Researchers and librarians supporting homeland security projects need to understand the wealth of Web-based artifacts available. Many agencies and their libraries are developing strategies for identifying, organizing, analyzing and providing access to Web-based cultural artifacts generated by terrorist and extremist groups.

This presentation will discuss the challenges in mining these digital artifacts and review the relevant technologies available for identifying, analyzing and accessing terrorist/extremist groups' Web-based artifacts (e.g., documents, videos, audios, images, Web sites, etc.).
