Dear Mr. Chairman:

On October 10, 1973, you requested that we conduct two inquiries for you. The enclosed information is in response to the first part of your request which relates to the former Internal Security Division (ISD) of the Department of Justice. Specifically, you requested a description of the organizational changes resulting from the March 26, 1973, transfer of ISD functions to the Criminal Division. You also requested a comparison of budgeted amounts with actual amounts for ISD personnel and funding from January 1970 through March 1973 and for personnel and funding of the Internal Security Section of the Criminal Division from April through December 1973.

Enclosure I describes the organizational changes resulting from the transfer. The information in this enclosure was provided to us by officials of the Criminal Division, including a former ISD official. Organization charts for ISD before the transfer and for the Criminal Division after the transfer are included as enclosures II and III.

The requested data on personnel and funding is included in enclosures IV through X of this letter. They contain data on ISD's budgeted, appropriated, and obligated funds (enc. IV); obligations incurred by ISD sections and by the Internal Security Section of the Criminal Division (enc. V); available positions and actual employment of ISD, including personnel actions for the Intelligence Evaluation Committee (encs. VI through VIII); budgeted and actual man-years for ISD (enc. IX); and the disposition of the ISD positions after the transfer (enc. X). Because the budgetary and personnel records of ISD were not kept in a manner which would readily permit us to compile the requested data, the Department had to compile the data from many sources. Although we made a limited test of the data compiled, a detailed verification was not feasible.

In reviewing the above data on ISD's budgeted, appropriated, and obligated funds, we noted a disparity between the total funds available

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to ISD and the total obligations incurred during fiscal year 1971. (See enc. IV.) We are pursuing this matter further and will advise you of its outcome.

ORGANIZATION AND FUNCTIONS OF THE FORMER ISD  
AND THE PRESENT INTERNAL SECURITY SECTION  
OF THE CRIMINAL DIVISION

ISD was established by order of the Attorney General on July 9, 1954. It was responsible, at that time, for matters affecting the internal security of the United States, including the prosecution of all cases involving subversives; the enforcement of all statutes relating to subversive activities; the administration of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended, and the Subversive Activities Control Act of 1950; and Department of Justice representation on certain interdepartmental committees on internal security.

ISD was headed by an Assistant Attorney General. Officials who have held this position include:

A description of the organizational components of ISD before March 26, 1973, the effective date of its transfer to the Criminal Division, follows. ISD's organization chart before its abolishment is included as enclosure II.

- The Criminal Section was responsible for enforcing criminal statutes relating to subversive activities, including the laws regarding treason, espionage, sedition, and atomic energy matters. It supervised the prosecution of offenses arising under the Neutrality Act, the Bartlett Act, the Trading with the Enemy Act, and the Port Security Act; it was responsible for prosecuting certain cases involving false statements, perjury, contempt of the Congress, and passport violations; and it supervised the prosecution of offenses arising under the Military Selective Service Act for which a special unit within the Section was created.
- The Special Litigation Section was responsible for supervising all matters and prosecutions involving violations of Federal statutes whenever the offense was committed by terrorists or persons associated with terrorist activities.

- The Appeals and Research Section had primary responsibility for preparing all appellate briefs submitted by ISD to the courts of appeal and the Supreme Court. It conducted research into unusual legal problems raised by the Division's activities and reviewed draft legislation.
- The Civil Litigation Section was responsible for representing the Government in all civil actions in which the internal security of the United States could be involved and administered the program for designating organizations under the Federal Employees Security Program. The Section also defended congressional and executive activities and programs challenged by civil actions filed by private litigants in the internal security field.
- The Registration Section was responsible for enforcing registration statutes which require public disclosure by persons, who on the behalf of foreign interests, engage in propaganda and other activities designed to influence public opinion or official action.
- The Analysis and Evaluation Section was responsible for receiving, collating, and evaluating investigative reports from departmental and other sources relating to the activities, plans, and methodology of individuals or groups engaged in extremist or terrorist activities. The Section devoted much of its effort toward examining and evaluating evidence relevant to the unauthorized disclosure of the Department of Defense study entitled "U. S. --Vietnam Relations, 1945-1967" and toward supporting the prosecution team handling the case against Daniel Ellsberg and Anthony Russo in Los Angeles. The Section was also responsible for coordinating all Federal civilian activity connected with civil disturbance. The development of the latter responsibility can be traced in part to the formation of the Inter-Division Information Unit. In December 1967 the Attorney General directed the formation of the Unit and made it responsible for advising the Attorney General and other Department officials of actual or potential disturbances throughout the United States. By order of the Deputy Attorney General, on September 5, 1969, the Civil Disturbance Group was formed from the Inter-Division Information Unit. The Civil Disturbance Group continued with two organizational components, the Office of the Chief of Staff and the Inter-Division Information Unit. On February 1, 1971, the Civil Disturbance Group was incorporated in ISD and placed in the Intelligence Analysis Unit of the Analysis and Evaluation Section.
- The Office of Security for the Department was responsible for administering Executive Orders No. 10450 (Security Requirements for Government Employment) and 11652 (Classification and Declassification of National Security Information and Material).

## ENCLOSURE I

- The Defense Planning Section was responsible for coordinating and preparing plans and programs for the Department of Justice in a civil defense emergency.
- The Administrative Office was responsible for the administrative support of ISD.
- ISD represented the Department on the Interdepartmental Committee on Internal Security and provided the Committee with its Executive Secretary. The Committee is composed of representatives of the Departments of Justice, State, Defense, and the Treasury. Its charter directs it to effect the coordination of all phases of the internal security field except those specifically assigned to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Interdepartmental Intelligence Conference.

ISD also provided the Executive Director of the Intelligence Evaluation Committee which succeeded the Interdepartmental Evaluation Committee. The latter was an ad hoc committee charged with consolidating all intelligence on potential civil disturbances and recommending a course of action to the Attorney General. The White House directed the establishment of the Intelligence Evaluation Committee which included representatives of the Departments of Justice and Defense, Federal Bureau of Investigation, National Security Agency, Secret Service, and Central Intelligence Agency. A Department official told us that, on the basis of his experience with this Committee, he believes that it performed essentially the same functions as its predecessor--the Interdepartmental Evaluation Committee.

As a result of the transfer on March 26, 1973, ISD became a Section within the Criminal Division and consists of the following units. The organization chart of the Criminal Division after the abolishment of ISD is included as enclosure III.

- The Statutory Unit has responsibility for all functions of the former Criminal Section except for selective service matters.
- The Selective Service Unit has responsibility for all functions of the former Selective Service Unit of the Criminal Section.
- The Registration Unit has responsibility for all functions of the former Registration Section.
- The Civil Disturbance Unit has responsibility for those functions of the former Civil Disturbance Group of the Analysis and Evaluation Section.

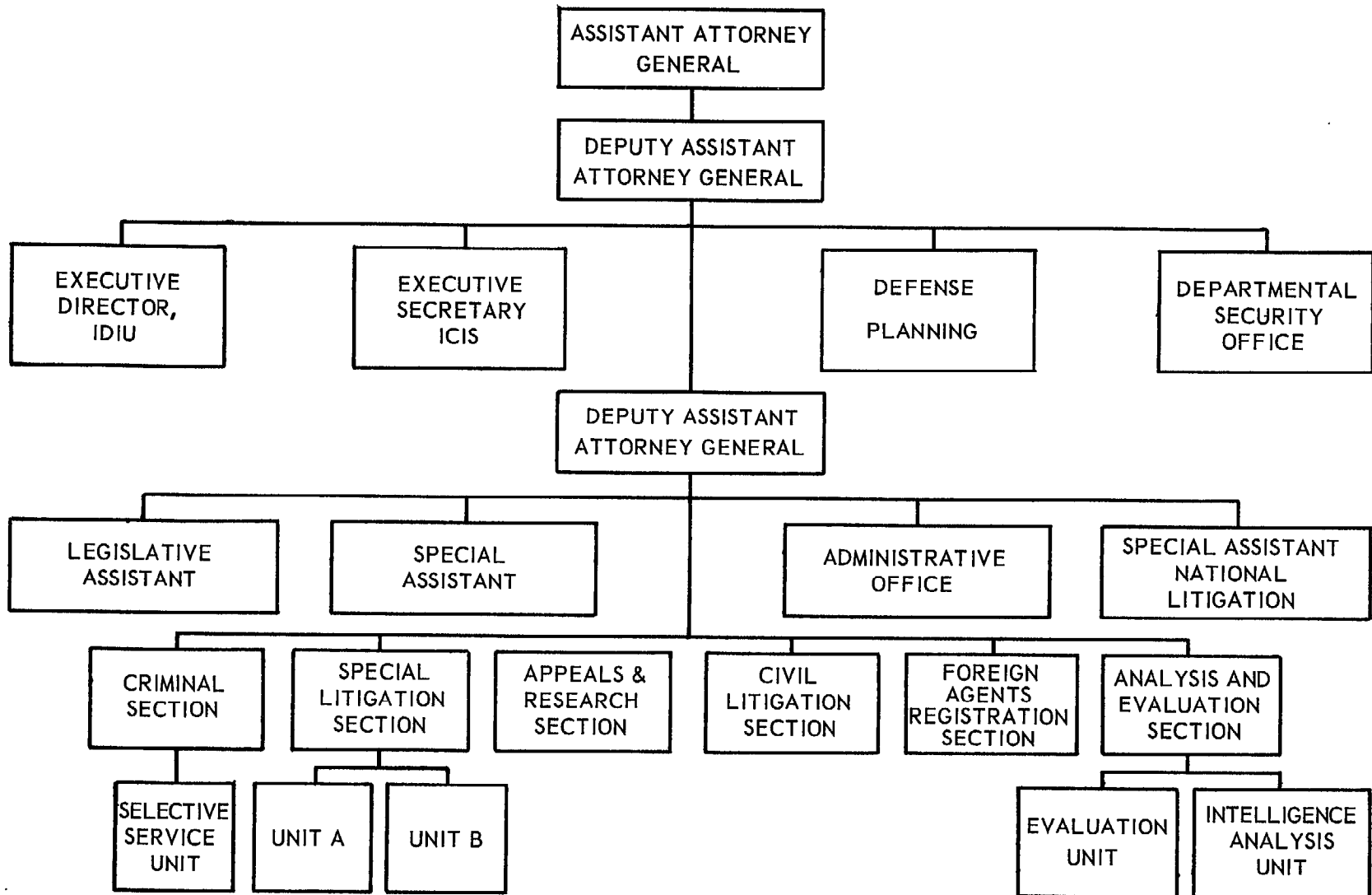
ISD personnel who represented the Department on the Interdepartmental Committee on Internal Security were transferred to the Internal Security

Section and continue to function as representatives of the Department on this Committee.

Other organizational changes resulting from the transfer or occurring after the transfer include the following.

- The Appeals and Research Section's appellate functions were merged into the Appellate Section of the Criminal Division.
- The Special Litigation Section became a Special Litigation Unit in the General Crimes Section of the Criminal Division.
- The Analysis and Evaluation Section was abolished except for the functions of the Civil Disturbance Group.
- The Office of Defense Planning and Coordination continued to function as a unit and was part of the Internal Security Section until its duties were transferred to the Office of Management and Finance under the Attorney General by Department reorganization on October 22, 1973.
- On June 11, 1973, the Assistant Attorney General, Criminal Division, with the concurrence of the other Committee members, abolished the Intelligence Evaluation Committee.
- The Office of Security, Criminal Division, was transferred by Department reorganization on October 22, 1973, to the Office of Management and Finance under the Attorney General.
- The Administrative Office was merged with the Administrative Section of the Criminal Division.
- Personnel formerly assigned to the Office of the Assistant Attorney General were either reassigned or transferred to other sections of the Department of Justice or other agencies of the Government.

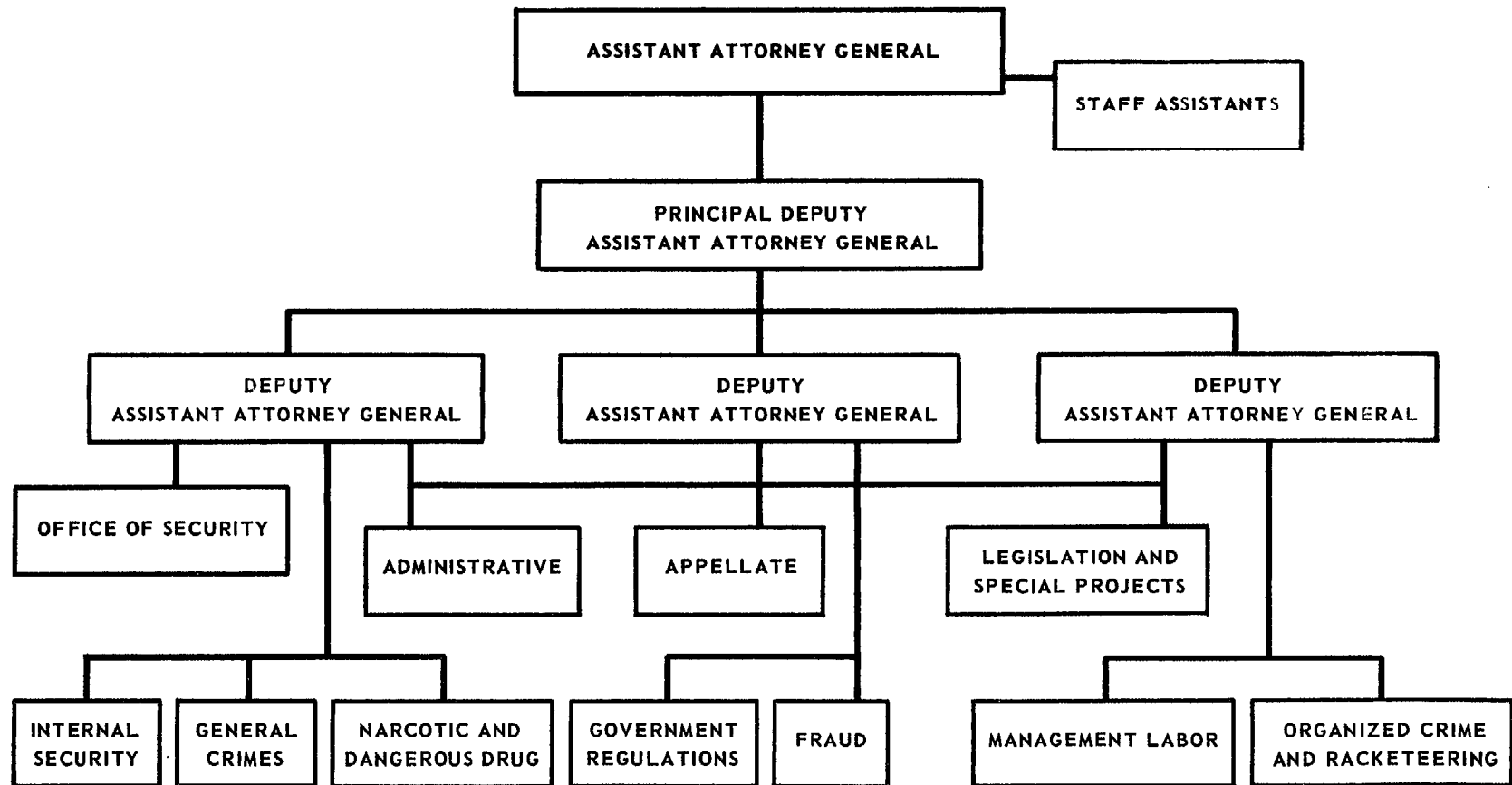
