Abstract On March 22, 2006, a 40-year-old male career Captain

(victim) died from complications of a drowning incident that occurred two days prior. The victim was in a training class with another student to become certified on a personal watercraft/waverunner (PWC) to conduct surf rescue operations for his jurisdiction. While the

victim participated in training evolutions as a passenger on the back of the PWC, he fell off and

re-boarded numerous times while the engine was running. After a wave knocked both trainees from the PWC, the

victim reported he was too tired to re-board and seemed confused. The instructor attempted to drag the Captain to shore using an 18-inch tow strap attached to the rear of the PWC, but this was very difficult due to the surf conditions and the engine's water propulsion hitting the victim's upper body. After numerous attempts to hang on, the Captain became lost in the surf. A few minutes later, the instructor found the Captain and swam him to shore. The victim was retrieved from the surf and advanced life-saving efforts were initiated until the ambulance arrived on the scene and transported him to a local hospital. He was airlifted to a regional medical center where he died two days later from injuries received during the incident. NIOSH investigators consider the drowning episode to have been triggered by a combination of exhaustion, hypothermia [rectal temperature less than 95.7° Fahrenheit (F)] and carbon monoxide poisoning (carboxyhemoglobin level estimated to be 20%). To minimize the risk of similar occurrences, fire departments, police departments, and/or agencies with surf rescue teams should: (1) ensure that PWC are never boarded by an operator or a passenger while the engine is running; (2) enhance current standard operating procedures to include requirements for rescue boards on all PWC during emergency responses and training; (3) enhance current standard operating procedures to include requirements for issued personal protective equipment (PPE); (4) enhance current standard operating procedures for training operations to duplicate the same level of response as an actual emergency; (5) provide an emergency medical services unit at all training sessions; and (6) consider conducting a job analysis of surf rescue to determine its fitness and strength requirements. Additionally, manufacturers should: assess the significance of carbon monoxide exposures and carbon monoxide poisoning among operators of PWC during simulated rescue operations. On September 21, 2006, a 38-year-old volunteer fire fighter/emergency medical technician (EMT) arrived for training at his fire station at 1945 hours. The training scenario involved vehicle extrication with hydraulic rescue tools. After training for 2 hours, he left the fire station at about 2145 hours complaining of fatigue, which fellow crew members attributed to his 12-hour EMT shift immediately before the training. He returned home and showered. Just before going to bed, he told his roommate that he was experiencing an "aura." Shortly thereafter, he began exhibiting seizure activity. The emergency medical system was called and an ambulance arrived at 0016 hours. He was unresponsive with no pulse or respiration. He died even though he had received cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) at home and advanced cardiac life support in the ambulance, the emergency department, and the intensive care unit of the hospital. The death certificate and autopsy, completed by the chief medical examiner, listed the immediate cause of death as "intramural coronary artery disease with severe fibromuscular dysplasia of the artery to the AV node of the heart following a volunteer fire training session." Other significant conditions attributing to death but not related to the given cause was "seizure disorder." The NIOSH investigator concurs with this conclusion. NIOSH investigators offer these recommendations to reduce the risk of on-duty sudden cardiac arrest among fire fighters. (1) Consider modifying the current medical evaluation program to be consistent with NFPA 1582, Standard on Comprehensive Occupational Medical Program for Fire Departments. (2) Following an injury/illness, the final determination of a fire fighter's return-to-work status should be made by the fire department physician who is knowledgeable about the physical demands of fire fighting, the medical requirements of fire fighters, and the various components of NFPA 1582. Although unrelated to this fatality, the fire department should consider these additional recommendations: (3) Phase in a wellness/fitness program for fire fighters to reduce risk factors for cardiovascular disease and improve cardiovascular capacity. (4) Perform an annual physical performance (physical ability) evaluation for ALL fire fighters to ensure they are physically capable of performing the essential job tasks of structural fire fighting.

On February 4, 2007, a 27-year-old male career fire fighter (the victim) and a 38-year-old male career firefighter were trapped under a canopy which collapsed off of a burning residential garage. The victim was pinned under the canopy debris, and was found not breathing while still wearing his SCBA and SCBA mask. The second fire fighter received injuries requiring time off from work. The victim and the injured fire fighter were responding to a report of an "unknown type" fire. Upon arriving on scene, they advanced a charged 1 3/4-inch pre-connected hose line into the structure through an open garage located at the A-side. victim was the nozzle man. The fire fighters worked long enough to empty their air cylinders, went outside to replace them, and then returned to the garage. roof debris started to fall, they decided to retreat from the garage. Once immediately outside the garage, they paused underneath the canopy. As the fire fighters pulled the hoseline from the garage, the canopy, which was connected to the garage roof rafters by long metal bars, fell on both fire fighters, trapping them underneath. The designated rapid intervention team (who had just arrived on-scene) worked for approximately 10 minutes to extricate both fire fighters. The victim and the injured fire fighter were sent to the local hospital by ground ambulance. The victim was pronounced dead at the hospital, and the injured fire fighter was treated for injuries requiring time off from work. NIOSH investigators concluded that, to minimize risk of similar occurrences, fire departments should: review and follow existing standard operating procedures (SOPs) for structural fire fighting to ensure that fire fighters follow a "2 in 2 out" policy; (2) ensure that adequate numbers of staff are available to immediately respond to emergency incidents; (3) establish a collapse zone when structures become unstable; (4) ensure that the Incident Commander continuously evaluates the risks versus gain when determining whether the fire suppression operation will be offensive or defensive;

(5) ensure that the first arriving company officer does not become involved in the fire fighting effort after assuming the role of Incident Commander; (6) ensure that a thermal imaging camera is being used during size-up; and (7) ensure that a separate Incident Safety Officer, independent from the Incident Commander, is appointed at

each structural fire.

Abstract

The Visa Waiver Program, which enables citizens of participating countries to travel to the United States without first obtaining a visa, has many benefits, yet also presents security, law enforcement, and illegal immigration risks. In August 2007, Congress passed legislation that provides the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) with the authority to expand the program to additional countries whose nationals' applications for short-term business and tourism visas were between 3 and

10 percent of the time in the prior fiscal year. Countries must also meet certain conditions, and DHS must first complete and certify a number of required actions aimed at enhancing the security of the program. This testimony will focus on one of these required actions—namely, that a system be in place that can verify the departure of 97 percent of foreign nationals who depart through U. S. airports (referred to as an air exit system). Our observations are based on our review of relevant legislation, regulations and agency operating

procedures, and prior GAO reports on the Visa Waiver

Program and immigrant and visitor entry and exit tracking systems, as well as on discussions with federal agency officials. In commenting on a draft of this statement, DHS emphasized that it had not finalized its plan for certifying the "97 percent" requirement, but that the department believes the current plan would meet the legislative requirement. The Department of State also provided technical Comments, which we incorporated, as appropriate.

assets--including vessels, aircraft, and communications systems. At the program's start, the Coast Guard chose to use a system integrator, Integrated Coast Guard

Systems, to design, build, deploy, and support Deepwater

in a system-of-systems approach. In a series of

reports, we have noted the risks inherent in this approach. With the Deepwater program under way, the Coast Guard's priorities and focus shifted after September 11 toward homeland security missions, such as protecting the nation's ports and waterways. The 2002 Maritime Transportation Security Act and the 2006 SAFE Port Act required a wide range of security improvements. GAO is monitoring the acquisition of Deepwater and the Coast Guard's ability to carry out its numerous missions. This testimony addresses: (1) changes the Coast Guard is making as it assumes a larger role in managing the Deepwater Program and (2) challenges the Coast Guard is facing in carrying out its various missions. To conduct this work, GAO reviewed key documents, such as Deepwater acquisition program baselines, human capital plans, and Coast Guard budget and performance documents. For information on which GAO has not previously reported, GAO obtained Coast Guard views. The Coast Guard generally concurred with the information.

In order to prevent terrorists from illegally obtaining state issued DL/ID cards the 9/11 commission recommended that the federal government establish national standards for the state issuance of DL/ID cards. Providing an analysis of the implementation of this policy from the federal government's perspective and the NCSL's perspective is essential in determining the best course of action for implementing RIDA. The policy implications scholars and decision makers derive from an analysis of RIDA are important for current and future U.S. Homeland Security policy decisions regarding information security. The Coast Guard is in the midst of the largest acquisition program in its history--one that has experienced serious performance and management problems. The Deepwater program is intended to replace or modernize the Coast Guard's fleet of vessels, aircraft, and information management capabilities in order to carry out its missions along our coastlines and farther out at sea. Congress asked us to determine (1) how decisions are made regarding whether to purchase assets under the contract with ICGS or directly with another vendor; (2) the costs and performance trade-offs, if any, associated with the Coast Guard's acquisition strategy for the Fast Response Cutter (FRC); (3) costs, schedule, and performance issues associated with changes to the National Security Cutter (NSC); and (4) actions the Coast Guard has taken to address the open recommendations from our March 2004 report.

Following the World Trade Center (WTC) attack, federal funding was provided to government agencies and private organizations to establish programs for screening, monitoring, or treating responders for illnesses and conditions related to the WTC disaster. Within the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) awards grants for and oversees the WTC health programs that provide services for responders to the WTC attack. Federal funds appropriated or awarded for the WTC health programs from October 2001 through November 2007 have totaled \$261.1 million. These funds were provided for screening and monitoring services, outpatient and inpatient treatment, and program support. NIOSH has awarded the bulk of the funding. For fiscal year 2007, NIOSH estimated that medical monitoring, treatment services, and associated program support services for the WTC health programs could range in cost from about \$230 million to \$283 million. However, in July 2007 we reported that NIOSH did not have a reliable cost estimation process. We found that NIOSH and its grantees had included potential costs for certain program changes that might not be in implementation and, in the absence of actual treatment cost data, had relied on questionable assumptions. We noted that HHS officials had required the two largest grantees--New York City Fire Department's WTC Medical Monitoring and Treatment Program (FDNY) and the New York/New Jersey (NY/NJ) WTC Consortium -- to report detailed cost data to improve future cost estimates. In fall 2007 the NIOSH director briefed congressional staff on the cost estimate for the WTC health programs for fiscal year 2008 and on changes NIOSH made to its cost estimation

process for that year. In light of our findings on NIOSH's cost estimation process for fiscal year 2007 and of the development of a cost estimate for fiscal year 2008, Congress asked us to identify the changes that NIOSH made for fiscal year 2008 and to determine whether these changes represent and improvement. In summary, we found that, overall, the cost estimation process NIOSH used to estimate WTC health program costs for fiscal year 2008 represented an improvement over the process it used for fiscal year 2007. For the fiscal year 2008 estimate, NIOSH used actual average costs from the April 2007 through June 2007 quarter as the basis for estimating costs for screening and monitoring exams, instead of using assumptions as it had for fiscal year 2007. For fiscal year 2008, NIOSH also used actual average costs from the April 2007 to June 2007 quarter for estimating outpatient treatment costs--which represented almost two-thirds of the total cost estimate. This is an improvement over NIOSH's fiscal year 2007 methods, which relied on proxy data based on New York State workers' compensation reimbursement payments, as well as on questionable assumptions, to estimate outpatient treatment costs. Since 2001, Congress has provided the Department of Defense (DOD) with hundreds of billions of dollars in supplemental and annual appropriations for military operations in support of the Global War on Terrorism (GWOT). Abstract

As the Global War on Terror continues to exhaust both federal and state military resources, it is important to establish a domestic disaster response plan that does not rely or default to a military solution. Post-Katrina assessments highlight that the response to Hurricane Katrina has tarnished the DHS and FEMA's image and trust that Americans have in the government's ability to respond effectively to a disaster. The Department of Homeland Security does not directly address a concerted volunteer effort, instead it provides limited support for volunteer initiatives like Citizen Corps, which can be improved by a more concerted nation-wide effort like a DHS-Reserve. Additionally, there are many disparate volunteer response efforts managed at every level of the government. Although many Americans are willing to serve their nation, many are apprehensive to serve in uniform and, specifically, in combat. The aftermaths of 9/11 and Hurricane Katrina, however, highlight the need for citizen involvement during domestic emergencies. The unconstrained and largely uncoordinated disparate volunteer organizations, the lack of a national governing body or oversight

mechanism, along with the over-exhausted and ill-equipped troops at home, clearly demonstrates the need for America to consider expanding the opportunities for citizen service. Enacting an emergency response volunteer system that is part of a national service system is the best way to involve Americans in homeland security.
