## The Employer Role in Youth Development

On March 26, the Employment and Training Administration hosted a Webinar entitled, The Employer Role in Youth Development. The Webinar highlighted how two employers addressed the challenge of the role they play in youth initiatives. Guest Speaker Alexis Devine highlighted the Lifespan's Youth Development and Youth Employment Programs. In 2005, Lifespan, a health care system with four hospital affiliates in Rhode Island, developed a Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) in response to a need for youth opportunities and economic development in the communities that neighbor the hospitals. With great commitment from the organization's leadership. Lifespan has essentially created its own labor pool to fill its high growth/high demand positions while it is also preparing youth for their future. Another guest speaker Bill Workman described The Principal Life's partnership with area workforce development efforts including an initiative with the local school system and the Des Moines Area Community College. National Public Radio recently broadcast a story from Gulfport, Mississippi, where YouthBuild AmeriCorps members are still hard at work rebuilding communities devastated by Hurricane Katrina. **To hear the story, click here**.

Since July 2006, nearly 200 YouthBuild AmeriCorps graduates and students from across the nation have traveled to Gulfport to rehabilitate 175 hurricane-destroyed homes.

Now, to create a lasting community-based presnce, YouthBuild USA has built a permanent YouthBuild AmeriCorps program in Gulfport with 35 low-income youth who are rebuilding homes in their own communities, while earning their GEDs and gaining hands-on construction experience. Members also have the opportunity to earn an AmeriCorps education award for post-secondary education.

This permanent project is now funded by the Corporation for National and Community Service through the Mississippi state service commission, and by the US Department of Labor. The Home Depot and various individuals also contributed needed flexible funds.

Conditions in Gulfport for low-income young people are still extremely difficult.
