Policies enacted by Congress have helped fuel three and a half straight years of solid economic growth. In the 12 months before Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, employment grew by an average of 194,000 jobs a month.

Legislation passed by Congress has aided economic growth and job creation by reducing regulatory barriers, limiting abusive lawsuits, creating job training opportunities, and keeping taxes low. Money spent by

Blunt Initiates Gas Price Task Force

House Majority Whip and Southwest Missouri Congressman Roy Blunt has formed the Gas Price Task Force, comprised of Members of Congress and dedicated to action to encourage production of greater supplies of gasoline and other fuels at affordable prices.

The two monster hurricanes exposed a growing problem with gasoline refining in the US. While demand for gasoline and other distilled fuels has risen steadily, the number of refineries has been cut in half since 1976 when the last refinery was built in the US. "We need to find and refine more of our own gasoline here at home to avoid greater dependence on foreign nations," Blunt said.

The GAS Act approved by the House of Representatives and co-sponsored by Blunt includes language long advocated by Blunt to reduce price spikes at the gas pump caused by unpredictable conditions like hurricanes Katrina and Rita

Since Hurricane Katrina hit the Gulf Coast in early September gasoline prices has dropped more than \$1.20 a gallon.


\$2 gas is still too high." Congressman Blunt said, "bu we continue to work to increase American production and refining capacity to keep gasoline at affordable prices.

Blunt's plan of action includes: Cutting the number of "boutique" fuels currently required for different parts of the country from 17 to six and taking on the real price gougers by empowering the Federal Trade Commission to define, investigate and prosecute gouging.

Cutting Taxes Increases Federal Revenues?

In the past five years, Congress has cut federal income taxes four times, yet the government is enjoying record growth in tax collections. The reason is simple: allowing individuals to keep more of the money they earn allows them greater freedom to save and invest and to help grow the economy. And since the vast majority of small business owners also file individual tax returns, not corporate returns, it means business owners have greater control to make decisions about investing in their company to buy new equipment and hire more people.

In 2004, the Internal Revenue Service processed more than 135 million tax returns worth nearly \$1 trillion dollars. Coming out of the last recession, tax reductions have served as a key incentive to keep the economy moving forward. Increased economic growth has in turn led to increased tax revenue. In fact, for the 16 months preceding Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, tax revenue for each and every month was higher than for the same month the year before. As a result, the final deficit for fiscal year 2005 was 20% lower than what was projected just last February



How can cutting taxes increase revenues? The money not sent to Washington goes directly into the economy where consumers spend, businesses invest and modernize, and people save. This cycle of economic activity typically reduces inventories, creates a demand for more products and an incentive for businesses to improve their factories and manufacturing plants and hire more people.

■ Government Revenue

People and businesses respond to reductions in taxes. When capital gains taxes were reduced, people who had been holding assets to avoid the higher taxes began selling their real estate and assets to make other investments and create new opportunities. When government unleashes the private sector, government revenues at all levels rise. This concept has a proven track record with Presidents Kennedy and Reagan. Their tax cuts, just like the ones enacted over the past five years, resulted in revenue increases.

"Finding the proper balance to fund appropriate government operations and allow taxpayers to keep more of their money is always a challenge," said Congressman Blunt, "Raising taxes does not help taxpayers or the national economy. Creating conditions that grow the economy by curbing frivolous lawsuits, reducing senseless government regulations, and rewarding savings and investment is the best medicine for keeping the national economy moving in a positive direction."

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Yes=Votes in Favor No=Votes Against "= Super majority required on suspension bills & constitutional amendments

Amendment - A proposal from a member of Congress to alter the language, provisions, or stipulations in a bill or in another amendment. It is usually printed, debated, and voted upon in the same way as a bill.

Appropriations - Legislation which provides the spending authority approved by authorization bills but not necessarily the full amount authorized. There are 13 annual appropriation bills for each fiscal year which begin on October 1.

Authorization - Basic legislation that establishes or continues (reauthorization) the legal operation of a federal program or agency, either indefinitely or for a specific time period, or which sanctions a particular type of obligation or expenditure.

Bill - A legislative proposal, designated as "HR" in the House of Representatives or "S" in the Senate followed by a number assigned to the order in which it was introduced during the two-year session of a Congress. A bill becomes a law if it is approved by both House and Senate in identical form and language and signed by the president or a president's veto is overridden by a two-thirds vote in both the House and Senate.

Concurrent Resolution - A resolution, designated as House Concurrent Resolution ("H Con Res") or Senate Concurrent Resolution ("S Con Res") often used to express the "sense of Congress" on various domestic or foreign policy issues. Concurrent resolutions differ from bills as they neither require nor are intended for approval by the president and therefore, do not have the full force of law.

Conference Report - The product of a meeting ("conference") between designated representatives of the House and Senate to reconcile differences between the two chambers over provisions of a bill or joint resolution passed by both chambers in different forms or language. No bill or joint resolution can be sent to the president unless both chambers of Congress have approved common language ("conference report") on the measure.

Continuing Resolution - A bill which provides appropriations for specific ongoing activities of federal agencies when a fiscal year begins and Congress has not yet enacted the regular appropriations bill for the full fiscal year.

Joint Resolution - A resolution designated House Joint Resolution ("HJRes") or Senate Joint Resolution ("SJRes") followed by a number assigned in the order in which it was introduced during the two year session in which a particular congress is convened. If approved by both chambers in identical form and signed by the president, it becomes a law (just as a bill). A joint resolution is generally limited to special circumstances and is also used to propose amendments to the Constitution. Under that purpose, it does not require a presidential signature and becomes part of the Constitution if three fourths of the states ratify or approve it.

This is the 9th Edition of all recorded votes cast by Roy Blunt and covers the periods in late November 2004 at the end of the Second Session (page 11) of the 108th Congress and January through early November 2005 in the First Session of the 109th Congress (starting on page 2).

Each recorded vote includes the roll call number, date of the vote, title of the bill, a brief explanation of the measure, Roy's vote, and whether the bill passed or failed, along with the total House vote. Votes on 441 substantive bills, amendments, and resolutions are presented here in chronological order, but procedural votes such as rules, quorum calls, journal approvals and motions to adjourn are excluded for the sake of brevity.

At the time of printing, the First Session of the 109th Congress was still in session. Votes taken after November 2nd will be included in the 10th edition of Blunt Facts (2006).

New Highway Bill Promises Jobs & Safer Roads

The Conference Report on H.R. 3 - Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users, containing ten Southwest Missouri highway projects sponsored by Seventh District Congressman Roy Blunt, was signed into law August of 2005. "The goal of this legislation is to modernize some of Southwest Missouri's busiest highways and most dangerous intersections to make the traveling public safer and our transportation system more efficient," Blunt, the House Majority Whip, said.

Blunt added, "Due to our combined work with Senator Bond and Senator Talent, the new transportation bill means Missouri will have our fair share of highway funds to undertake crucial highway improvements. It also means more of the money Missouri taxpayers send to Washington will come back to be used on our highway priorities.

Additionally, Blunt praised Senator Bond's work to secure \$25 million for improvements to Highway 13 between Springfield and Bolivar. He also placed significant increases in projects to improve the 65 and 60 Intersection in south Springfield and the Bypass project in Joplin. Bond, who is chairman of the Transportation and Infrastructure subcommittee on the Senate's Environment & Public Works Committee included language in the bill that will eventually turn Missouri taxpayers into recipients of nearly every penny of gas taxes they put into the Federal Highway Trust Fund. "We are thrilled," Dean Tia Strait of the School of Technology said. "The expansion of these programs will benefit the entire state

Two-thirds of the one-year, \$1 290,592 grant will be used to establish a distance-learning program to train dental hygienists in two areas of Missouri that are experiencing a severe shortage. Dr. Strait said, "We'll establish a dental clinic at the Rolla Technical Center and another in northwest Missouri at a site to be

determined at an educational center. Missouri Southern will offer distance-learning classes with interactive television classrooms in dental hygiene. MSSU will set up fully equipped clinics at the two sites to give new students hands-on-learning opportunities and offer oral health care services to low-income persons, children and seniors on fixed-incomes at nominal costs.

There is a crisis in Missouri of a shortage of dental hygienists in rural areas," Dr. Strait said. "Central and Northwest Missouri are the two areas most in need of trained oral hygienists. One goal of the grant is to address that shortage."

Another part of the grant secured by Congressman Blunt during the 2005 appropriations process will be used to upgrade forensics courses computer MSSU. Funds will be used to upgrade computer lab equipment to teach how to safeguard computers and software and to retrieve and recreate lost, damaged or destroyed data.

The remaining money will be used to upgrade equipment in MSSU's growing field of environmental health and bioinformatics. Missouri Southern State University has one of only 25 accredited environmental health programs in the nation.

Blunt Delivers \$175,000 for Integrating Sweeney Museum Into Wilson's Creek Battlefield

Southwest Missouri Congressman Roy Blunt secured \$175,000 for Wilson's Creek National Battlefield in the 2006 Interior Appropriations Bill. The funds will be used for planning and integrating the neighboring Sweeney Museum facilities into the neighboring park.

Last fall, Blunt, working with Senators Talent and Bond, secured \$4.5 million to acquire the privately owned Sweeney Museum on the northern boundary of the battlefield. It was part of a 615-acre expansion of the battlefield sponsored by Blunt and Talent that was signed into law in late 2004.

The additional lands were part of the 1861 battle but not included in the 1,750-acre park when it was created in 1960. Senator Talent's efforts secured \$1.2 million to purchase land from willing sellers to protect the lands from developments.

The 4,500 pieces of the Sweeney Museum collection, considered one of the finest private holdings of Civil War artifacts, memorabilia and weaponry in the country, is now on park property. Work is also moving forward to acquire the other five parcels of land identified as critical for preservation from nearby urban development.

Blunt said, "These new funds will allow the National Park Service to develop a plan to bring all the pieces together and help them use the park's resources and facilities in the best way."

Superintendents Seeing Sweeping Changes to IDEA

Last year, Congress approved legislation to reauthorize the Individuals with Disability Education Act (IDEA).

The bill approved in November puts the federal government on a six-year path to fully fund the federal share of the programs. Over the last decade, Congress has increased funding for special education grants to states by more than threefold. The \$11.1 billion appropriated for fiscal year 2005 is IDEA's highest level of funding in history.

"I firmly believe that the reforms in this act will help every student with disabilities to receive a quality education,

Congressman Blunt said. "From now on, parents and schools will be allowed to change a student's Individualized Education Program (IEP) without holding a formal IEP meeting, making it easier to make changes without contending with unnecessary bureaucratic requirements."

The act shifts the emphasis from compliance with burdensome and bureaucratic red tape to educational results for students. The act also includes strong steps to reduce unnecessary and costly litigation. The legislation seeks to restore trust between parents and schools by creating opportunities for early resolution of problems before they escalate and holding attorneys liable for frivolous lawsuits.

Blunt added, "The act also gives teachers and schools more freedom to exercise reasonable discipline. The bill will hopefully



restore common sense to school discipline. IDEA students will have the same punishment for the same infraction, unless the discipline problem is the direct result of a child's disability."

Blunt Amendment To Prevent International Taxes Passes

amendment sponsored by House Majority Whip Roy Blunt (Mo.) to the Foreign Relations Authorization Act for fiscal years 2006 and 2007 would prevent the taxation of American citizens or businesses by international entities.

"The United States already pays nearly 25 percent of the United Nations' \$2 billion annual budget," Blunt said. "This payment, of course, comes out of the pockets of the American people.

"Congress sent the message that we would oppose any attempts to levy even more backdoor taxes on the American people," Blunt continued. "International taxation is out of step with our nation's formative opposition to 'taxation without representation'

"The specter of international taxation is not as remote or outlandish as it may seem," Blunt said, noting a senior U.N. staffer to Kofi Annan recently suggested the most effective way to close the \$65 billion gap in the U.N. anti-poverty budget was a global tax.

Medicare Keeping Pace with 21st Century Medicine

A new prescription drug benefit. It is voluntary, competitive, and helps seniors pay for the drugs their doctors say they need. For the poorest seniors, it offers extra help and in many cases requires a

minimum out-of-pocket cost. For a monthly premium and annual deductible, seniors will have access to medicines that the government will help pay for.

"Welcome to Medicare Physicals" started for new persons entering Medicare in Before, seniors who wanted a general physical had to be sick to get one. Now, seniors can receive, within six months of entering Medicare, a free physical that includes measurement of height, weight and blood pressure, medical history and an electrocardiogram

New screenings have been added to Medicare. In addition to already covering screening for glaucoma, as well as breast, cervical, colorectal, and prostate cancers, Medicare now covers new cholesterol, blood, lipid, diabetes and osteoporosis screenings.

Six things you need to know about Medicare Part D if you are sidering a drug coverage plan:

1. It is totally voluntary. You will never be forced to join any

Medicare insurance plan for drug coverage, unless you are Medicaid eligible. If you want drug benefits to start January 1, 2006, you must enroll before December 31, 2005.

2. It is an insurance plan. Persons who enroll between November 15, 2005 and May 15, 2006 can start receiving benefits the following month of their enrollment. Persons who enroll after May 15 will face penalties for late sign-up, unless, through no fault of their own, their existing coverage is ended or withdrawn.

3. All seniors need to know the drugs they are prescribed, how they want them delivered and what companies provide the most coverage for the most reasonable costs. Seniors can contact 1-800-Medicare, the Southwest Missouri Office on Aging in Springfield (417-862-0762) or the VantAge Point Area Agency on Aging in Joplin (417-627-0600) or the Constituent Service Centers in Springfield (417-889-1800) or in Joplin (417-781-1041).

4. If the plan you choose does not work as anticipated, you have the option to move to a new plan each year.

5. Seniors with annual income of less than \$12,920 for an individual (\$17,231 for a couple in 2005), and limited resources, will pay no deductible and no premium. Co-pays will be a few dollars. If your income is less than \$14,355 for an individual (\$19,245 for a couple in 2005), and you have limited resources, you will pay reduced deductibles, premiums, and co-pays.

6. If you have no present drug coverage and are in good health, you may want to consider the lowest-cost, minimum coverage possible to cover you in the event of an unexpected medical condition that may require the use of prescriptions.

A Few Blunt Constituent Advocacy Success Stories

Lt. William Patton and his P-51 disappeared in early 1945 on a flight over German-occupied France. More than a half-century later the plane and Lt. Patton were found when a French farmer drained a bog. Lt. Patton was returned to the US for burial at the National Cemetery in Springfield with full military honors.

The French used parts of the crashed plane to erect an extensive memorial to Lt. Patton. The Patton family that lives in the Neosho area asked Congressman Blunt to see if other parts of the aircraft could be transported by the US so a similar memorial could be established in Southwest Missouri.

The effort took three years, but in July, 21 parts, including one of the six machine guns (shown in the photo) from the P-51 Mustang, landed at the Air and Military Museum of the Ozarks where a memorial to Lt. Patton will be created.

- Mrs. Ethel Simmerman Cook came to the congressional office seeking information about reports that the U.S.S. Lagarto, an American Naval submarine missing since May 1945 in the Pacific, had been found. A letter to the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations got a quick response. In less than a week, Mrs. Cook had confirmation that the submarine her brother, Ralph Simmerman, served on was found by British divers. The boat carried a crew of 61 that included three crewmen with family currently residing in the Ozarks.
- *A retired Air Force Lt. Colonel sought Congressman Blunt's help when the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) notified him he owed \$22,000 because he had received benefits he was not entitled to. A letter from the congressional office brought an unusual admission from the Department of Defense (DoD). The DoD, in its letter to Congressman Blunt said, the erroneous "claim arose from an administrative error with no indication of fraud, fault or lack of good faith on the part" of the service member. The DoD claim for repayment was dismissed. The Springfield man wrote Congressman Blunt, "This is a great day for me. I choose to believe that your help was what made this appeal approval possible; you have given a little quality to my life."
- A National Guardsman from Springfield, retired from the 203rd Engineer Battalion, believed he had two years of back pay owed him. He had filed for retirement in April 2002 and filed for the pay 18 months later. A year later he still had not received a response on his back pay. It took caseworker Jon Bledsoe less than a month to receive notice that the \$23,800 owed the guardsman was awarded.
- When a local businessman was stricken with a heart attack during a visit to China, his family asked for help from Congressman Blunt to expedite their passport renewals that normally take four to six weeks. Working the phones, Constituent Advocate Sue Ellen Ball coordinated with the passport office in San Francisco to get a same-day passport as the family waited for their flight to China. Ball also called the Chinese Consulate in San Francisco to arrange the receipt of their visitor's visas that same day,

*After receiving several calls about a defaulted student loan he or his children never had, a Springfield man called Congressman Blunt's office for help. The Department of Education was contacted and informed they had the wrong guy by the same name that lives in the same county. Within two days the matter was fixed.

A Springfield woman got a quick response when she asked the constituent advocate to work on her Social Security claim. What normally takes six to ten weeks was processed by hand the same day it was sent to California. She received her money within the week. "I want to thank you and your very efficient staff for helping me. I really NEVER saw the government act so quickly," she wrote.

Blunt Proposes WWII Veterans Enlist In Library of Congress Video History Project

After observing the 60th anniversary of Victory in Europe and in Japan this year, Southwest Missouri Congressman Roy Blunt offers veterans who served in World War II the opportunity to participate in the Library of Congress' Veterans History Project. Created by Congress in 2000, the Veterans History Project relies on volunteers to collect and preserve stories of wartime service. "The key is for veterans to come forward and share their experience and have them recorded on video," Congressman Blunt said.

Blunt said, "The Veterans History Project is aimed at preserving those individual memories for future generations to understand the personal sacrifice that preserving freedom demands."

Missouri State University in Springfield and the College of the Ozarks at Point Lookout have set up archives, in addition to the Library of Congress. Missouri Southern State University in Joplin is active in securing interviews with local veterans.
