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1	OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. MAX BAUCUS, A U.S. SENATOR FROM
2	MONTANA, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE
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4	The Chairman. The committee will come to order.
5	The committee meets today to consider S.J. Res. 41,
б	a joint resolution renewing the import restrictions in
7	the Burmese Freedom and Democracy Act.
8	Thomas Jefferson said, "The freedom and happiness of
9	man are the sole objects of all legitimate government."
LO	Today we meet to consider a resolution to advance the
L1	freedom of the Burmese people. We consider S.J. Res. 41,
L2	which renews import sanctions on the Burmese government.
L3	Burma is a government that, time and again, has
L4	repudiated the freedom and happiness of its people.
L5	Instead, the Burmese government has prohibited freedom of
L6	speech and press, has engaged in gross human rights
L7	violations, and has made children into soldiers.
L8	I have long held that unilateral sanctions are not
L9	often effective. For that reason, in 2003 when Congress
20	first considered imposing sanctions on the Burmese
21	government, Senator Grassley and I worked together to
22	ensure that the import ban on Burmese products was not
23	open ended.
24	We agreed to revisit the ban on an annual basis to
25	ensure that the sanctions remain the appropriate tool to

- 1 address America's human rights concerns with Burma.
- 2 Sadly for the Burmese people, the human rights situation
- 3 in Burma continues to deteriorate.
- 4 This year was an especially chilling year in Burma.
- 5 The Burmese government forcibly retaliated against
- 6 Buddhist monks who were peacefully demonstrating against
- 7 the poor economic conditions in Burma, and the government
- 8 demonstrated its sheer disregard for the Burmese people
- 9 by refusing the speedy entry of international aid after
- 10 the cyclone in May.
- 11 America has responded vigorously to these
- 12 atrocities. Just last week, the House and Senate
- approved tightening trade, economic, and other sanctions
- 14 against Burma. Our European allies have also imposed
- import restrictions on Burmese gems, timber, and metal,
- and they imposed financial and travel sanctions on
- 17 Burmese government officials.
- 18 The U.N. has called on the Burmese government to
- 19 conduct a free and fair constitutional referendum to
- 20 allow greater humanitarian aid and open a dialogue with
- 21 the political opposition. The worsening situation in
- 22 Burma, coupled with strengthened action on the part of
- 23 the international community, underscores the
- 24 appropriateness of renewing the import ban today.
- Let us renew these sanctions today and fulfill our

Τ	worthy objective. Let us use the tools at our disposal
2	to help achieve the freedom and happiness of the Burmese
3	people. I invite my colleagues to come together to
4	approve the resolution before us today.
5	I now recognize Senator Grassley for any opening
6	remarks that he may choose to make.
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2. FROM IOWA 3 Senator Grasslev. The Chairman has said that the 5 human rights record of Burma is deplorable. I agree with 6 The abuses have been extensive and, worse yet, the 7 trends continue, with the government crack-down on 8 peaceful protests leading to the beatings, detentions, 9 and deaths of Burmese monks. There are reportedly over 10 1,800 political prisoners still in jail. That is 700 more prisoners than the State Department reported last 11 12 year. 13 The leader of the opposition has spent 12 out of the 14 last 19 years under house arrest. Since our last renewal, the United Nations Security Council adopted a 15 16 presidential statement expressing disappointing with the 17 regime's use of violence, and underscoring the importance 18 of releasing these political prisoners. 19 We should send a strong signal to the military Junta 20 that their ongoing behavior is unacceptable. I urge my 21 colleagues to vote in favor of continuing trade sanctions against Burma for another year. 22 23 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 2.4 The Chairman. - 17 The Chairman. Thank you.
- I will now call on Ms. Poteet, if she wishes to
- 19 address her description of the resolution.
- 20 Ms. Poteet. I have no further comments. Thank
- 21 you.
- The Chairman. Do Senators have any questions
- 23 regarding the joint resolution?

- 12 Senator Conrad. I would like to withdraw my
- 13 statement. I do not have a statement. I will spare you
- 14 a statement.
- The Chairman. Thank you, Senator, for coming to
- 16 the markup. We do expect a quorum to be here, but not
- 17 until about 10:30.
- 18 Senator Conrad. Would now be a good time to make
