Opportunities for Public Participation in the Activities of the EPA Science Advisory Board

It is part of the statutory requirements, as well as the policy of the SAB Staff Office, to provide opportunities for public input. For example, the public has the opportunity to participate in the process in which new panels are formed by suggesting the names of qualified candidates for consideration, the public may also provide either written or oral comments to a committee or panel as part of the overall review process, and finally, there are opportunities to provide comment on the processes by which the SAB Staff Office manages the work of the these Federal advisory committees. Highlighted in this editorial are two important upcoming events that will provide further opportunity for public input.

First, a Federal Register notice will be issued this month that will call for nominations from the interested public for non-Federal experts to fill general membership vacancies on the Clean Air Scientific Advisory Committee, the Advisory Council on Clean Air Act Compliance Analysis, the SAB Executive Committee, and the various standing committees of the SAB. Interested members of the public may nominate qualified candidates to serve on one or more of the above groups. This process is one of several used by the SAB Staff Office in developing candidates for consideration by the EPA Administrator.

Second, a separate Federal Register notice will be issued this month in which the Science Advisory Board (SAB) Staff Office is inviting members of the public to attend a public meeting, scheduled for August 5 in the Washington DC Metro area, as part of its continued effort to be more effective in obtaining public input in the SAB activities. The SAB Staff Office is also announcing a

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three-week public comment period on a proposal to reorganize the SAB.

We hope that you take advantage of these opportunities to increase public participation in the work of these Federal advisory committees.

COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES IN JUNE

27-29



n June 10, the Executive Committee met via public teleconference to discuss FY2004 projects proposals submitted by standing committees of the SAB. At the SAB's next meeting on July 16-17, 2003, these self-proposed projects along with Agency submitted proposals, will be considered for inclusion in the SAB FY2004 Operating Plan. This Operating Plan will be available in October 2003. n June 12, 2003, the Air Quality Modeling Subcommittee of the Advisory Council on Compliance Analysis met in Clean Air Alexandria, Virginia. Chaired by Dr. David Allen, the Subcommittee met to receive briefings and conduct preliminary discussions of major topics related to the approach to air guality modeling described in the document "Benefits and Costs of the Clean Air Act 1990-2020: Revised Analytical Plan for EPA's Second Prospective Analysis"; and to decide a process for writing a report documenting AQMS advice that would be presented to the Advisory Council on Clean Air Compliance Analysis at its next planned meeting.

The Subcommittee focused primarily on issues related to the choice of emissions inventories to be used to support 5 analytical scenarios for the Second Prospective Analysis. Subcommittee members agreed to provide draft advice on four questions related to emissions for the Council to review at its July 15, 2003 teleconference, because analytical work related to emissions is fundamental to the Analysis and the Agency has requested early advice from the Subcommittee on the topic.

n June 17-18, the Environmental Engineering Committee (EEC) provided a consultation on improving leach testing of waste for the Office of Solid Waste. Dr. David Dzombak of Carnegie-Mellon University led the consultation. Dr. David Kosson from Vanderbilt University spoke on Current Extramural Research and Dr. Taylor Eimghy from the University of New Hampshire on Leach Testing in Environmental Assessment of the Reuse of Materials.

A Commentary does not seek consensus advice nor produce a report. Various individuals stated that they were pleased with the Framework, thought it was scientifically sound, responded to the EEC's 1999 Commentary, and had a lot of respect for what was presented, and cautioned that these comments did not constitute a detailed review. Individual members thought the Office of Solid Waste (OSW) might give more attention to defining their objective possibly identifying a short list of target problems where the modest amounts of research funding available could make a difference in practice.

The Committee's agenda included two other topics. Mr. Robert Springer, Director of the OSW briefed the Committee on Office of Solid Waste and Emergency Response's (OSWER) Resource Conservation Challenge which has grown from a project relating to recycling with goals specific to OSWER and RCRA into a broader and largely voluntary program emphasizing materials management, energy, priority chemicals. In addition, the Committee discussed its future in light of the SAB's plans for reorganization.

n June 20, the Supplemental Guidance for Assessing Cancer Susceptibility from Early-life Exposure to Carcinogens (SGACS) Review Panel, which is made up of members of the Science Advisory Board, Science Advisory Panel and Children Health Protection Advisory Committee, met via teleconference to discuss their draft report. Revisions were discussed and second teleconference has been scheduled for August 5, 2003. The Panel hopes to finalize their report and transmittal letter during the August teleconference and send the report for approval to the Executive Committee.
