

Small Business Profile: WISCONSIN

Small businesses make a significant contribution to the U.S. economy, and in 2003, they were the engine of Wisconsin's economic performance. Nationally, half of U.S. non-farm private output and employment is generated by small firms with 500 or fewer employees; in Wisconsin, small business owners—including women, minorities, and home based individuals—were leaders in the state's economy in 2003. The Office of Advocacy's *Small Business Profile* reports on small businesses in the state using the most currently available data.

Number of Businesses. The estimated total number of small businesses in Wisconsin in 2003 was 395,000.1 Of the 123,800 employer firms in 2003, 97.9 percent or an estimated 121,200 were small firms. The estimated number of employer businesses increased by 1.3 percent in 2003. The most recent data available show that non-employer businesses numbered 273,758 in 2001. Self-employment decreased by 1.7 percent, from 212,244 in 2002 to 208,615 in 2003. Women-Owned Businesses. Self-employment by women decreased by 1 percent, from 77,459 in 2002 to 76,665 in 2003 and represented 36.7 percent of self-employed persons in the state. Women-owned businesses generated \$15.7 billion in revenues, employed 146,450 workers, and constituted 89,300 firms or 24.4 percent of all firms in 1997. Minority-Owned Businesses. In 1997, 24.8 percent or 3,400 of the minority-owned businesses in the state were employer firms, and they generated 89.9 percent of the total minority-owned business revenue of \$4 billion. There were 3,000 Hispanic-owned businesses; 4,800 Black-owned businesses; 3,800 Asian and Pacific Islander-owned businesses; and 2,300 American Indian and Alaskan Native-owned businesses in 1997. Business Turnover. The estimated number of new employer businesses was 12,400 in 2003, which is 1.9 percent more than

the previous year. Business bankruptcies decreased by 15.7 percent, and totaled 722 in 2003. Business terminations decreased by 7.5 percent and numbered 12,629 in 2003. Employment. Small businesses with fewer than 500 employees numbered 113,132 in 2001 and employed 1,292,010 people or 53.8 percent of the state's non-farm private workforce (Table 1).² Total net employment loss in the state amounted to 14,708 between 2000 and 2001. Of that number, 10,158 are attributable to MSAs (metropolitan statistical areas). During the same time period, firms with fewer than 20 employees gained 14,266 jobs. Small Business Income. Small business proprietors' income in 2003 increased by 7.3 percent, from \$10.7 billion in 2002 to \$11.4 billion in 2003. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce.)

Finance. Small firms typically use commercial bank lenders and rely on local bank services. Over the last five years there has been a gradual decline in the number of banks in Wisconsin (Table 3). 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¹ The Office of Advocacy's estimate of the total number of state small businesses is based on the percent of small businesses (2001 Census Bureau firm size data) multiplied by the total number of employer businesses in 2003 (Dept. of Labor). To this total, we add the 2001 number of non-employer firms (Census Bureau).

 $^{^2}$ The number of employers listed in Table 1 is not directly comparable to the figures listed in the *Number of Businesses* section due to different data sources.
