

Small Business Profile: MONTANA

Small businesses make a significant contribution to the U.S. economy, and in 2003, they were the engine of Montana's economic performance. Nationally, half of U.S. non-farm private output and employment is generated by small firms with 500 or fewer employees; in Montana, small business owners—including women, minorities, and home based individuals—were leaders in the state's economy in 2003. The Office of Advocacy's *Small Business Profile* reports on small businesses in the state using the most currently available data.

Number of Businesses. The estimated total number of small businesses in Montana in 2003 was 104,500.¹ Of the 33,991 employer firms in 2003, 97.7 percent or an estimated 33,200 were small firms. The estimated number of employer businesses increased by 2 percent in 2003. The most recent data available show that non-employer businesses numbered 71,298 in 2001. Self-employment decreased slightly, from 61,737 in 2002 to 61,726 in 2003. Women-Owned Businesses. Self-employment by women decreased by 6.5 percent, from 24,954 in 2002 to 23,325 in 2003 and represented 38.2 percent of self-employed persons in the state. Women-owned businesses generated \$2 billion in revenues, employed 22,240 workers, and constituted 22,400 firms or 23.9 percent of all firms in 1997. Minority-Owned Businesses. In 1997, 23.5 percent or 800 of the minority-owned businesses in the state were employer firms, and they generated 81.9 percent of the total minority-owned business revenue of \$0.4 billion. There were 1,000 Hispanic-owned businesses; 100 Black-owned businesses; 400 Asian and Pacific Islander-owned businesses; and 1,900 American Indian and Alaskan Native-owned businesses in 1997. Business Turnover. The estimated number of new employer businesses was 4,548 in 2003, which is 27.4 percent more than

the previous year. Business bankruptcies decreased by 18.3 percent, and totaled 98 in 2003. Business terminations increased by 5.3 percent and numbered 4,679 in 2003. Employment. Small businesses with fewer than 500 employees numbered 27,723 in 2001 and employed 210,530 people or 69.8 percent of the state's non-farm private workforce (Table 1).² Total net employment gain in the state amounted to 5,599 between 2000 and 2001. Of that number, 3,139 are attributable to MSAs (metropolitan statistical areas). During the same time period, firms with fewer than 20 employees gained 4,368 jobs. Small Business Income. Small business proprietors' income in 2003 increased by 16.1 percent, from \$2.3 billion in 2002 to \$2.7 billion in 2003. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce.)

Finance. Small firms typically use commercial bank lenders and rely on local bank services. Over the last five years there has been a gradual decline in the number of banks in Montana (Table 3). 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¹ The Office of Advocacy's estimate of the total number of state small businesses is based on the percent of small businesses (2001 Census Bureau firm size data) multiplied by the total number of employer businesses in 2003 (Dept. of Labor). To this total, we add the 2001 number of non-employer firms (Census Bureau).

² The number of employers listed in Table 1 is not directly comparable to the figures listed in the *Number of Businesses* section due to different data sources.
