It started at Vandenberg Air Force Base in 1978 and took me through tours in Japan, South Korea, Afghanistan and my current deployment here in southern Iraq. My friends in Nipomo and Santa Maria, although they thought I was crazy, have been and continue to be a source of strength for me.

We have brought clean fresh drinking water to communities for the first time in their history. We are building a school in a small village whose people are generally uneducated because Saddam's regime shunned them, refusing to invest in anything there whatsoever.

This has been a once in a lifetime opportunity and I am proud to be part of this effort. As the Area Engineer in Basra, I've had the privilege of working with 60 other dedicated professionals — Iraqi Engineers who heroically go to the project sites each day alone and unaccompanied. Yes, they do it for a paycheck, but every one of them is proud to be part of this historic mission, motivated to make a difference, and thankful to those of us who are here to assist. The Iraqi people continue to amaze me!

The years have gone by quickly, from a young man in the jungles of Vietnam to the deserts of Iraq — the journey has been interesting and at times quite exciting. I have been blessed regarding this adventure and it's still not over. Who knows what's next . . .
