

I redeployed to the U.S. in late 2005 but stayed in contact with the family. It was encouraging to hear that Abdul was recuperating and learning how to be an active young man for the first time in his life.

Today I was able to meet Abdul and his father again here in Basrah. Abdul is now able to attend school like any other 11 year old, which he could not do prior to the surgery. He likes to play soccer and has a smile I will never forget.

We clicked a few photos and said our goodbyes. His father expressed great appreciation for our efforts here in Iraq and to all American's for their sacrifices to help their country. We will grow as friends in the coming years. The people of Iraq will have better medical care, schools, and so much more because of the sacrifices of the American coalition.
