CCDF State and Territory Profiles

Section two of this report contains a profile of each State and Territory that highlights selected services and activities as reported by Lead Agencies in their approved Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Plan for Fiscal Year (FY) 2008–2009, which became effective October 1, 2007.

As a supplement to the text and figures presented throughout the first section of the report, the data selected for these profiles correspond to the CCDF Preprint under the following broad headings:

- Administration and Implementation, which is drawn from Part 1 Administration and Part 3 Child Care Services Offered.
- Child Care Services Offered, which is drawn from Part 3 Child Care Services Offered and Part 4 Parental Rights and Responsibilities.
- **Health and Safety Requirements**, which is drawn from *Part 6 Health and Safety Requirements* for *Providers* (for States) and *Part 7 Health and Safety Requirements in the Territories* (for Territories).
- Selected Quality Activities, which is drawn from Part 2 Developing the Child Care Program and Part 5 Activities and Services to Improve the Quality and Availability of Child Care.

Due to the wide variation in how States and Territories implement the CCDF program, data were selected in order to present the information as consistently as possible. In addition, these profiles do not provide a comprehensive picture of the CCDF program in each State and Territory. Under **Administration and Implementation**, *administration of the* program covers the majority of entities and methods involved in delivering CCDF services, although States and Territories vary widely in how the program is implemented.

Under Child Care Services Offered, the *income eligibility* information is based on entry into the program, not the maximum income limit for remaining eligible. The *reimbursement rates* for full-time care in the largest urban area are presented, which may or may not be representative of all possible rates. The *sliding fees* for full-time care for a family of three are presented. The *waiting list* information is based on responses to a series of yes/no questions, although States and Territories vary in their reasons for use and how they implement waiting lists. The *maximum length of eligibility upon initial authorization* for most families is presented, although the actual length of eligibility may vary within a State or Territory based on client needs or location of services.

Under **Health and Safety Requirements**, only information on which provider types are subject to licensing is presented. Information on the exemptions and any additional subsidy program requirements beyond licensing are not included.

Under Selected Quality Activities, examples highlight only one of many activities each State and Territory undertakes for each category.

- Quality Set-Aside: Alabama's Kids and Kin Relative Child Care Program offers equipment stipends to relative child care providers after they reach Levels I and II in the State's Voluntary Certification Program. Relative providers are offered training on health and safety, child development, and other topics.
- Infants and Toddlers: Alabama's Infant Toddler Priority Outreach initiative concentrates on improving infant and toddler care by providing onsite assessment, consultation, training, and support to center-based infant and toddler programs.

SELECTED QUALITY ACTIVITIES

- Quality Set-Aside: CCR&R agencies support families with children who have special needs through a liaison who provides enhanced referrals to parents and training and resources to child care providers.
- Infants and Toddlers: Alaska provides specialized training to help programs offer safe, healthy care that meets the developmental needs of infants and toddlers through the use of the Family Child Care Environment Rating Scale and the Infant/Toddler Environment Rating Scale. It also offers assessment follow-up via consultations and mini-grants for quality improvements identified through the assessment process.
- Resource and Referral Services: Three CCR&R grantees provide services to urban and rural communities throughout Alaska. They receive funding to maintain and support outreach workers in 17 smaller communities to provide linkages with community organizations and help organize and support provider training and recruitment.
- **School-Age Child Care:** School-age targeted funds support onsite consultations, training, advising, and travel grants for rural schoolage care providers.

Education modules focusing on promoting child wellness, child health awareness, childhood diseases, child health and safety issues, nutrition education, and child development are provided at each visit. Education materials are provided in both English and native languages, including Samoan and Tongan.
- Infants and Toddlers: Early intervention (Part C) screening and assessment are followed by service planning and supports for parents, family members, and/or caregivers. A clinical psychologist conducts clinical assessments. Coordinated case management is provided in partnership with other service agencies, including the departments of Health, Education, and Human and Social Services.
- Resource and Referral Services: The Lead Agency prints monthly announcements in local newspapers and radio stations regarding the importance of early learning and child development. Published information includes resources for child care, locations, and contact numbers.
- School-Age Child Care: Not applicable.

- Voluntary Early Learning Guidelines: Early learning guidelines have been developed and are undergoing a review.
- Professional Development Plans: American Samoa is planning its professional development plan.

- Quality Set-Aside: Arizona's infant and toddler child care team helps improve care by reviewing State licensing standards, accountability measures, professional development, program evaluation, and financial incentives.
- Infants and Toddlers: Arizona offers home recruitment contracts for family child care providers that focus on infant care, especially for nontraditional hours.
- Resource and Referral Services: The Arizona Early Education Fund was established to help communities statewide build the quality and capacity of early care programs for children from birth to age 5. This fund was established to support child health, literacy, and quality enhancement.
- School-Age Child Care: Phone A Friend is an after-school bilingual warmline service available for children who are home alone. Trained counselors assist children with homework, sibling conflicts, problem solving, and nonemergency situations. The program also provides home and Internet safety trainings to children.

Sixty-six providers were given support for the purpose of national accreditation in the prior project cycle. Four associations achieved milestones, including the development of Spanish language provider groups and recruitment of 50 providers in one rural association area.
- Infants and Toddlers: The Child Care Initiative Project works to increase the number of infant and toddler family child care providers throughout the State through recruitment, training, and initial support.

- **Quality Set-Aside:** The Lead Agency funds a child care apprenticeship program. Participants earn 15 college credits and complete 4,000 hours of supervised on-the-job training. The apprentices' employers are required to increase their wages upon program completion. Apprentices are tracked longitudinally to document retention in the field and wage increases.
- Infants and Toddlers: WestEd conducted two Program for Infant Toddler Caregivers trainer institutes in Wyoming. Fifty individuals completed the training and now provide training in local communities.
- Resource and Referral Services: The Lead Agency's contract for CCR&R services is performance-based and requires an increased number of referrals and consumer education each year.
