

Subject: Inventory of Federal Food, Nutrition, and Agriculture Programs (CED-79-125)

As the uncertainty of world demand for food increases, information on Federal food, agriculture, and nutrition programs is vitally important. This information has not been available from a central source. No single Government unit oversees the vast array of U.S. food-related programs; rather, many agencies carry out these programs independently. As a jr result, Federal food programs—affecting not only the national economy, but the world economy as well—are implemented without coordination and cannot provide the overall picture of U.S. food policy.

Recognizing the seriousness of this problem, on June 26 1978, you requested that we develop a prototype inventory or data base of Federal food, agriculture, and nutrition programs. You also asked us to design a prototype method for collecting information which might be used to develop inventories for other policy areas throughout the Federal Government. The Office of Management and Budget, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and 27 other agencies cooperated with us to develop a method and build a prototype inventory of 359 food, agriculture, and nutrition-related programs.

The enclosed handbook describes how this prototype inventory can be used to analyze data across program, functional, and organizational lines. It is not a universal inventory of all food, agriculture, and nutrition programs. Rather, it is an example for executive branch agencies to use in building similar program inventories in their areas and in building a Government-wide program inventory, as called for in the proposed sunset legislation. The Congress, the administration, and any other group interested in improving Government operations should find this inventory useful.

FOREWORD

In response to a request from the Senate Appropriations Committee, the General Accounting Office, in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture and the Office of Management and Budget, designed and built a prototype inventory of Federal food, agriculture, and nutrition programs. The inventory contains data on 359 Federal programs in 28 different departments and agencies. A sample of the total inventory is on page 9 of this handbook.

This handbook describes the inventory and what information is contained in it, some other related information systems, and what future opportunities are available in further developing this and other program inventories.

INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND

The decisionmakers of this country are currently facing unprecedented problems and issues and must consider an untold amount of information to insure rational decision—making. Issues are no longer simple because of increasingly complex interactions on local, State, regional, national, and global levels. At the same time, an information explosion has resulted from the government's attempt to understand the problems and interactions. Facts, programs, policies, and analyses are multiplying rapidly, causing identification of relevant information to be increasingly more difficult. Decisionmaking, policy formulation, program evaluation, planning, and control are accordingly becoming more difficult, complex, and important.

Managers need information that is timely, accurate, accessible, and in a usable format so that more time can be spent on analysis and redesign and less on research for facts and data. One area with many complex problems and seemingly unanswerable questions is that of food, agriculture, and nutrition. The following examples illustrate the complexity surrounding food issues with which the Congress must deal.

- (1) Developing a nutrition policy that integrates nutritional desires of the consumer with health considerations and conditions of agricultural production.
- (2) Determining the influences and impacts of the marketing and distribution sector of the food chain on food prices and the impact of regulation.
- (3) Determining what amounts and types of prime agricultural lands are necessary to support domestic and international demand and planning for the effect of and developing alternative solutions to the conditions being created by the rapid decrease in the number of family farms.
- (4) Assessing and planning for the impacts of U.S. assistance on the infrastructure development and agricultural base of countries receiving U.S. aid.

The American public is also reacting to the government's inability to stop an increasing tax bill and to maintain or enhance Government productivity. This condition was demonstrated by the passage of Proposition 13 in California, which brought taxpayers' unrest to the attention of the Congress, the administration, and the country.

A recent Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular (No. A-117, Mar. 23, 1979) also recognizes the need to deal with the problems of complexity and management improvement in the Federal Government. The circular requires that every department or agency whose budget is subject to OMB review submit an annual report on resources used for evaluation and management improvement.

The fact that the Congress is paying attention to its oversight responsibilities is being covered by the popular press ("Time," Apr. 23, 1979). Many Members have been digging into the various departments and agencies to see if they are performing as expected or even coming close to it. Congressmen are finding out that program evaluation requires them to master a significant amount of detail and that jurisdictions, programs, and issues overlap. Further, Congressmen realize they need to get a handle on how well programs operate internally, externally, and mutually.

The 95th Congress was aware of the need for periodic review of programs. Consequently, the Senate passed the "Sunset Act of 1978" which provided for review of Government programs every 5 years. This act also required Federal Government regulation be "* * * systematically and comprehensively reviewed and modified, to assure that such regulation, where it is necessary, is aimed at and structured to achieve substantial benefits to the Nation, and that each regulatory agency perform its mandated responsibilities in the most effective and least dilatory and costly manner so as to maximize the intended benefits to the Nation."

On October 11, 1978, an unprinted "foresight" amendment to the "Sunset Act of 1978" was proposed. This amendment, added to the list of the acts requirements, provides for "* * an identification of any trends, developments, and emerging conditions which may affect the future nature and extent of the problems or needs which the programs are intended to address." Committees were also directed to assess the potential primary and secondary effects of the programs under review:

- "* * * the purpose of this amendment is to sensitize Congress in general and in particular the committees with jurisdiction over various subject areas, to the necessity of anticipating future technological, social, economic, and other changes and of preparing to deal with approaching problems before they grow into emergencies.
- * * * more often than not, when a public policy problem comes to our attention, it strikes us from the blind side; we are constantly reacting to emergency conditions. We often are reacting with obsolete data by the time we act. We get it too late, we never look to see how it is working, and we develop constituencies that keep up doing the wrong thing indefinitely." 1/

(App. I shows the bills in the 96th Congress addressing this issue.)

BASIS FOR PROGRAM EVALUATION AND OVERSIGHT

At the heart of all evaluation and oversight activity is a need for basic information on what the Federal government is doing. Implementation of program evaluation proposals necessitates a program information base. Such an information base should contain detailed information below the budget line item level for program evaluation. It must be designed so that it is useful for a wide variety of analysts and decisionmakers. An adequate information base could then provide the basis for systematic, logical decisionmaking.

For these reasons, the Senate Appropriations Committee asked GAO to compile a prototype inventory of Federal food, nutrition, and agriculture programs. The committee requested that the inventory be designed so it could be updated and that, if the inventory proved useful, it could be maintained by some component of the executive branch. (See app. III.)

With the help of the Department of Agriculture (USDA) and OMB, GAO built a prototype food, agriculture, and nutrition program inventory (FANI) which contains 359 programs in 28 agencies (See apps. IV and V.) To do this, GAO created an index to define programs according to sector of society, beneficiary, function, and scope. The following

sections of this briefing book describe the inventory, how it can be used, and what GAO feels should be done to make this effort more useful in future years. (App. II explains the steps GAO followed in designing and building the inventory.)

FOOD INVENTORY GUIDE

A data collection instrument (DCI) was designed to collect information on all Federal food, agriculture, and nutrition related programs. (The DCI begins on page 11.) A sample of the output appears on pages 9 and 10. The instrument contained 16 questions covering the following points and the first 14 (except for number 11) of these information elements are contained in an automated file.

1. Program Title

The terms "program" and "food, nutrition, and agriculture program" have many interpretations within the Federal establishment, not only among agencies but even among units or individuals within a single agency. To get common every-day responses to the survey, the agency officials were directed to use the following definition of program: any activity of a Federal agency which is directly or indirectly related to the production, consumption, or marketing of food or food-related nutrition. It may or may not be identified as a separate program by statute or regulation. A program may also be an activity, service, project, or process. In the cases where the program was included in the catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance, that title was used.

2. Administering Body

This item identifies the two organizational levels above that of the program. The agency/bureau ID code is the 4-digit number from OMB's Master Account Title (MAT) file. (The list of MAT file codes begins on page 20.)

3. Program ID Codes

A unique 7 digit code was assigned to each program in FANI. In addition, the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance Number was used if the programs were exact matches of those in the Catalog, otherwise this item was left blank. The OMB/Treasury account was also included in FANI. This number is the 11 digit code that appears in the President's Budget. By having this number, we can key the programs in the inventory directly to the budget. Up to five different OMB/Treasury account numbers are included for those programs with multiple funding sources.

4. Statutory Authority

This data element shows the most meaningful legal authority (enabling legislation), including the most recent amendments upon which the program was based. This information provides the starting and ending points of the program's legislative history. It also can be used to show how many and what programs were enabled by the same legislation.

Space was allowed in this question to include any additional citations. For example, these could be citations not codified, such as Executive orders, Presidential proclamations, or reorganization plans.

5. Financial Data

Dollar and staff year figures were included for fiscal years 1978, 1979, and 1980. Future updates of the inventory will include for the next year 1979, 1980, and 1981; for the second year 1980, 1981, 1982, and so on. The inventory can now store up to 5 fiscal years of data. The numbers were to be "best guesses," since it was expected that there would be difficulty disaggregating budget data for some programs. The numbers collected are, therefore, "order of magnitude" estimates and should not be used to try to determine exact program costs or budgets.

6. Authorization

If any program's authorizing legislation contained any special language that mandated or constrained the program, this special language is included under this item. An example of this type of language is: "Not to exceed \$150 million for fiscal year 1980."

7. Program Description

The program officials described the objectives, accomplishments, and target population to be served (users) of their program. Program officials were also told that if they needed to qualify any other information on the DCI that they should include those qualifications under this section.

8. Program Descriptors

Space for five descriptors was provided on the form. Up to five words or terms were used to describe the program. These descriptors will be used to build a keyword list that will serve as a subject index.

9. Program Description Codes

A classification system was designed that could be used to define any program four different ways, by what sector(s) of the food system the program affected, by what function(s) it performed in that sector, by what user(s) it served, and by the geographic scope of the program's activities. Program officials were instructed to select up to six different codes for sector, function, and user, and one code for scope. "Primary" or "secondary" designations were not used on any of the codes. This allowed flexibility in reporting on all of the sectors, functions, or users involved rather than forcing any one program into assuming one unique mission. Programs can concurrently perform more than one mission and this coding provides for that.

10. Congressional Committee Jurisdiction

The inventory contains names and codes for up to seven different subcommittees that have jurisdiction over the program. (The list of subcommittee codes begins on page 27.)

11. Related Programs

Program officials listed those programs outside of their department or agency that related to their program on the basis of program objectives or target users. A total list of those related programs was put on a card file, which was used to check what programs had been omitted in building this prototype inventory.

12. Program Reports

Program officials listed the five most significant program evaluation or information reports issued by them or anyone else during the last 5 years. These reports are intended to be used as reference materials for further investigation and also as input to the GAO Program Analysis Division data base on program evaluations.

13. Agency Contact

The person named in this portion of the DCI is the person most familiar with the program and also the person that could respond to official inquiries concerning the program.

14. Date Form Completed

This information gives an "as of date" for the other data on the questionnaire. The first set of information was completed between January 15 and March 7, 1979.

15. Staff Member Completing Form

Since the agency contact point (#13) and the person completing the form were usually not the same individual, it seemed appropriate to know who to contact when asking specific questions on how the form was completed.

16. Source of Information

This information was included on the DCI for two purposes: (1) to verify the data submitted and (2) to discover other information sources.

By knowing what FANI contains, users can formulate questions on various topics such as program functions, common users, or cross-program overlaps and impacts.

Example questions of the types that can be asked of FANI are shown in appendix VI, page 51.

RELATED INFORMATION SYSTEMS

Three kinds of basic information systems exist in the private and public sector. These are inventory systems, budget/control systems, and planning/forecasting systems.

If crosswalks were built between these systems in the Federal sector, program data could be related to indicators or measurements of success and composite program evaluations could be compared to current conditions and future forecasts. This could provide a system to tell what exists and what alternatives could be considered. Further, building crosswalks between these systems could provide relevant information for policy analysis. A brief description of some of the existing Federal systems and suggestions for relating them to FANI follow.

INVENTORY SYSTEMS

- --Legislative Authorization, Budget Program Information System (LAPIS). LAPIS was developed and is maintained by the Program Analysis Division, U.S. General Accounting Office. This is an inventory of Federal programs throughout the Federal Government. It is arranged by departments with a breakdown by bureau. The data base contains budget function, budget subfunction, authorizing legislation, Treasury/OMB account number, authorization, budget authority, outlays, and obligations. A number of other categories will be added in 1979, such as policy areas, target groups, types of assistance, etc. Since both FANI and LAPIS have Treasury/OMB account numbers, listings by Treasury/OMB account numbers could be used as a crosswalk between the systems.
- --The Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) is maintained by OMB. This is a governmentwide compendium of Federal programs and activities which provide assistance or benefits to State and local governments; U.S. territories and possessions; cities, counties, and municipalities; public, quasi-public, and private organizations and institutions; specialized groups and individuals. FANI includes the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance identification number when the program in FANI matches the program in the CFDA. Both data bases contain the Treasury/OMB account number. Further, FANI identifies other types of food-related programs as well as assistance programs.

- --Federal Assistance Programs Retrieval System (FAPRS) is maintained by OMB. This is a computerized means of identifying Federal programs that can be used to meet the development needs of any community. This information is keyed to the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance, which can be keyed to FANI as explained previously.
- --Smithsonian Science Information Exchange (SSIE) is maintained by the Smithsonian Institution. In fiscal year 1980 this activity will be maintained by the National Technical Information Service, Department of Commerce. This is a national data base of information on research in progress, which includes projects from more than 1,300 organizations. A crosswalk could be built between this data base and FANI using agency and bureau, keywords, system sector, program function, and target user identifiers.

BUDGET SYSTEM

This system contains detailed information on various appropriations and funds that comprise the President's budget. It includes budget authority, obligations, and outlays. To develop the budget data in FANI the agencies were requested to use the President's budget. They were asked to give us "best guesses" since it was expected that there would be difficulty separating out budget data for some programs. Therefore, the numbers collected are "order of magnitude" estimates and should not be used to determine exact program costs. Both BPS and FANI contain the Treasury/OMB account number which provides a link between the systems. The user should keep in mind that some programs have more than one Treasury/OMB account number.

PLANNING AND FORECASTING SYSTEMS

--The Domestic Information Display System (DIDS) is being developed by the Office of Administration in the Executive Office of the President. This system uses interactive graphics to provide a tool for analyzing statistical data. DIDS has data on population, education, unemployment, income, etc., which can be displayed at the State, county, or census tract level. By further categorizing the data in FANI, statistical program data can be displayed at the State, county, or census tract level and then compared to the DIDS indicator system.

--The Futures Information Retrieval System (FIRST) is being developed by the Congressional Research Service at the Library of Congress. This system has over 10,000 futures forecasts against which programs could be categorized and compared.

CONCLUSIONS AND FUTURE OPPORTUNITIES

Simply building and maintaining an inventory is not sufficient in itself to help solve the problems already The total effort's success involves (1) developing and using indicators of program success, (2) selecting a set of indicators that reflect the conditions, of the environment and society, and (3) developing a method to draw together all program inventories and indicators of success. By following these three steps, a tool could evolve that can help evaluate total and individual program effectiveness and draw together program objectives and environmental indicators. sight and foresight goals of the Congress could be met. and a core of basic information would exist to aid decisionmakers in finding reasonable and operable solutions to the various complex issue problems that exist now and will continue. Now that the food program inventory has gone through its initial phase, it can be used as a model to develop inventories for other issues (i.e., health, transportation, land use, communications, etc.)

In developing this prototype inventory much has been learned; however, refinement of the data collection instrument, the data collection process, and procedures for program identification is needed to assure continued progress.

Given the level of interest by the Congress and other decisionmakers in oversight and program evaluation, good tools are needed to carry out these tasks. This inventory provides them with a detailed overview of programs so that they can consistently make better decisions. Rather than reducing budgets by making 10-percent across-the-board cuts or totally eliminating programs or institutions, decision-makers would be able to see better what portions of programs, functions, and/or institutions needed to be reduced, combined, or abolished.

Four more questions need to be answered to fully realize the usefulness of FANI and other information tools to decisionmakers.

How best can FANI be refined and maintained on an ongoing basis within USDA? It is possible the inventory concept could then be extended to other policy areas until a total Federal program inventory is built.

- 2. How can the methods developed in this prototype effort best be coordinated with the activities regarding the Sunset legislation? The legislation requires a Federal program inventory, and FANI could serve as an example method for implementing the Sunset concept.
- 3. What is the best way to link FANI to a set of environmental, social, technical, and economic indicators? Through such a linkage, better insight into the interactions between Government activities and the environment could be gained and composite program evaluations could be performed. The Domestic Information Display System discussed earlier is an information system containing such a set of indicators.
- 4. How can FANI be coordinated with a futures-oriented system to assess single and cross issue impacts? Such a coordination would allow decisionmakers to see the possible future impacts of their decisions and plan for expected changes. An example of such a system is the Futures Information Retrieval System (FIRST) at the Congressional Research Service (CRS).

STEPS FOLLOWED IN DESIGNING AND BUILDING THE INVENTORY

- --We researched agency annual reports, GAO reports and program data, congressional reports, the Government Organization manual and the Budget and identified the 42 Departments, agencies, commissions, councils, etc. that had the most direct or indirect involvement in the food, agriculture, and nutrition area.
- --We then developed a four dimensional structure by which any food related program or activity could be defined. The four dimensions were food system sector, program function, target user, and geographic scope. For example, the Food Stamp Program could be broadly defined as being in the consumption sector, with direct donations being its function, having target users of low income groups, and operating in a domestic geographic scope. Within each of the four broad dimensions, we allowed for many different lower levels of definition. The four dimensional approach was taken because it can be universally applied to other areas with modification of the subclassifications within each dimension.
- --After the classification scheme was developed we designed a data collection instrument to collect the information on the programs selected.
- --During the design steps we reached agreements with USDA that it would (1) assist us in data collection and data processing support and (2) maintain the inventory in future years if it did in fact prove worthwhile.
- --After gaining USDA cooperation, we further refined our original list of 42 and requested information from 34 of those organizations. At this time the Director, OMB, sent an endorsement letter to those same 34, stating his support of the project and requesting cooperation. (See appendix E page 50.)

--All of the notified agencies were then contacted by phone and briefings were held for program officials. The purpose of the total job and the data collection instrument was explained, and individual assistance was also given to program officials having difficulty completing the forms. Program officials were also encouraged to use the inventory in their own work.

- --Nearly constant telephone contact was maintained between us and the agency representatives from December 15, 1979. We encouraged the program staff completing the forms to call or visit whenever they had a question.
- --January 31, 1979, was set as the target date for the agencies to submit their completed forms. The forms began to come in by that date and the final form was received in early March. GAO and USDA staff then edited the completed forms and by March 7, 1979, we submitted 359 completed data collection instruments for keypunching.
- --USDA contracted with the Federal Prison System (FPS) for data entry. FPS completed keypunching in about 3 weeks and submitted the data tapes to USDA for entry, machine editing and processing.
- --At this point, the inventory was ready to be queried by the GAO and Appropriations Committee staff.

The Committee is concerned about the numerous Federal boards, commissions, councils, agencies, and departments that define and implement our Nation's food programs. Because of these many participants in the food and agriculture process and the interrelationships of nutrition, food and agriculture with other issues, it is difficult to track, much less assess the overall impact and results of these programs. The Committee hopes to address some of these issues at its regular appropriation hearings in early 1979. There is information throughout the Government that could be very valuable at these hearings, but which is not presently available in a useable form. The information is not centrally available, nor is it appropriately aggregated.

It would appear that the information the Committee needs could be collected and synthesized by the General Accounting Office in time for our hearings next year

Specifically, the Committee would like GAO to compile a Government-wide nutrition, food, and agriculture information base and conduct an organizational analysis of existing programs. Of course, design of such a base would be up to GAO. However, at the minimum, we would suggest the following

- All Federal program activities whose efforts impact on the nutrition, food and agriculture issue should be identified
- The file that is built should be designed to be updateable and to fit the Congressional information system

SUBJECT: GAO's Information Data Base on Food, Nutrition, and Agriculture

The General Accounting Office (GAO), at the request of the Senate Appropriations Committee, is in the process of developing a data base on Federal programs relating to food, nutrition, and agriculture. No such comprehensive source of information exists at this time.

I feel that such a comprehensive information system would be extremely valuable to both the Congress and the Executive Branch. The entire food system and the Federal role in it has taken on increased visibility and importance over the last few years. In the future, important decisions will need to be made covering the full spectrum of that system, ranging from nutrition to agricultural production.

For this reason, I urge you to support the GAO effort and respond to their data request in the most timely manner possible.
