Statement by U.S. Sen. Chuck Grassley of Iowa Chairman, Committee on Finance Recommendations of the National Coalition on Health Care Tuesday, July 20, 2004

In announcing its recommendations for health care reform today, the National Coalition on Health Care made an important contribution to the current dialogue on how to make our health care system work better. The 44 million Americans who are uninsured, coupled with the rising health care costs, make it difficult to find a one-size-fits-all solution to improve access and make health care more affordable. As Congress works to address this issue, it is helpful to have recommendations from groups, such as the National Coalition. Governor Ray, Dr. Simmons and their colleagues deserve a lot of credit for the work to add their views to the debate on this vital issue.

Today the National Coalition on Health Care announced its recommendations for health care reform. The National Coalition is a non-partisan organization of nearly 100 of America's largest businesses, unions, health care providers, associations of religious congregations, pensions and health funds, insurers, and patient and consumer groups. Together they represent as least 150 million Americans that are united by their commitment to build a better health care system.

As chairman of the Committee on Finance, Sen. Grassley has held three hearings to examine the uninsured problem. In 2002, he sponsored a tax credit program for certain displaced workers as part of the Trade Promotion Authority Act. Last year, he shepherded through Congress legislation to redistribute unspent S-CHIP dollars among states to maximize public coverage of otherwise uninsured low-income children. For the last several years, Sen. Grassley has championed with Sen. Kennedy a bill that would expand Medicaid coverage to parents with severely disabled children. Sen. Grassley is a member of the Republican Task Force on the Uninsured.
