

## **Small Business Profile: DELAWARE**

Small businesses make a significant contribution to the U.S. economy, and in 2003, they were the engine of Delaware's economic performance. Nationally, half of U.S. non-farm private output and employment is generated by small firms with 500 or fewer employees; in Delaware, small business owners—including women, minorities, and home based individuals—were leaders in the state's economy in 2003. The Office of Advocacy's *Small Business Profile* reports on small businesses in the state using the most currently available data.

Number of Businesses. The estimated total number of small businesses in Delaware in 2003 was 66,000.¹ Of the 25,280 employer firms in 2003, 93.8 percent or an estimated 23,700 were small firms. The estimated number of employer businesses increased by 0.7 percent in 2003. The most recent data available show that non-employer businesses numbered 42,303 in 2001. Self-employment increased by 16.2 percent, from 17,718 in 2002 to 20,580 in 2003. Women-Owned Businesses. Self-employment by women decreased by 0.6 percent, from 7,157 in 2002 to 7,116 in 2003 and represented 34.5 percent of self-employed persons in the state. Women-owned businesses generated \$1.8 billion in revenues, employed 19,192 workers, and constituted 13,700 firms or 24.1 percent of all firms in 1997. Minority-Owned Businesses. In 1997, 24.5 percent or 1,300 of the minority-owned businesses in the state were employer firms, and they generated 87.2 percent of the total minority-owned business revenue of \$1.2 billion. There were 900 Hispanic-owned businesses; 2,700 Black-owned businesses; 1,500 Asian and Pacific Islander-owned businesses; and 300 American Indian and Alaskan Native-owned businesses in 1997. **Business Turnover.** The estimated number of new employer businesses was 3,439 in 2003, which is 6.7 percent more than

the previous year. Business bankruptcies decreased by 22.2 percent, and totaled 505 in 2003. Business terminations decreased by 19.1 percent and numbered 3,148 in 2003. Employment. Small businesses with fewer than 500 employees numbered 19,045 in 2001 and employed 170,340 people or 43.7 percent of the state's non-farm private workforce (Table 1).<sup>2</sup> Total net employment gain in the state amounted to 12,841 between 2000 and 2001. Of that number, 12,409 are attributable to MSAs (metropolitan statistical areas). During the same time period, firms with fewer than 20 employees gained 3,157 jobs. **Small Business Income.** Small business proprietors' income in 2003 increased by 6 percent, from \$1.7 billion in 2002 to \$1.8 billion in 2003. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce.)

**Finance.** Small firms typically use commercial bank lenders and rely on local bank services. Over the last five years there has been a gradual decline in the number of banks in Delaware (Table 3). The Office of Advocacy has identified banks in each state that make the most loans to small businesses. This information is available in its banking studies available at www.sba.gov/advo/stats.
