As a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) employee since 1989, I have always been proud of serving with an organization that contributes so much to the quality of life for people worldwide. I began collecting and sending donations to the Corps' Baghdad Division for the hospitals, orphanages, and schools from my home in Millington, TN. Even though there are extended work hours, I have been able to devote time to the Morale, Welfare and Recreation Committee and to assist with sorting the donations that come in here and then are given to the Iraqi people. These items were combined with some other donations received for infants and sent to our newest birthing center facility that the Corps is building in Fallujah.

My six-month temporary assignment will end soon, and I will return to Millington with fond memories of the people I have met and worked with here. I have made some lasting friendships in this short time with a diversity of people, and will go home with a broader perspective of the kinship of the human race.
