Section 111 of the Arts, Humanities, and Museums Amendments of 1990 (Section 318, Public Law 101-512) requires us to review federal, state, and local funding of the arts. As agreed with the Committees, we met the requirements of Section 111 by providing arts funding profiles for the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) for 50 states, 6 territories, and 49 cities. The profiles and other information contained in appendixes I through III respond to the agreements made with the Committees.




Figure 1: NEA and State Arts Funding

As shown in figure 1, combined state and federal funding increased about 8 percent between fiscal years 1986 and 1992.

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<u>NEA'S ARTS FUNDING STABLE</u> BETWEEN FISCAL YEARS 1986 AND 1992

NEA's program funding varied slightly for the period. Between fiscal years 1986 and 1987, NEA program funding increased 3.8 percent from \$143.7 million to \$149.2 million. For fiscal years 1987 through 1991, NEA program funding increased less than 1 percent each year, and between fiscal years 1991 and 1992 the funding decreased 1.3 percent to \$150.5 million.

For fiscal year 1991, Section 110 of Arts, Humanities, and Museums Amendments of 1990 (Section 318, Public Law 101-512) increased the share of funding that NEA must provide to its state and regional program to 25 percent of NEA's total program funds. The required share in fiscal year 1990 was 20 percent. This change increased state and regional program funding from \$26.1 million in fiscal year 1990 to \$31.5 million in fiscal year 1991. Also, this section of the law provided that a new program for artistically underserved inner-city and rural areas, NEA's state set-side program, was to be funded by 5 percent of NEA's program funds. For fiscal year 1991, this amounted to \$6.3 million. NEA funded these increases by switching funds from other NEA programs.

STATE ARTS FUNDING VARIED CONSIDERABLY BETWEEN 1986 AND 1992, WHILE CITY ARTS FUNDING SHOWED STEADY GROWTH BETWEEN 1989 AND 1991

As shown in figure 1, state and territorial funding for the arts increased each year for fiscal years 1986 through 1990. The total increase over the period was 49.4 percent, rising from \$195.6 million in fiscal year 1986 to \$292.3 million in fiscal year 1990. However, total state and territorial funding currently is declining. Between fiscal years 1990 and 1991, it decreased 6.4 percent from \$292.3 million to \$273.7 million. This funding continued to decline between fiscal years 1991 and 1992, declining 21.6 percent from \$273.7 million to \$214.7 million. The total change in state and territorial funding for fiscal years 1986 through 1992 was an increase of 9.8 percent from \$195.6 million to \$214.7 million.

For fiscal years 1989 through 1991, 49 cities increased arts funding by an average of 15 percent, from \$165.2 million to \$188.7 million.

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SCOPE AND METHODOLOGY

We developed the information in this fact sheet between August and November 1991 from funding information and other data provided by NEA, the National Association of States Arts Agencies, and the National Association of Local Arts Agencies. As agreed with the Committees, we did not verify the accuracy of this data due to the total amount of data and numerous sources. Although we agreed to obtain data for fiscal years 1986 through 1992, in some cases data were not available for the full period.

AGENCY COMMENTS

In written comments, the NEA Chairman agreed with the information in our report. He suggested five changes. We made three of the changes but did not make the others for the reasons discussed below.

The Chairman suggested that we include funding adjusted for inflation. While we recognize that inflation rates could materially effect the purchasing power of the funding, we were asked to identify trends and the inflation adjustment would not affect the trends. Concerning the Chairman's last comment, that the overall percentage changes be included in table II.1, these figures were already included in the body of the letter. (See app. IV.)

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



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

Dear Mr. Gadsby:

We are in receipt of your draft report ARTS FUNDING: PUBLIC FUNDING PROFILES OF THE NEA STATES AND CITIES. I commend the clarity of this important study and find that the statistics will provide an important base line in the discussion of arts funding.

I offer a few comments on the report which I hope you will find useful:

1. On page 3 the sentence which begins with "also" might better be stated: "Also, this section of the law provided that a new program for artistically under-served curban and rural areas, NEA'S state set-aside program, was to be funded by 5 percent of NEA'S program funds. For fiscal year 1991, this amounted to \$6.3 million. These changes were funded by switching funds from the NEA'S discipline programs."

2. We note that actual allocations were used in up-dated figures on pages 10 and 13.

3. Although the sources for the figures are cited early in the report, perhaps reference to specific sources might also be included on the pages where the actual figures are shown.

4. Perhaps some consideration might be given to discussing figures with the effect of inflation included.

5. Page 22--the overall percentage change should be added.
