About the Office:

The Narcotic and Dangerous Drug Section (NDDS) supervises and has responsibility for enforcing federal statutes pertaining to narcotic drugs and other controlled substances. The section advises the Assistant Attorney General, Criminal Division, Department of Justice and other federal officials involved in drug enforcement on all matters related to federal narcotics law enforcement including proposed and enacted legislation, policy, enforcement initiatives, and criminal and civil litigation. The section has direct litigation responsibilities in significant investigations and prosecutions targeting national and international narcotics trafficking and money laundering organizations.

Responsibilities and Opportunity Offered:

NDDS is seeking one experienced attorney for the Special Operations Division - commonly known as "SOD" - a joint DOJ, DEA, FBI, U.S. Customs, and IRS program. SOD attorneys support and coordinate investigations targeting the most significant national and international drug trafficking organizations. SOD's mission is to identify, disrupt, and dismantle the command and control elements of such organizations. To accomplish this, SOD identifies existing, related investigations nationally and, in some cases, internationally and develops a coordinated, multi-district investigative and prosecutive strategy.

SOD-coordinated cases have involved Assistant United States Attorneys (AUSA) from as many as fourteen judicial districts and dozens of federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies and, increasingly, have included foreign prosecutors and investigators. To maximize the effectiveness of such large investigations, SOD attorneys work closely with AUSA and investigative agencies to develop a national strategy in which intelligence and evidence is exchanged, investigative actions are coordinated, and finally, the indictments, arrests, and prosecutions are planned and coordinated.

Qualifications:

Required: Applicants must possess a J.D. degree, be duly licensed and authorized to practice as an attorney under the laws of a State, territory, or the District of Columbia, and have at least three years of post-J.D. legal experience. AUSA experience is required.

Preferred: Extensive experience in drug-related prosecution is required. Specialized experience in wiretap related investigations and/or prosecutions is highly desirable.

<u>Travel</u>: Occasional travel will be required.

Only U.S. citizens are eligible for employment with the Executive Office for Immigration Review and the United States Attorneys' Offices. Unless otherwise indicated in a particular job advertisement, non-U.S. citizens may apply for employment with other organizations, but should be advised that appointments of non-U.S. citizens are extremely rare; such appointments would be possible only if necessary to accomplish the Department's mission and would be subject to strict security requirements. Applicants who hold dual citizenship in the U.S. and another country will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

There is no formal rating system for applying veterans' preference to attorney appointments in the excepted service; however, the Department of Justice considers veterans' preference eligibility as a positive factor in attorney hiring. Applicants eligible for veterans' preference are encouraged to include that information in their cover letter or resume and attach supporting documentation (e.g., the DD 214 or other substantiating

documents) to their submissions.
