AIM is located throughout the state in the following areas: Gary, South Bend, Fort Wayne, Lafayette, Kokomo, Indianapolis, Bloomington, Evansville, and Terre Haute.



The 2008 Governor's Conference: Designed with YOU in Mind

In planning the 2008 Governor's Conference on Service and Volunteerism, we wanted to do everything we could to respond to those suggestions that participants made at the 2007 conference, while striving to maintain those elements that our attendees love about this event. Here are just a few of the improvements we've made this year in response to your suggestions:

- Lower Cost of Attendance. We've moved the conference out of downtown to the Sheraton at Keystone at the Crossing, where parking is free. We've also lowered our general registration fees slightly, to allow for smaller organizations with limited budgets to attend.
- The Communication and Marketing Track is back. In response to your suggestions, we've brought back the Communication and Marketing track from the 2006 conference, which features new breakout sessions that will help you to improve your interpersonal communication, media relations, and marketing skills.
- More Advanced Topics. You asked for more advanced content, so we've doubled the size of our Volunteer Management and Capacity-Building tracks, with half of the sessions dedicated to introductory topics and the other half dedicated to more advanced topics.
- More Sessions. This year's program includes 75 breakout sessions spread across seven (7) tracks. That means that during each time slot, you have 7-8 sessions to choose from!
- **Higher Education Service-Learning Track.** We've partnered this year with Indiana Campus Compact to put this conference together and have created an entire track focused on service-learning in higher education, designed by practitioners from over a dozen colleges and universities from across the state.

ISU AmeriCorps Program Hosts Special Guest

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Congressman Brad Ellsworth met with several AmeriCorps Sycamore Service Corps and M3C members on the campus of Indiana State University on January 8. The Congressman came to the campus for the purpose of learning more about AmeriCorps members and their service to the community after meeting AmeriCorps Program Director Debbie Miller while she was on a family vacation to Washington, D.C.

After Miller described the structure, benefits, and requirements of the AmeriCorps Programs at ISU, Congressman Ellsworth listened as AmeriCorps members and site supervisors described their service at their host site. Sycamore Service Corps member Stephanie Land spoke about the disaster awareness training that she taught to over 2,200 elementary students and basic aid training to more than 1,000

4th graders through her placement at the American Red Cross. Another member, Bethann Smith, told about how she used her experience with music therapy at McMillan Adult Day Service to interact and build community with clients in their 90s. She told of an elderly man that created art work in dark and drab colors. After working with Bethann and experiencing the magic of music, he now paints in vivid colors.

AmeriCorps alumna, Crystal Thomas-Brown, spoke to the Congressman about her formation of the "Sweeties" group, a program for girls ages 10-14 at Ryves Youth Center, an inner-city community center. The Sweeties program, still active today, builds self-esteem and socialization skills through activities.

Bill Felts, Director of the 14th & Chestnut Community Center, spoke of the cohesiveness of the group of AmeriCorps members at his site. He went on to state that the monthly professional development sessions are of high quality and that they provide a high quality member.

Jim Edwards, Director, Ryves Youth Center, said that AmeriCorps members have provided service and started new programs that otherwise may not have been possible. He mentioned the boxing program as an example.

MaryAnn Clark, Director, Spectrum Industries reported on the difference that Lylia Forsyth made in the lives of the developmentally disabled adults. She used music to interact with the clients that normally would not participate. A video was shown that highlighted Lylia's service with the clients.

Congressman Ellsworth was appreciative of the opportunity to learn about the Sycamore Service Corps and Midwest Campus Compact Citizen Scholar Fellowship Program (M3C). He applauded the intensive service that members are providing to many non-profit agencies.

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New Resources Offered To Rural Homelessness Organizations

Washington, D.C., Jan. 15, 2008 – A new Rural Homelessness Capacity Building program launched this month will support the work of faith-based and community-based organizations serving homeless populations in rural America.

"Many small rural community organizations just don't have the funding, networks, and information they need in order to help their homeless neighbors," explained Moises Loza, executive director of the Housing Assistance Council, which created the new program. "Through the Rural Homelessness Capacity Building program, they can access tools and resources that will enable them to better serve

homeless people."

One-on-one technical assistance, audio web trainings, and online information will be available for rural homelessness provider organizations over the course of the three-year initiative. Selected organizations working in high need communities will also receive for grants to pursue training opportunities, purchase equipment, or undertake other activities that will improve their ability to meet the needs of homeless people in their areas.

RHCB is funded by a Department of Health and Human Services Compassion Capital Fund grant. The Housing Assistance Council is operating it with help from the National Alliance to End Homelessness.
