

## **Small Business Profile: IOWA**

Small businesses make a significant contribution to the U.S. economy, and in 2003, they were the engine of Iowa's economic performance. Nationally, half of U.S. non-farm private output and employment is generated by small firms with 500 or fewer employees; in Iowa, small business owners—including women, minorities, and home based individuals—were leaders in the state's economy in 2003. The Office of Advocacy's *Small Business Profile* reports on small businesses in the state using the most currently available data.

Number of Businesses. The estimated total number of small businesses in Iowa in 2003 was 240,700.¹ Of the 68,737 employer firms in 2003, 97.5 percent or an estimated 67,000 were small firms. The estimated number of employer businesses increased by 0.4 percent in 2003. The most recent data available show that non-employer businesses numbered 173,658 in 2001. Self-employment decreased by 2 percent, from 136,305 in 2002 to 133,512 in 2003. Women-Owned Businesses. Self-employment by women increased by 15.8 percent, from 44,597 in 2002 to 51,645 in 2003 and represented 39.1 percent of self-employed persons in the state. Women-owned businesses generated \$8.1 billion in revenues, employed 71,724 workers, and constituted 57,500 firms or 25.3 percent of all firms in 1997. Minority-Owned Businesses. In 1997, 28.3 percent or 1,500 of the minority-owned businesses in the state were employer firms, and they generated 87.4 percent of the total minority-owned business revenue of \$0.9 billion. There were 1,300 Hispanic-owned businesses; 1,400 Black-owned businesses; 1,700 Asian and Pacific Islander-owned businesses; and 900 American Indian and Alaskan Native-owned businesses in 1997. **Business Turnover.** The estimated number of new employer businesses was 5,534 in 2003, which is 2.2 percent less than

the previous year. Business bankruptcies decreased by 8.8 percent, and totaled 323 in 2003. Business terminations decreased by 1.4 percent and numbered 7,378 in 2003. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Labor, Employment and Training Administration; Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts; U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau.)

Employment. Small businesses with fewer than 500 employees numbered 63,251 in 2001 and employed 657,120 people or 52.4 percent of the state's non-farm private workforce (Table 1).<sup>2</sup> Total net employment loss in the state amounted to 10,768 between 2000 and 2001. A total of 1,541 jobs were gained in MSAs (metropolitan statistical areas). During the same time period, firms with fewer than 20 employees gained 168 jobs. **Small Business Income.** Small business proprietors' income in 2003 increased by 9.1 percent, from \$7 billion in 2002 to \$7.6 billion in 2003. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce.)

**Finance.** Small firms typically use commercial bank lenders and rely on local bank services. Over the last five years there has been a gradual decline in the number of banks in Iowa (Table 3). The Office of Advocacy has identified banks in each state that make the most loans to small businesses.
