Dear Chairman Majoras

I am writing to learn what measures the Federal Trade Commission is taking to fully utilize the procurement program for small businesses owned and controlled by service disabled veterans.

As you know, Section 308 of the Veterans Benefits Act of 2003 (P.L. 108-183) amends the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 659) to allow contracts to be sole-sourced to service-disabled veteran-owned businesses and creates a limited competition program for these firms.

There is a government-wide goal to allocate a minimum of three percent of total contract dollars to companies owned and controlled by service-disabled veterans. In 2004, the Federal government awarded 0.38 percent of Federal contract dollars to these firms and the Federal Trade Commission awarded 0 percent of its contracts to these firms. It has now been two years since this program became law on December 16, 2003. As Ranking Member of the Committee on Small Business and Entrepreneurship, I request that answers to the following questions be reported to the Committee by February 15, 2006:

Has the Federal Trade Commission set aside any contracts for service-disabled veteran-owned small business owners and limited competition for these businesses since the passage of this legislation? Has the Federal Trade Commission utilized the sole-source tool that was made available by P.L. 108-183, and if so, how often?

What strategies are being implemented to inform agency contractors about the opportunities available to them through this program? What steps has the agency taken to actively seek out eligible businesses and inform them of the contracting opportunities at the Federal Trade Commission under the Veterans Benefits Act?

Is there a process for service-disabled veteran-owned small businesses to proactively contact contracting officers or the Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization to learn about contracts for which they are eligible under this program?

What training programs has the Federal Trade Commission implemented to ensure that the Agency's procurement staff is fully aware of the various tools available to them to assist in the utilization of service-disabled veteran-owned businesses?

The Veterans Benefits Act provides a critical competitive tool for service-disabled veteran-owned small businesses and it is imperative the Federal Trade Commission has taken appropriate steps to ensure that this program has been fully implemented, as required by law.
