His two continent neighbor, and present U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Gulf Region Division (USACE-GRD) colleague, Mark Ellis is less than a week away from returning home after "A year and a day deployment."



"How fast the time has flown," says Spano, a California National Guardsman whose full-time work is that of National Guard liaison for Governor Schwarzenegger. In the Guard he was a Battalion Commander in the 40<sup>th</sup> Aviation Brigade and, just prior to deployment, became the Chief of Staff of HHD, Engineer Brigade, 40<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. In Iraq, Spano serves as the Gulf Region Division's Strategic Planner.

His "neighbor", Ellis, has served in another challenging position as a USACE-GRD Program Manager working with Multi National Security and Training Corps - Iraq (MNSTC-I) projects which included construction on all of the Iraqi military

installations, border forts and police stations. "Originally, I came over here on a 'tasker' of 120 days, but the extensive scope of it all required my continued efforts up to, ultimately, 366," he explained.
