Response by Ruth Bader Ginsburg to Written Question of Senator Herbert Kohl, dated July 22, 1993

As I suggested at the Hearings, televised appellate proceedings can convey at once a picture not easily drawn in words spoken outside the courtroom. One can also visy televised proceedings as an extension of the U.S. tradition of open proceedings.

I am sensitive, however, to concerns about distortion, and consider essential court control of any editing. Furthermore, I appreciate the need for good will among colleagues, and would not push my own preference without first hearing the views of others on this subject.

Just now an experiment with televised proceedings is ongoing in the federal courts, with several district courts and courts of appeals as participants. A report based on experience will be made to the U.S. Judicial Conference and the Conference may thereafter adopt a resolution on cameras in courts. It would be judicious to avait the Conference report so that Supreme Court practice can be developed in light of the Conference discussion and recommendations.
