SANDRA C. VERNA, Officer, United States Secret Service (USSS), Uniformed Division (UD), date of birth [REDACTED] was interviewed at the Office of the Independent Counsel (OIC), 1001 Pennsylvania Avenue, NW, Washington, D.C. 20004. Present for the interview were Associate Independent Counsel (AIC) MICHAEL TRAVERS and AIC MARY ANNE WIRTH and Department of Justice (DOJ) attorneys GARY GRINDLER and JONATHAN SCHWARTZ. VERNA was advised of the identity of the interviewers and the purpose of the interview. VERNA provided the following:

VERNA has been employed by the USSS since October 5, 1988. After working outside of the White House Grounds for approximately six and one-half years, VERNA was assigned to the White House complex, without a permanent post, in April of 1995. VERNA retained this position until July of 1995, when she was moved to the East Wing of the White House as a relief officer. VERNA served in that capacity until August or September of 1995, when she was assigned to the West Wing [REDACTED] post. The [REDACTED] post is located in the corridor adjacent to the Oval Office. VERNA served at this post from August or September of 1995 through August of 1996. VERNA worked a rotating shift, which consisted of one week of day work (6:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.), and one week of evening work (2:30 p.m. to 11:00 p.m.). VERNA would fill in at other posts from time to time. VERNA's main partner [REDACTED] was JOHN GERENA. VERNA also partnered with GARY BYRNE and DAN ORDAKOWSKI on occasion.

VERNA met MONICA LEWINSKY while LEWINSKY was working at the White House as an intern. This was prior to the government shutdown in November of 1995. LEWINSKY would always say hello, and chat with VERNA. LEWINSKY would pass VERNA several times a day at the E-6 post.

VERNA had heard a rumor that LEWINSKY and President WILLIAM JEFFERSON CLINTON watched a movie together. VERNA asked LEWINSKY if the rumor was true. LEWINSKY told VERNA that the rumor was not true, but that the President had stopped into LEWINSKY's office in the East Wing to say hello. The President had been watching a movie in the East Wing theater. LEWINSKY

told VERNA that she had a college friend visiting her when the President stopped in.

VERNA advised that BAYANI NELVIS, White House steward, stood in the same area as VERNA v [REDACTED]. NELVIS was friendly, and they often conversed.

VERNA knew NELVIS to be friendly with LEWINSKY. Sometime around January of 1996, NELVIS showed VERNA a tie LEWINSKY had given him as a gift. NELVIS told VERNA that LEWINSKY had also given the President a tie, for either his birthday or Christmas.

Sometime after LEWINSKY was transferred to the Pentagon, VERNA overheard NELVIS speaking to LEWINSKY on the pantry telephone. NELVIS told VERNA this as he was speaking to LEWINSKY. VERNA told NELVIS to tell LEWINSKY she said "hi." VERNA does not recall the specifics of the telephone call.

NELVIS told VERNA that he had seen LEWINSKY on an official trip abroad that LEWINSKY had taken as part of her job at the Pentagon. NELVIS stayed at the same hotel as part of a Presidential trip. NELVIS told VERNA that he and LEWINSKY had dinner together. VERNA could not recall the location of this trip.

VERNA stated that NELVIS never told her that the President and LEWINSKY had a relationship.

VERNA also knew GLEN MAES, White House steward. VERNA did not speak to MAES as often as she spoke to NELVIS. MAES never suggested to VERNA that the President and LEWINSKY had a relationship.

While on duty [REDACTED] on one occasion, VERNA observed LEWINSKY upset and crying. This was at the time LEWINSKY was transferred to the Pentagon. LEWINSKY was crying and speaking to BETTY CURRIE. LEWINSKY was upset about being transferred. CURRIE told LEWINSKY that she could not do anything, and that LEWINSKY should speak to NANCY HERNREICH. HERNREICH then entered the corridor and told LEWINSKY that there was nothing she could do. HERNREICH and LEWINSKY then walked down the corridor together, away from VERNA.

VERNA advised that she did not know of an official or unofficial reason for LEWINSKY being moved from the White House.

VERNA was told by USSS Officer STEVE PAPE that LEWINSKY was escorted onto the White House grounds by White House Press Secretary MIKE McCURRY, on more than one occasion. PAPE told VERNA this after the LEWINSKY story became news. However, PAPE had observed McCURRY and LEWINSKY before the story broke.

VERNA advised that LEWINSKY had given her a Christmas card in 1995, and that VERNA had saved it. LEWINSKY also gave VERNA a birthday gift of soap and lotion in January of 1996, from CRABTREE AND EVELYN.

VERNA stated that USSS Officer CHRIS SEUBERT told VERNA that he was going to ask DEBBIE SCHIFF if she would sign a copy of a tabloid article about her. VERNA asked SEUBERT to get an autograph for her as well. VERNA never got the autograph.

VERNA advised that USSS Officer MIKE RICE told VERNA that he saw a copy of the same tabloid article, and that the President had signed it for SCHIFF. The autograph read, "You've been smeared with the best of us."

Q Okay During the time that you were working at the E-6 post, say between October of 1995 -- I'm sorry, September of 1995 and approximately October of 1996?

A Right.

Q Which shifts did you work?

A

Q Did you have a partner during this time?

A Yes. I was partners with John Gerena.

Q Did you work any other posts in the White House complex during this period?

A

A Maybe in the West Wing on some occasions, but when I went to the assignments and scheduling office, I pretty much worked my days off over there whenever I could. So, maybe hit or miss, five or six times outside of that. But

probably no more than that.

Q Do you recall when you first met Monica Lewinsky?

A I think it was probably when I came back from maternity leave, which would have been September of '95, after I had had my daughter. I don't recall meeting her prior to that.

Q How did you meet her?

A A lot of times when you are sitting there and you see new interns or volunteers walking by, you'd, you know, stop, ask them, hi, how are you, are you new, what's your name, where are you working, that kind of thing. And that's probably what started the conversation. I don't recall a specific conversation, but that's probably what had happened when I met her.

Q

A Probably any of the posts I worked in the West Wing I would have seen her if she was working.

Q Could you describe for us how well you knew her during the time that she worked at the White House?

A I talked to her every day when I seen her there. She was going to get breakfasts, I would say hello to her, how was your day. In passing, I would talk to her.

Q What were typically the subjects of conversations?

Anything aside from small talk like that?

A Small talk, you know, how are the kids, how are the family, what are you doing this weekend. She was always talking about being on a diet or telling me about her mom trying to fix her up with blind dates, just normal everyday conversation.

Q Did you at any time hear a rumor involving Ms. Lewinsky and having something to do with the White House movie theater?

A Yes. I remember hearing a general rumor that she had been in the movie theater and I asked her about it. I asked her about it specifically because at the time the President and the First Lady a lot of times would take a bunch of people into the movie theater and they would see a movie on the weekend, and it was fairly routine.

And I asked her, I said, did you go to the movie theater, and she said no, she had been working late in her office in the East Wing. She did say that the President had come out of the restroom that was right around the corner from where her office was -- they were kind of kitty-cornered -- and she was working late there and her friend was visiting from California. And she said he did come over, say hello to her and meet her friend from California, but she didn't go to the movie theater.

Q So, the substance of the rumor that you heard was

that she had gone into the movie theater with the President to watch a movie and possibly with other people?

A That was the infer -- the only infer -- the general rumor that I had heard was that she had gone to the movie theater.

Q And when you asked her about it, she told you that that had not actually happened?

A Right. She said she worked late in her office.

Q Do you recall seeing Monica Lewinsky in the area near the E-6 post around the time that she was transferred from the White House to the Department of Defense?

A Yeah. It was probably like a week before she got transferred. I do remember seeing her over there.

Q Do you have a recollection of any specific incidents where you saw her in that area around the time?

A I

There was a separate door. And she had walked in crying. She was very upset. Said she was leaving, she was being transferred. And she stopped to talk to Betty Currie. She went in and talked to Betty, and Betty came out in the hallway. They were just kind of outside the door, close enough for me to see, but all I, all I remember hearing was Betty saying, I can't help you, you'll have to talk to Nancy. And then Betty walked back in the office.

Nancy Hernreich came out, started talking to her in the hallway and said there was nothing that she could do.

Q Let me make sure I understand this. So, Monica Lewinsky initially came down the hallway toward the Oval Office.

A Correct.

Q Correct.

A Correct.

Q And she told you, I'm leaving?

A Yes. She said, I'm being transferred. I remember her -- I mean, not specifically word for word, but she said, I'm being transferred, and she was crying. She wasn't very happy.

Q Okay. What did you say to her in response?

A I don't remember word for word, but it was probably, I'm sorry to hear that. And then she went in and talked to Betty.

Q And you were able to observe her, at least part of her conversation with Betty Currie?

A Yeah. She looked upset. She didn't want to be transferred.

Q Where exactly was she having this conversation with Betty?

A Here's the secretary's entrance door. They were

probably just maybe like two feet outside of the door going into the secretary's office.

A Correct.

Q About how many feet away would you say you were?

A She was probably maybe seven feet, six, seven feet away.

Q And do you recall exactly what you heard Betty Currie say to her?

A I just remember Betty saying, you know, there's nothing I can do, you'll have to talk to Nancy.

Q Could you hear what Monica said back to Betty at that point?

A No, I don't remember anything specific from that point.

Q Do you recall what Nancy Hemreich said to Monica when she came out beyond --

A I just remember Nancy saying --

Q -- what you've already told us?

A No, nothing. Just other than there was nothing she could do. And then they started walking away.

Q Did the conversation between Monica and Nancy Hemreich take place in the same location that you have described the conversation between --

A Right.

Q -- Monica and Betty Currie?
 A Right.
 Q And after Monica finished speaking with Nancy
 Herrm ch, in which direction did they walk away?
 A [REDACTED]
 Q And that's away from --
 A Away from the Oval Office.
 Q -- where you were --
 A Right.
 Q [REDACTED]
 A Right.
 Q Okay. Is there anything else that you recall about
 those conversations that you haven't --
 A Nothing that I haven't mentioned.
 Q -- described to us already?
 A Did you ever receive any gifts from Monica
 Lewinsky?
 A Yes, I did, a birthday gift in January of '96. It
 was a, it was like a box of soaps. There was lotions in it.
 And there was like two bottles of lotion and a couple bars of
 soap in there. I still have it, but she had given that to me
 for my birthday.
 Q Anything else?
 A A Christmas card. I had gotten a Christmas card

from her.
 Q Do you recall when she --
 A December.
 Q -- had given that to you?
 A December of '95 I got that Christmas card. I don't
 remember the exact date.
 Q Did you ever give her any gifts in return?
 A No, I did not.
 Q Did you consider it unusual to receive gifts from a
 White House staffer?
 A I have exchanged Christmas gifts with Betty and
 Nancy and Debbi prior to that. That was the first time I
 ever got a birthday gift from anybody, but Monica had -- she
 was just a gift-giving kind of person. Usually when I talked
 to Monica it was myself, Bayani Nelvis standing there, and we
 just all kind of talked about birthdays in general. And I
 know she had given Nel a tie for his birthday, and then my
 birthday was shortly thereafter that, and she had given me
 the lotions. And then from that point, I didn't run into her
 around her birthday, or I would have reciprocated and given
 her a gift back.
 Q At the time that you saw Monica have the
 conversations with Betty Currie and Nancy Herrreich that you
 described, did you know of any official or unofficial reason
 why she was being transferred from the White House?

A No, I didn't know why she was being transferred.
 Q Since that time, have you heard from any source,
 other than the media -- let's exclude for the moment
 newspapers, the television -- any official or unofficial
 reason why she was transferred?
 A Can you repeat that? I'm sorry.
 Q Excluding things that you might have read in the
 newspapers or seen on TV --
 A Uh-huh.
 Q -- since the time that you told us about where you
 saw her talking to Betty Currie and Nancy Herrreich, have you
 heard of any official or unofficial reason why she was
 transferred to the Pentagon?
 A Without revealing any privileged information, no.
 Anything I've read in the paper is pretty much, in regards to
 her being transferred, all that I knew.
 Q Okay. Have you ever spoken with Officer Steven
 Pape about Monica Lewinsky?
 A Yes.
 Q What has Steven Pape told you?
 A He -- I don't even know how we got on the subject.
 But with -- when all this first came out in the press, a lot
 of people had started talking, and he did say that he had
 seen her come in through the West Wing, or through the
 Southwest Gate to go to the West Wing while he was on shift.

Q Did he describe anything further about who escorted
 Ms. Lewinsky into --
 A He did say --
 Q -- the West Wing?
 A -- Mike McCurry had escorted her on occasion.
 Q Did he say how many times she had come in through
 the Southwest Gate?
 A I don't remember specifically. I don't think it
 was any more than one or two, but I don't -- offhand, I don't
 remember.
 Q And I believe you mentioned that Officer Pape told
 you this after --
 A Correct.
 Q -- the Monica Lewinsky story became public?
 A Right.
 Q Did he describe when the occurrences took place in
 which Ms. Lewinsky was escorted?
 A No, I don't remember offhand.
 Q Did you understand him to mean that that had taken
 place before the story became public in --
 A Yes. Oh, yes.
 Q -- January of 1998?
 A Yes.
 Q Have you heard anything that pertains to Ms.
 Lewinsky from Officer Michael Rice?

A The only thing I recall hearing from Mike was that
 there was -- when the National Enquirer story came out, that
 one of the people that worked over in the West Wing, Debbi
 Schiff, had had the Enquirer article signed by the President.
 I think it said, you were smeared with the best of us, I
 think he said that it was written on there.
 Q Now, when you say the National Enquirer article, do
 you mean the article -- well, why don't you explain to --
 A There was an article that was in the National
 Enquirer.
 Q -- us specifically what you mean?
 A And on the front of it, Debbi Schiff had her
 picture on there and she was the West Wing receptionist. And
 I do recall him saying that she had showed him that she had
 it signed, autographed by the President. And it just said,
 you've been smeared with the best of us.
 Q And the President had written that?
 A Yes.
 Q With his autograph?
 A Yes. We all joked around about getting it signed,
 you know, oh, let's get it signed while we're over there.
 But she did get it signed.
 Q When you say "we all" --
 A The officers that were assigned over there or
 previously been assigned over there that knew Debbi. We

joked around about having her autograph it.
 Q And that's the Uniformed Division officers working
 in the West Wing near where --
 A Correct.
 Q -- Debbi works in the --
 A Correct.
 Q -- West Wing reception area?
 A Correct.
 Q Do you know whether Debbi Schiff signed any copies
 of that article herself?
 A I think she signed Officer Seubert, Chris
 Seubert's. I didn't see it. He just said that she had

[1] Q And you were on that post for about a year. I
[2] believe you mentioned earlier, between September of 1995 and
[3] October of 1996?

[4] A Right.
[5] Q Is it fair to say then that most of the time that
[6] you were posted at those locations you had occasion to speak
[7] with him?

[8] A Uh-huh.
[9] Q How well do you know him after now speaking with
[10] him on those occasions?

[11] A I'd say he's a work acquaintance. I wouldn't say
[12] we are really good friends. I mean, we've talked about
[13] family and all that. But outside of the job, I really didn't
[14] know that much outside of the job.

[15] Q What kinds of matter did you usually talk about
[16] with Mr. Nelvis?

[17] A A lot of times my kids, you know, his son, or just
[18] everyday stuff. Nothing -- it wasn't just like a set of
[19] topics. I had just had my daughter. I was always bringing
[20] in pictures. We talked about my children a lot, you know,
[21] and vice versa. I mean, he would talk about his family and
[22] what they were doing. You know, just killing time kind of
[23] conversation pretty much while you're standing on post.

[24] Q Did you ever discuss Monica Lewinsky with him?
[25] A Probably after she left, you know, I had asked if

[1] he had talked to her or seen her or said hello, because we
[2] all kind of talked. Whenever we had seen each other, we all
[3] talked and, yeah, I'm sure I did. You know, I know I asked
[4] him if he's talked to her or seen her.

[5] Q Do you recall what he responded on any of those
[6] occasions?

[7] A I remember him saying that she had called on the
[8] pantry phone. Actually I remember being there when she had
[9] called on the pantry phone. I don't know what the
[10] conversation was about. I just remember saying, hey, Nel,
[11] and he said, you know, oh, it's Monica. I said, oh, tell her
[12] I said hi, and just kind of went about my business and waited
[13] for him to get off the phone. But nothing, nothing more
[14] specific than that. Just tell her I said hi, how's it going,
[15] that kind of thing.

[16] Q Were you able to overhear any part of the
[17] conversation that he had with her on that occasion?

[18] A Not that I remember. I just remember him saying it
[19] was Monica and I said, tell her hi. But I don't even
[20] remember the day. I don't remember -- I just know after,
[21] after she was gone, I do remember being there one day when
[22] she had called. But.

[23] Q Do you remember on any other occasions Mr. Nelvis
[24] telling you, or discussing with him the fact that he had
[25] spoken with Monica on the phone?

[1] A Can you repeat? It's pretty much what I just told
[2] you.

[3] Q Were there any other occasions on which you talked
[4] with Bayani Nelvis about Bayani Nelvis speaking with Monica
[5] Lewinsky on the phone?

[6] A I remember that one -- maybe one or two incidents,
[7] but I don't -- nothing that stands out, other than I had
[8] talked to Monica. Nothing.

[9] Q Did he ever tell you about any gifts that he had
[10] received from Monica Lewinsky?

[11] A He did say that he got a tie.

[12] Q Do you recall when he told you that?

[13] A I think it was, it was for his birthday. It was
[14] shortly after his birthday, and I remember him saying, oh,
[15] this is the tie that Monica got.

[16] Q So, when he told you this, he was wearing it?

[17] A Yeah.

[18] Q And he showed it to you?

[19] A Uh-huh. And I remember Monica saying, when she
[20] walked by, she said, oh, that's the tie I got him. But as
[21] for dates, time, I don't remember that. I just do remember
[22] her saying that that was the tie.

[23] Q Did she walk by and point that out at approximately
[24] the same time as he showed you the tie, or did those events
[25] happen on two different occasions?

[1] A No, it was probably the same, it was probably the
[2] same day. I mean, I don't recall specifically, but I'm sure
[3] the day he showed me the tie was when he got it, and she
[4] probably came by.

[5] Q That would have been before she was transferred to
[6] the --

[7] A Oh, yeah.

[8] Q -- Pentagon?

[9] A Yeah. I know it was before I got my birthday gift.

[10] So, his birthday had to be sometime between September and
[11] December. But.

[12] Q Did Mr. Nelvis ever tell you about any gifts
[13] exchanged between Monica Lewinsky and the President?

[14] A I don't -- I don't recall Nel saying anything. I
[15] know Monica said she did get him a tie for, I think it was
[16] his birthday or Christmas, for the President. But I don't

[17] remember -- I don't remember specifically what occasion it
[18] was. But I just know she said that she had gotten him a tie.
[19] And I don't remember the occasion.

[20] And the only reason I remember that is because like
[21] another day in passing she said that that was the tie. But I
[22] don't remember what it looked like. I don't.

[23] Q Was there ever a point at which Mr. Nelvis said to
[24] you something along the lines of Monica Lewinsky also gave
[25] the President a tie --

[1] A No, I don't --

[2] Q -- just like she gave me one?

[3] A No, I don't remember Nel -- they could have been
[4] similar designs, but I don't, I don't remember. Is what you
[5] -- like they looked alike? Is that the way you were phrasing
[6] that, or?

[7] Q Well, I don't really mean to imply anything by
[8] that. Just did he ever suggest to you that Monica had given
[9] the President any gifts?

[10] A I don't remember him specifically saying, Monica
[11] got him a tie. I remember more so Monica saying, I got him a
[12] tie, versus Nel.

[13] Q Did Bayani Nelvis ever tell you that he had seen
[14] Monica Lewinsky outside the White House?

[15] A I think he ran into her on a trip. I'm not sure.

[16] I think -- I don't remember the trip. I know that he said

[17] that he was out on a trip and had run into her. But I don't

[18] remember, I don't know where the location was. I don't

[19] travel and I'm not one to follow up on the trips, you know,

[20] that -- a lot of guys when they travel, they're like, you

[21] know, oh, there's a trip going to LA or there's a trip going

[22] here or there. I don't follow the trips.

[23] So, when he said he was out on a trip, I didn't

[24] remember picking up the location but I do recall him saying

[25] that he had seen her out on a detail. They stayed in the

[1] same hotel but she was assigned -- that was with her new
 [2] job. She was assigned there with her new job.
 [3] Q Now when you refer to trips, these are official
 [4] trips?
 [5] A Official trips, business trips.
 [6] Q And when you say "out on a detail", that means?
 [7] A Out on a detail with his job as a steward.
 [8] Q So, this was a trip that he had taken in his
 [9] capacity as a Presidential steward?
 [10] A Correct.
 [11] Q Was the President also along on that trip?
 [12] A I believe so.
 [13] Q And he told you that he had seen Monica --
 [14] A He had seen Monica.
 [15] Q -- on that trip? And she had also gone to the same
 [16] place?
 [17] A Right, with her job that she was at.
 [18] Q Was that at her Pentagon job?
 [19] A Yes.
 [20] Q Did he say whether he had had dinner with her?
 [21] A It was either dinner or lunch. Yes, he did.
 [22] Nelvis had dinner with Monica -- it was either dinner or
 [23] lunch, while they were on the trip.
 [24] Q Did he tell you anything more about that --
 [25] A No.

[1] Wing when you would see her?
 [2] A Oh, I don't know. I mean, it could be to deliver
 [3] paperwork. I mean, they had offices on both sides. I don't
 [4] know why she would, other than the breakfast run. But.

 [16] Q You mentioned previously that Officer Steven Pape
 [17] told you about at least one occasion on which Ms. Lewinsky
 [18] had come to the Southwest Gate and been escorted by Mike
 [19] McCurry?
 [20] A Uh-huh.
 [21] Q Did he describe anything else about that incident?
 [22] A No.
 [23] Q Have you ever heard any rumors or stories connecte
 [24] with Monica Lewinsky that have to do with someone finding

12 Counsel and this is a grand jury that's been empaneled by
13 a United States district judge here in the District of
14 Columbia to investigate possible obstruction of justice
15 charges on the part of Monica Lewinsky and others in the
16 case of Jones v. Clinton. Do you understand that, ma'am?
17 A Yes, sir.
18 Q And do you recall that you gave a deposition in
19 lieu of grand jury testimony in this matter on June 11th of
20 this year, 1998?
21 A Yes, sir.
22 Q Ms. Verna, at the outset of that deposition, the
23 prosecutor reviewed some rights and responsibilities with

1 Q I also wish to tell you that I as well as my
2 colleagues from the Independent Counsel's office here today
3 as well as the grand jurors are bound by an oath of secrecy
4 to not reveal the matters that take place here this morning.
5 Do you understand that?
6 A Yes, sir.

8 secrecy. Do you understand that?

 24 A The way it was relayed to me was within the next
 25 couple of minutes Harold Ickes came walking down the hallway

 2 through Betty Currie's door and went into the Oval Office

 4 Q And did he come from the direction -- as he's
 5 coming down the hallway, did he come from the direction of

 8 A From the other direction.

 10 A The side of the pantry. He was coming from his
 11 office.
 12 Q And why did he go into the Oval Office suite?

 17 Q And when you say the operator called "him" --
 18 A Called Harold Ickes.

 21 Q And what happens after Harold Ickes walks in
 22 through Betty Currie's door?
 23 A My understanding is he just was in there for a few
 24 minutes and then came out, walked back down the hallway

 2 said she came out of the office.
 3 Q Okay. So Officer Muskett told you a few minutes
 4 after Ickes comes back out and walks down the hall, Monica

 3 incident, did you hear from any other United States Secret
 4 Service officer about any other incident involving
 5 Ms. Lewinsky and the President?
 6 A There was a northwest gate incident where she was

 8 of that, I just remember general -- oh, no. I'm sorry. From
 9 Brent Chinery, I talked to Brent Chinery, but I don't

25 and a half after Easter Sunday. It was shortly thereafter.

1 I mean, I'd say probably no more than a week and a half.
2 Q Where was Ms. Lewinsky when you observed her
3 crying?
4 A [REDACTED]
5 [REDACTED] and I remember that the President was not there, and
6 she had come down the hallway, like coming to Betty Currie's
7 office.
8 Q Is that from the pantry end or from the opposite
9 end?
10 A No, from the other end. From the opposite end.
11 She was coming across --
12 Q I'm sorry. Let me just clarify that for the
13 record. From the pantry end or opposite from the pantry?
14 A Opposite from the pantry.
15 Q Thank you.
16 A She was coming down the hallway and she was crying
17 and, you know -- I said, "What's wrong?" And she said,
18 "I'm being transferred." And then she went into Betty's
19 office.
20 Betty came out in the hallway and she was talking
21 to her just outside of her door, probably maybe like two feet
22 away from her door, and she was crying and I just remember
23 Betty saying, you know, "There's nothing that I can do."
24 There's nothing that I can do. You'll have to talk to
25 Nancy."

1 So then Betty went back in and then Nancy Herrreich
2 came out and pretty much said the same thing, "There's
3 nothing that I can do." And then they started to walk away
4 like they were going to exit.
5 BY MS. WIRTH:
6 Q When you said they started to walk away, who did?
7 A Nancy Herrreich and Monica.
8 BY MR. SUSANIN:
9 Q Ms. Verna, did you hear about any other incidents
10 involving Ms. Lewinsky in the West Wing from any other
11 officers of the Secret Service?
12 A Not that I can recall offhand.
13 Q When you testified at your deposition on June 11th,
14 you were asked whether you heard any rumors about a
15 relationship between Ms. Lewinsky and the President and you
16 said no, you had not. Do you recall that testimony?
17 A That I had not?
18 Q Correct.
19 A No, I recall saying that I had heard a general
20 rumor that she had been in the movie theater with the
21 President over in the East Wing and I asked her about that
22 just because when the Clintons first came in, I believe,
23 Friday or Saturday nights they'd take 30 or so people and
24 they'd go watch a movie and I recall saying to her, "Were
25 you in the movie theater with the President?"

Page 24

1 And she said her office in the East Wing was like
2 catty-corner to where the theater was and when the President
3 went to use the restroom, he saw her and her friend over
4 there and came over and said hello and talked to her and
5 that's what she told me happened. But as for anything else
6 involving the President, no. Unless I'm just misinterpreting
7 the question.
8 Q Well, let me show you a copy of your deposition
9 from June 30th and ask you to look at page 30, line --
10 A Okay. Here it is. Having a relationship with --
11 Q Let me just get the question out so we can keep a
12 clean record. I'm going to ask you to read lines 4 to 7 out
13 loud if you could.
14 A Okay. "Have you ever heard from other Secret
15 Service officers a rumor that Monica Lewinsky was having a
16 relationship with the President?" "No, I did not."
17 Q And by that time, you had already testified in the
18 deposition about the movie theater incident, is that correct?
19 A Right. Right. I was just mixing up the questions,
20 that was my misunderstanding.
21 Q Okay. So at the time you said no in your
22 deposition to that answer that we just read --
23 A Right.
24 Q -- did you mean no in addition to the movie
25 theater --

1 A Right. Right.
 2 Q -- incident you just testified about?
 3 A Yes, sir. Because you hadn't asked me that, so I
 4 wanted to make sure that was on the record.
 5 Q Okay. And at the time you said no to hearing any
 6 other rumors, however, you had not testified about the
 7 Officer Muskett incident in your deposition. Is that right?
 8 A That's right, sir.
 9 Q And can you explain why that is?
 10 A Because that fell under privileged information.
 11 MR. SUSANIN: Thank you, Ms. Verna. Let me see if
 12 my colleagues have questions.
 13 THE WITNESS: Okay.
 14 MS. WIRTH: I have some.
 15 MR. WISENBERG: I have a few.
 16 MS. WIRTH: Do you want to go first?
 17 MR. WISENBERG: You can go first.
 18 MS. WIRTH: Okay.
 19 BY MS. WIRTH:
 20 Q I think you testified that Officer Muskett told you
 21 about this incident that happened on Easter Sunday the next
 22 day?
 23 A Yes. I remember it to be the next day.
 24 Q Okay. What was his demeanor like when he talked to
 25 you about this? Was he --

1 Gerena?
 2 A Gerena.
 3 Q Was your partner around that time.
 4 A Right.
 5 Q Do you know whether John Gerena knows anything
 6 about Monica Lewinsky?
 7 A I'm sure he knows who she is, but other than that,
 8 I don't know.
 9 Q Did he ever tell you whether he had seen Monica
 10 Lewinsky in the vicinity of the Oval Office? Or do you know
 11 whether he has?
 12 A Probably because she was an intern and then a
 13 permanent passholder, so she did have business in the West
 14 Wing so I'm sure she did. I just know -- I talked to her, so
 15 I probably paid attention to it more.
 16 Q Do you know if John Gerena has had any specific
 17 encounters with Monica Lewinsky?
 18 A I don't know offhand.
 19 Q Did he ever discuss whether he had ever seen Monica
 20 Lewinsky with the President with you?
 21 A No.
 22 Q I think just to make the record clear, at one
 23 point where you were discussing what had been told to you
 24 about the Easter Sunday incident you said something like
 25 they said that Monica came out a door and you didn't know

1 A Well, see, when I had told him to take the post, I
 2 said, "Oh, nothing's going to happen." A [REDACTED]'t
 3 [REDACTED] tour groups
 4 coming through and they want to know about the furniture and
 5 the rugs or they're not quite sure who should be walking
 6 around or who shouldn't, so I said, "Oh, nothing's going to
 7 happen on Easter Sunday."
 8 So the next morning, it was like, "Oh, I'm going to
 9 kill you because the post phone rang, it was the operator."
 10 And just like little things that he wasn't sure of as
 11 routine.
 12 Q Was he seriously upset or --
 13 A No. No.
 14 Q -- just joking or -
 15 A No, he was just joking.
 16 Q Okay. And do you know whether John Muskett told
 17 anybody besides you about this incident?
 18 A I don't know.
 19 Q Do you know if he told Officer Byrne about the
 20 incident?
 21 A [REDACTED]
 22 Q But you don't know that for sure.
 23 A I don't know that for sure. I mean, I could even
 24 have related it to Gary, I just don't recall.
 25 Q Now, you testified that John -- I think you said

1 which one she came out.
 2 A I meant John.
 3 Q You meant John by the word they? So there was
 4 no one in addition to Mr. Muskett that you spoke to about
 5 this?
 6 A No. Not that I can recall.
 7 BY MR. SUSANIN:
 8 Q John is Mr. Muskett?
 9 A Yes.
 10 Q And when you said you may have told the Muskett
 11 incident to Gary, that's Officer Byrne?
 12 A Right.
 13 Q B-y-r-n-e?
 14 A Mm-hmm.
 15 BY MS. WIRTH:
 16 Q Have you had any conversations with Gary Byrne
 17 about this incident? The John Muskett incident, the Easter
 18 Sunday incident?
 19 A Probably, but I don't remember specific locations
 20 or times.
 21 Q Do you remember anybody that you've talked to about
 22 the Easter Sunday incident besides John Muskett?
 23 A Well, probably Gary because he was on post.
 24 Maybe one of the other officers that was there just passing
 25 it along, but not anyone specific.

Page 29

1 Q Do you remember anything that Gary Byrne said to
2 you about this incident? About the Easter Sunday incident?
3 A No.
4 Q Just to switch topics for a moment, when you were
5 talking about the northwest gate incident, you said you had
6 heard that two supervisors, Captain Purdie and Sergeant
7 Williams, were called up to the Oval Office.
8 A Mm-hmm.
9 Q And you said something like you heard that they got
10 in trouble.
11 A Mm-hmm.
12 Q Do you have any more specific information about
13 what you mean by that?
14 A No. No. Just that, you know, that was the whole
15 purpose that they got called in there. I don't know, maybe
16 because she was delayed. I don't know.
17 Q Did you ever hear any specific thing that was said
18 to them in the Oval Office by anybody?
19 A No. No.
20 MS. WIRTH: Thank you.
21 BY MR. WISENBERG:
22 Q It's Officer Verna, correct?
23 A Right.
24 Q My name is Sol Wisenberg. I don't think we've met
25 before.

1 You've already talked about the movie theater rumor
2 that you had heard and I don't know if this was previous in
3 time to the Easter Sunday event, but did you want to speak to
4 that?
5 A No, I was going to say it had to be before Easter
6 Sunday.
7 Q Okay. So in light of the earlier thing you heard,
8 now you've heard a story where somebody, a colleague, is
9 complaining to you about the active weekend it turned out to
10 be, Harold Ickes goes in one door, Monica Lewinsky goes out
11 another door, what, if any, speculation was there by you, by
12 Officer Muskett, by anybody else, about what had been going
13 on?
14 A We didn't speculate. I didn't see what happened
15 behind that door. I mean -- she just -- my understanding was
16 she just came out and I wasn't going to assume.
17 Q Okay. So there was no speculation that you
18 witnessed on the matter.
19 A No.
20 Q Or engaged in yourself.
21 A No.
22 Q Is that correct?
23 A Mm-hmm.
24 Q Now, why would he consider this -- well, let me
25 rephrase it. What did you think when he related this story

Page 31

1 to you?
2 A I was kind of surprised.
3 Q Okay. And why is that?
4 A I don't know. Just because -- the way she left so
5 quickly, I was surprised, but I don't know what happened that
6 day. I liked Monica. She had never said, "Oh, I'm working a
7 weekend and going to the Oval Office" or nothing, so it did
8 surprise me, but I wouldn't say it was totally unusual.
9 Somebody is usually around there to answer the telephone on
10 the weekend or maybe he needed papers. I was just surprised
11 it was her.
12 Q It was unusual enough for Muskett to have kind of
13 mentioned it to you as being a more eventful weekend than he
14 had planned. Is that a fair statement?
15 A That's a fair statement. I don't think it was so
16 much that it was because of her, it was because of the way --
17 you know, the operator had called and the whole handling of
18 the situation. I think if it would have been anybody, I
19 think he would have relayed it the same way.
20 Q He did say that she left quickly?
21 A Yes, he did.
22 Q And do you know if he said -- I think you've
23 spoken to this -- do you recall if he said what door she
24 left from?
25 A I don't recall if he said what door. I don't

Page 31

1 remember offhand.
2 Q Did you hear the story come back in any way? You
3 know how sometimes somebody can tell you a story about an
4 event that occurred and three weeks later you're hearing it
5 from -- it's like it's going around the block and coming back
6 and you've heard it from somebody else. Has that ever
7 happened with respect to this story?
8 A Could have, but I don't recall specifically. I
9 mean, that's pretty much the rumor mill they all kind of
10 generate through, but I don't recall it just specifically,
11 because I heard it from John, so I wouldn't have really paid
12 attention to if I was hearing it from somebody else because I
13 heard it right from him.
14 Q With respect to this or any other incident
15 involving Monica Lewinsky, has anybody ever said that Ickes
16 or anybody else came in and found Monica with her head on
17 the President's lap?
18 A No, I had never heard that.
19 Q Until I've just said it right now?
20 A Right.
21 BY MR. PAGE:
22 Q Ms. Verna, my name is Ed Page. We haven't met, but
23 I work for Ken Starr and I'm one of the lawyers assigned to
24 his staff, so I would like to ask you a few questions at this
25 time.

Page 33

1 John Gerena, where is he currently assigned?
 2 A He's assigned to FMB, a truck unit.
 3 Q And tell us --
 4 A The bike patrol. I'm sorry, the bike patrol unit.
 5 Q F --
 6 A M-B.
 7 Q M-B? What's that stand for?
 8 A Foreign Missions Branch.
 9 Q On the bike detail?
 10 A Mm-hmm.
 11 Q He's still a member of the Secret Service?
 12 A Yes, sir.
 13 Q Uniformed division?
 14 A Yes, sir.
 15 Q I believe I heard you say that you have talked to
 16 Monica Lewinsky when she worked or was at or in the West
 17 Wing?
 18 A Mm-hmm.
 19 Q Is that correct?
 20 A Yes, sir.
 21 Q What did you speak with Monica Lewinsky about?
 22 A Pretty much just general things. My children,
 23 my family. She was always saying her mother was trying to
 24 fix her up with blind dates because she said she needed a
 25 boyfriend. She worked late a lot. She passed me every

1 morning when she went to breakfast and we just talked about
 2 general things.
 3 Q You also said that you liked Monica.
 4 A Yes.
 5 Q Is that correct?
 6 A Mm-hmm.
 7 Q Why was that?
 8 A Because she was nice. She had a nice personality,
 9 good conversation. She was just nice. You know, a lot of
 10 times, you see people over in the West Wing and they -- you
 11 know, don't even speak or say hello. She always made an
 12 effort to say hello and how's your day. You know, we'd talk
 13 for a couple of minutes each time I saw her.
 14 Q You also at least I heard you say that you were
 15 surprised that it was her regarding the Easter Sunday event.
 16 A Yes.
 17 Q Why were you surprised?
 18 A Well, I don't -- she didn't normally work on a
 19 weekend [REDACTED]. I don't recall seeing her
 20 on a weekend that late. If anything, during the week, her
 21 being there on my [REDACTED] shift I remember seeing her, but not
 22 on a weekend.
 23 Q So is it fair to say that you were surprised
 24 because it was out of the ordinary for Monica Lewinsky to be
 25 in the White House there on a weekend, on a Sunday?

Page 35

1 A I thought so. On Easter Sunday, yes.
 2 Q You said Muskett told you that he got a call from
 3 the White House operator on this Easter Sunday that we've
 4 been talking about.
 5 A Mm-hmm.
 6 Q Correct?
 7 A Yes, sir.
 8 Q Where does that operator work within the White
 9 House?
 10 A To be honest, I don't know what room she's in.
 11 Q How would she or that person who is the operator on
 12 that day have made the phone call to Muskett? In other
 13 words, what would have had to have happened first for Muskett
 14 to get a phone call at his location [REDACTED]?
 15 A She would have tried to ring the President at his
 16 desk in the Oval Office or there's a phone -- here's the
 17 President's desk and there's another desk behind that has a
 18 phone on it, too. She probably tried one of the lines and he
 19 didn't answer.
 20 Q And what prompts her or that person to pick up the
 21 phone and call Muskett?
 22 A Probably just because of location because he's
 23 right outside the door. On a weekend, usually the
 24 secretarial staff isn't there late in the day, it was Easter
 25 Sunday. Just call the post phone.

1 Q I'm trying to get, though, why the operator --
 2 what happens first before the operator calls the post phone?
 3 A I'm sure most of the calls for the President go
 4 through the operator, so when she got the call and she rang
 5 the phones and there was no answer, it must have been an
 6 important phone call, I would assume, so she called the post
 7 phone so that the officer on post would knock on the door to
 8 see if he could get a response, to say there's an important
 9 phone call for you she's trying to get through.
 10 MR. PAGE: Thank you.
 11 MR. SUSANIN: Ms. Verna, we're going to ask you to
 12 step outside the grand jury room for a moment, please.
 13 THE WITNESS: Sure. Just wait out here?
 14 MS. WIRTH: Yes.
 15 MR. SUSANIN: Please, ma'am.
 16 (Witness excused. Witness recalled.)
 17 MR. SUSANIN: Ms. Verna, we are back on the record
 18 with a few questions from the grand jurors that I will relay
 19 to you.
 20 THE WITNESS: Okay.
 21 BY MR. SUSANIN:
 22 Q The first question is you made reference to roll
 23 call taking place when you spoke about the [REDACTED] in the
 24 Old Executive. Is that roll call procedure documented in any
 25 way?

1 A Yes. Every morning at 6:30, you attend roll call.
2 They call off the names, go through anything important to
3 pass on. It's a daily procedure. But in my office, we do
4 not attend the roll call because we start a half hour early.
5 so it would have been probably in the scheduling office or in
6 the hallway. I would not have attended a roll call.

7 Q Okay. Do you know if there are logs, then, kept of
8 what happens at roll call?

9 A It's pretty much attendance for the shift to make
10 sure that everybody's there and then we have a briefing book
11 that they read through each morning.

12 Q Do you know for a fact that there's an attendance
13 log or are you surmising?

14 A No. Well, I mean, they read through the names on
15 the sheet of everybody that's supposed to work and if anybody
16 is late or not there, you know, they just call assignments
17 and scheduling to see if the person maybe called in sick or
18 if we made a mistake on scheduling. But from that point,
19 what the sergeants do with it, I don't know.

20 Q Okay. So it sounds like you presume they write
21 down who's absent but you don't know what's done with that
22 log.

23 A Right.

24 Q Is that fair to say?

25 A That's fair to say.

1 A No, she was -- I mean, she was pretty much moving.
2 She was crying and she was trying to go in the office to see
3 if they could do anything. She was more concentrated on
4 going to the office to ask them rather than stopping in and
5 having a conversation with me.

6 A JUROR: Did you ever put anything together about
7 here she was being transferred and that -- you had all these
8 friendly conversations with her and also heard the story
9 about her being in the Oval Office?

10 THE WITNESS: No, I know she -- from talking to
11 her after, I know she didn't want to be transferred. She
12 liked her job. She liked working there. But she never
13 specifically said anything as to why she thought she was
14 being transferred.

15 A JUROR: Did you have any questions in your mind
16 as to possibly the reasons why she was being transferred out?
17 Because of what it was that you knew that had happened on
18 Easter?

19 THE WITNESS: See, I don't know. I mean, I could
20 assume that, but -- and people get transferred there a lot,
21 so I don't know specifically if it was because of that
22 incident. It fell right afterwards, so you would probably
23 think that it could have been because of that.

24 A JUROR: Did you ever know of anybody else who was
25 crying on being transferred out of the White House?

Page 40

1 Q Who would know?

2 A One of the sergeants.

3 Q Within what office?

4 A Pretty much anybody. You can ask the officials,
5 the watch commander or somebody more specific with Secret
6 Service, but I don't know offhand.

7 Q Let me ask you about the conversation that you said
8 you had with Monica the day you saw her crying. As you
9 testified about it, it seems like it was a brief
10 conversation.

11 A It was very brief.

12 Q Okay. Is there anything that you -- any follow-up
13 questions you asked her or any additional statements she made
14 to you in that conversation that you have not told the grand
15 jury about?

16 A No. Like I said, by the time she said "I'm being
17 transferred" and then progressed to Betty's office, she
18 walked away with Nancy and I did not have a chance to talk to
19 her that day.

20 Q Can you give the grand jurors an idea of how long
21 the exchange between the two of you took that day?

22 A It was a matter of saying "I'm being transferred"
23 and she was crying and then she walked away.

24 Q Did she ever stop and talk to you or was she moving
25 the whole time you had your exchange?

1 THE WITNESS: No, sir.

2 MR. SUSANIN: I'll ask the foreperson at this time
3 if Ms. Verna may be excused.

4 THE FOREPERSON: Yes, she may.

5 THE WITNESS: Thank you.

6 MR. SUSANIN: Thank you.

7 Thank you, Ms. Verna.

8 THE FOREPERSON: Thank you.

9 (The witness was excused.)

10 (Whereupon, at 12:15 p.m., the taking of testimony
11 in the presence of a full quorum of the Grand Jury was
12 concluded.)
