# Older Adults in Substance Abuse Treatment: FACTS AND FIGURES



# Findings from the OMHAS Client Process Monitoring System (CPMS)


From July 1999- June 2004, over 2,300 people over 65 years old were served in publicly funded treatment programs

- 78-83% completed treatment, which is significantly higher than average
- 91-94% were there for alcohol related problems
- 80-85% were men
- 89-92% were white
- 83-86% lived in their own homes
- 68-73% were referred by courts for driving under the influence
- 93-95% were served by outpatient treatment programs
- Oregon Health Plan and private insurance paid for only about 8% each of the treatment episodes. The majority paid for their own treatment.

# Key Highlights from: Substance Abuse by Older Adults: Estimates of Future Impact on the Treatment System\*

- The proportion of the population 65+ will rise from 12% in 2002 to 20% in 2030
- Abuse of alcohol and drugs is a serious health problem for up to 17% of adults 60 and older
- The number of adults 50 and over with substance abuse problems will double, from 2.5 million, to 5 million between 1999 and 2020
- The health care system in the United States does not appear to have recognized or dealt with the increasing use of psychoactive substances by older populations







While only 0.7% of people in treatment are over 65 years old, the number has been increasing steadily over the past five years
