an essay detailing its habitat, behavior, and efforts to conserve it. Winners are recognized from each state in three grade categories, 4-6, 7-9, and 10-12. Each summer, Wildlife Forever hosts the

State-Fish Art Expo to recognize the creativity and hard work of the young artists. Winners from across the United States travel to Mall of America in Bloomington, Minnesota to participate in the festivities that include a family fishing event, educational games, an awards ceremony, and reception.

The State-Fish Art Contest imparts conservation lessons through a funoriented medium, creative art, that sparks the imagination of youth, fosters curiosity along with fundamental knowledge, and establishes a foundation for life-long learning and stewardship of aquatic resources. According to Wildlife Forever President & CEO Doug Grann, "The Wildlife Forever State-Fish Art Contest is a program that emphasizes the wonder and enjoyment to be found in the natural world. We strongly believe that conservation education will ultimately determine the future of our wildlife heritage. By using art, the State-Fish Art Contest teaches important lessons in a way that truly resonates with youth."

And The Winner Is ...

Wildlife Forever was pleased to host a celebration of youth art, aquatic conservation, and the great outdoors at the 2004 State-Fish Art Expo at Mall of America on June 12th and 13th. State winners of the 6th annual Wildlife Forever State-Fish Art Contest traveled to Minnesota from as far away as Idaho, New Jersey, Nevada, and Texas to participate in the action-packed weekend that included an awards ceremony, a family fishing event, and a special afternoon with the Minnesota Twins.

The winning artwork was on display for hundreds of thousands of Mall of America visitors to admire. The awards ceremony was held in the Mall's central rotunda and acknowledged the hard work and creativity of the talented young artists before an excited crowd. Wildlife Forever's Chairman of the Board Scott Grieve presented each student with a blue ribbon and prizes.

The young aquatic artists and their families participated in a fishing event with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Minn Aqua program. The event took place in Buffalo, Minnesota and provided an introduction to fishing and outdoor recreation. The Minnesota Twins also recognized the contest winners in a pregame awards presentation on the Metrodome playing field before their game with the Philadelphia Phillies on June 13th. The

contest winners and their artwork were displayed on the giant Jumbotron screen for the Sunday crowd to admire. Twins first baseman Doug Mientkiewicz and his wife Jodi provided Expo attendees and their families with free tickets to the game. According to Grann, "The Twins are huge supporters of the youth of our community and throughout the nation. To see Doug Mientkiewicz personally shake hands with the winning artists just minutes before playing baseball demonstrates his commitment to sharing the wonders of the great outdoors with America's youth."

State-Fish Art Contest Enters Seventh Year

What began as a father/daughter school project to research the state-fish of the United States has evolved into one of Wildlife Forever's most effective conservation education programs.

During that time, literally hundreds of thousands of people have been touched with Wildlife Forever's message regarding the importance of aquatic conservation. More importantly, many thousands of kids have participated in the hands-on effort to illustrate their state-fish and write about fish habitat, life-cycle and

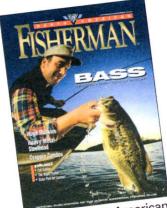




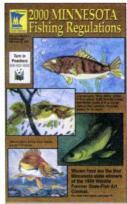




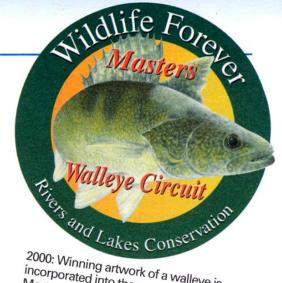
A Look Back ...

Twins Hit Grant Slam For Wildlife

Minnesota Twins' first baseman Doug Mientkiewicz' second annual Bass Fishing Classic raised a record \$60,000 for Wildlife Forever.

The Doug Mientkiewicz Bass Fishing Classic was held Monday, June 28, 2004 amid sunny skies and calm blue waters. The team format tournament matches a

The team of Brad Monnette, Matt Peters and Rodney McCormick with 16.24 pounds took first place. Second place went to Doug Mientkiewicz, Dean Capra and Robert Blake with 15.34 pounds. Jamie Ogden, David Skallet and Jim Gerchy won oxygenating technology of AquaInnovations and their special release boat.

Expenses were kept very low thanks to the donated support of Maynard's Restaurant, the Minnesota Twins, Minnetonka Outdoors, Stearns and the pro bass anglers, each of whom donated their time, boat and fishing equipment.

"Proceeds from this year's event will be used to fund grassroots conservation grants for fish and wildlife work throughout the country", said Grann. "Local sportsmen groups and conservation clubs can apply for challenge grants directly from Wildlife Forever. This is another example of the Twins supporting the community and our natural resources."

Sponsors of the tournament included: The Minnesota Twins, Ranger Boats, Yamaha engines, Fox Sports Net, WCCO Radio, Twin City Co-ops Federal Credit Union, Stearns and Minnetonka Outdoors.

The tournament's fundraising efforts were supplemented with an on-site silent auction that raised nearly \$5,000. In addition, one amateur fishing spot was raffled off during the month of May that raised \$1,500. And in a surprise donation, Twin City Co-ops Federal Credit Union pledged \$5.00 for every pound of bass brought to the scale, adding another \$1,100 to their already generous contribution.

The 33 boats all arrived on time for the 1:00 PM weigh-in and a large crowd to watch each Minnesota Twin weigh-in with his team. Among past and present Twins weighing fish were Lew Ford, Gene Larkin, Jacques Jones, Jack Morris, Bert Blyleven, Johan Santana, Matthew LeCroy and Corey Koskie.

World Series champion and former Twin Kent Hrbek along with Doug Mientkiewicz acted as emcees as each team brought their catch to the stage. According to Douglas H. Grann, President & CEO of Wildlife Forever: "The crowd was thrilled having the two best first basemen in Twins history take the stage together. It was a rare opportunity to share the wonders of third place with 13.39 pounds.

All of the fish were successfully released back into the lake, a 100% release rate, thanks to the advanced

















Non-Native Plants Invade Platte River

Platte River Basin Environments, Inc. (PRBEI) is undertaking the restoration of more than 850 acres of habitat along the North Platte River in western Nebraska thanks in part to a Sportsmen's Challenge Grant from Wildlife Forever. Wildlife Forever partnered with the Oregon Trail Chapter of Pheasants Forever to provide \$7,000 for PRBEI's enhancement efforts.

PRBEI's conservation efforts stem from the vision of a local sportsman, Clive Ostenberg, and was formed to restore and enhance the hunting and outdoor heritage of the North Platte River corridor. PRBEI has acquired

parcels of land and begun the process of restoring them as productive habitats for turkey and other species of upland birds, waterfowl, and deer.

The Wildlife Forever grant is being used to eradicate non-native invasive plant species along the riparian river frontage and adjacent meadows of the North Platte River. Growth of Salt Cedar, Russian olive, downy brome, musk thistle, Canada thistle, and Scotch thistle were overcoming the native species and disrupting the ecological balance needed for productive upland habitat.

These efforts will foster the return of native grassland plant species and a healthy native prairie ecosystem, as well as new growth of willow and cottonwood trees along the riparian river frontage. The project's progress will be assessed and the necessary habitat maintenance overseen by a team from the University of Nebraska, the Rocky Mountain Bird Observatory, and Nebraska Game & Parks. Thanks to Wildlife Forever, sportsmen will find more and better hunting opportunities along the North Platte River in Nebraska.
