New Frequent Flyer Miles Policy

Effective immediately, a new law allows Selective Service System (SSS) employees to retain promotional items earned on official travel, including frequent flyer miles for personal use. Previous laws prohibited the use of promotional benefits for personal use when traveling at government expense. Such benefits were considered the property of the government.

To take advantage of the new law, SSS employees (including state directors, RFOs, and Board Members) must open their own frequent flyer accounts, at their own expense, if any. However, the law is retroactive, which means employees can use miles earned prior to the law being enacted.

Traditionally, federal travelers are restricted to coach class, but now they may use frequent flyer miles to upgrade services. Any fees accessed for such upgrades, however, will not be paid by the



Agency. According to the General Services Administration (GSA), the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) could declare the frequent flyer miles a taxable benefit, but has not yet made the decision to do so. GSA will keep employees informed about any IRS decisions concerning this issue.

The new benefit was contained in the National Defense Authorization Act for fiscal year 2002, which was signed into law by President Bush on Dec. 28, 2001.

National Registration Drive

In support of the Selective Service System's (SSS) second annual National Registration Drive, Nov. 5-9, 2001, the Agency prepared and mailed high school kits to 29,800 high school registrars and/or principals in early October. The kits included various colorful attention grabbing posters to increase the awareness of the registration requirement among young high school men.

During the five-day event, the SSS asked registrars, teachers and others who touch young men's lives to support the national registration drive by taking part in various activities. Some of the activities planned by the schools included Internet Registration Day, playing of the Agency produced high school video featuring Lou Holtz, Head Football Coach at the University of South Carolina, and lessons about the SSS and the registration requirement using the Agency's Teacher's Guide.

Witness to Catonsville Nine,

dies at 92

Mary E. Murphy, former chief clerk for Local Board No. 33 in Maryland, and witness to the destruction of the Selective Service records by the "Catonsville Nine," recently died of heart failure. She was 92.

On May 17, 1968, nine people entered the building which housed the Selective Service System (SSS) Local Board No. 33 and the Knights of Columbus. The SSS office was on the second floor. The group, led by two Roman Catholic priests, brothers Daniel and Philip Berrigan, took and burned the SSS' records of approximately 600 draft-age men.

Murphy, a devout Catholic, tried unsuccessfully to get the records away from the group. According to Murphy's son, John V. Murphy III, an attorney and former Baltimore County councilman, the majority of the records destroyed were those of men classified 4-F (registrant not qualified for military service).

In May 2001, Murphy was reunited with several members of the "Catonsville Nine" during a viewing of *Investigation of a Flame*, a documentary about the seven men and two women who made up the group.

Recalling the events of the past, Murphy told a reporter, that she did not regret what she did on that day, "I was for my country then, and I'm for my

country now. I'm not against protesting. The American people have the right to protest. But it's the way they did it. The protesters were violent, and that shouldn't be allowed."

Besides her son, John, Murphy is survived by a daughter, Mary Lou Quaid; five grandchildren; and a great-grandson. Her husband of 42 years, John Victor Murphy Jr., died in 1980.

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Dallas School Superintendent Honored

The Selective Service System (SSS) honored Mike Moses, Ph.D., general superintendent of the Dallas Independent School District (DISD) in Texas, for his efforts in support of SSS registration compliance.

Moses mandated that all Dallas public high schools initiate "Leadership Assemblies" during the week of Nov. 5-9, 2001, National Selective Service Week. During these assemblies, 17- and 18-year-old males watched an SSS video and were instructed on how to register. In response to their requests, the DISD received 10,000 registration cards.

During a DISD sponsored graduation ceremony honoring those World War II veterans who left high school early to enlist in the Armed Forces, Lt. Col. Carl Kist, Detachment 2 Commander, and Maj. Kurt Neufang, Area Office Coordinator, representing the Agency, presented Moses with a plaque.

At the program, Moses said, "During this National Selective Service Week, our 17- and 18-year-old male students have been learning more about their own leadership, civic, and patriotic responsibilities, and those who are of age have now registered with the Selective Service."
